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
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

#### Journal of the Proceedings of the Forty-Fourth Convention of the Diocese of the Central Gulf Coast Thursday, February 19, 2015 – Registration and Committee Meetings

Registration of delegates, alternates, and visitors to the Forty-Fourth Annual Convention of the Diocese of the Central Gulf Coast began at 1:00 pm on Thursday, February 19, 2015, in the parish hall of Trinity Episcopal Church, Mobile, Alabama. Exhibits of several Diocesan ministries were open. An orientation meeting for first-time delegates was held at 2:00 pm. The Committee on Canons and Rules of Order and the Committee on Resolutions also met at 2:00 pm. An open hearing on the proposed Diocesan budget for 2015 was held at 3:00 pm followed by a meeting of the Committee on Finance.

#### Thursday Evening, February 19, 2015 - Opening Service

The Forty-Fourth Annual Convention of the Diocese of the Central Gulf Coast was opened with Evening Prayer at 6:00 pm on Thursday, February 19, 2015, in Trinity Church, Mobile, with The Rt. Rev. Philip M. Duncan, II, Bishop of the Central Gulf Coast, as officiant. The Rt. Rev. James E. Waggoner, Jr., Bishop of Spokane and Convention Chaplain, was preacher. The lessons were read by Carolyn Jeffers of Christ Church Cathedral, and Matthew Lucas, Diocesan Youth Representative, of St. Paul's, Foley. Assisting clergy included The Rt. Rev. Charles I. Jones, Bishop of Montana, retired; The Rev. Bailey Norman, Rector of the host parish; The Rev. Mary Alice Mathison of St. Paul's, Daphne; and The Rev. Deacon Terry Goff of Trinity, Mobile. Music was led by the choir of the host parish under the direction of Kevin Davis, Organist-Choirmaster. Verger, acolytes, and ushers were members of the host parish. During the office, Bishop Duncan led the clergy in the renewal of ordination vows and blessed oils for unction and chrism.

#### Friday Morning, February 20, 2015 - Morning Prayer

The Order for Morning Prayer was read in Trinity Church, Mobile, on Friday, February 20, 2015, at 8:00 am, with The Rt. Rev. James E. Waggoner, Jr., Bishop of Spokane and Convention Chaplain officiating. The lessons were read by Tim Gaston, St. Paul's, Mobile, and Chase Jackson, Diocesan Youth Representative, St. Paul's, Daphne.

#### Friday Morning, February 20, 2015 - First Business Session

The Convention was called into session at 8:44 am on Friday, February 20, 2015, in Trinity Church, Mobile, with the Bishop of the Diocese, The Rt. Rev. Philip M. Duncan, II, presiding. The Rev. S. Albert Kennington, Secretary of the last Diocesan Convention, reported the presence of a quorum: Of 165 certified lay delegates, 154 were registered and in attendance; of the 54 eligible clerical delegates, 49 were registered and in attendance. In accordance with Canon 6.1, the President nominated The Rev. Mr. Kennington, Priest-in-Charge, Immanuel, Bay Minette, to be Secretary of the Convention. The nominee was elected unanimously. The President appointed Scott Remington, Esq., St. Christopher's, Pensacola and Chancellor for Florida, and M. Kathleen Miller, Esq., St. Paul's, Mobile and Chancellor for Alabama, to be parliamentarians.

The Convention concurred with the Secretary's appointment of The Rev. Steven J.

Pankey, St. Paul's, Foley; Dwight Babcock, Christ Church, Pensacola, and Diocesan Administrator; and David R. Quittmeyer, Trinity, Mobile, to serve as assistant secretaries, in accordance with Canon 6.1.

The President reported that the Convention was organized for business.

Upon motion by Robert Howard, Trinity, Mobile, on behalf of the Committee on Credentials and Privileges, the Convention unanimously granted seat and voice in the Convention to the following:

Visiting bishop: The Rt. Rev. James E. Waggoner, Jr., Bishop of Spokane and Convention Chaplain.

Non-canonically resident clergy serving in the Diocese: The Rev. C. I. Jones, Bishop of Montana, retired; The Rev. John Coleman; The Rev. William Ericson; The Rev. Massey Gentry; The Rev. Maurice L. Goldsmith; The Rev. Beth Hoffman; The Rev. Ruth Lamonte; The Rev. David Luckett; The Rev. Deacon Allen Ruth.

Members of the Standing Committee: Michael Foote, St. Paul's, Magnolia Springs; Billy Jones, St. John's, Monroeville; David Quittmeyer, Trinity, Mobile; Anne Stevens, St. Paul's, Foley; and Gaye Wilson, St. Paul's, Daphne.

Members of the Diocesan staff: Dwight Babcock, Diocesan Administrator, Assistant Secretary/Assistant Treasurer; and James Lawrence, Diocese Youth Coordinator/Beckwith Summer Camp Director.

Members of Diocesan agencies: Sally Greene, Executive Director, Wilmer Hall; Eleanor Reeves, Interim Director, Beckwith Camp and Retreat Center; and Connie Anderson, Executive Director, Murray House.

Members of the Bishop Transition Committee: McGee Loren, St. Francis, Gulf Breeze, and Carolyn Jeffers, Christ Church Cathedral.

Other Convention visitors: Nancy Day, Interpreter for the Deaf; Diocesan seminarian Curtis Kennington (General Theological Seminary) Holy Spirit, Gulf Shores; D. G. Ewing, chair of the host parish convention committee; and Tim Op't Holt, St. Paul's, Daphne, chair of the host parish convention committee for 2016.

The Bishop published his nominations for General Officers, Architectural Consultants, members of the Standing Committee, Diocesan agency boards, commissions, committees and coordinators.

The following pre-filed nominations for members of the Standing Committee were received: in the lay order: Lynn Ferren, St. Patrick's, Panama City; Joe McDaniel, Jr., Christ Church, Pensacola; and George Barnes, St. Mary's, Andalusia; and in the clerical order: The Rev. James B. Flowers, All Saints', Mobile; and The Rev. Reid McCormick, St. Thomas', Greenville.

Nominations were made from the floor for members of the Standing Committee: in the lay order: Vincent Currie, Jr., Christ Church, Pensacola; James Johnson, St. Christopher's, Pensacola; and Melinda Henderson, St. Agatha's, DeFuniak Springs; and in the clerical order, The Rev. Walt Kindergan.

The President announced that he had referred to the Committee on Resolutions the two pre-filed resolutions on prison reform received from Wayne Verry, St. Paul's, Foley. (*Appendix III*) No resolutions were offered from the floor.

The Bishop advised the delegates that The Rev. Deacon Linda-Suzanne Borgen, St. Simon's, Fort Walton Beach, and chair of the Committee on Necrology, would receive names of persons who have died since the last Convention of this Diocese and who, in their lifetimes, served as delegates to any previous Conventions of this Diocese or who served as delegates from congregations now within this Diocese to Conventions of the dioceses of Alabama or Florida.

The Rev. Peter Wong, Nativity, Dothan, extended invitation for the 46<sup>th</sup> Annual Convention of the Diocese to meet February 23-25, 2017, in Nativity, Dothan. The

Bishop referred the invitation to the Committee on Next Conventions. The 45<sup>th</sup> Annual Convention of the Diocese will meet February 18-20, 2016, in St. Paul's, Daphne.

Dr. William Hamilton, St. Thomas, Greenville, and chair of the Committee on Canons and Rules of Order, reported that the committee had met on the previous afternoon to consider and propose Special Rules of Order for the Election of the IV Bishop of the Diocese. (*Appendix IV*) Copies of the proposed special rules were distributed to the delegates, and Dr. Hamilton read the proposed special rules aloud:

## PROPOSED SPECIAL RULES OF ORDER FOR THE ELECTION OF THE IV BISHOP OF THE DIOCESE

On the Saturday morning of the Convention, February 21, 2015, immediately following a Celebration of the Holy Eucharist, the Convention shall take up this Special Order of Business for the Election of the IV Bishop of the Diocese.

- 1. The Secretary shall determine that the quorum required in Article VII, Section 4, of the Articles of Incorporation is present, this being two-thirds of all clergy eligible and two-thirds of all lay delegates entitled to vote in Convention.
- 2. Designated seating shall be provided for clergy and lay delegates eligible to vote and shall be restricted for them, and also for the Chancellors, the Secretary, Assistant Secretaries, the Interpreter for the Deaf, and the Committee on Elections who serves as tellers of the voting.
- 3. Upon the Secretary reporting that the required quorum is present and that seating of voting delegates is in order, the President shall call upon the chair of the Bishop Search Committee who shall read the names of the nominees of the Search Committee. In so doing, the chair shall read only the name, canonical residence, and current ecclesiastical cure of each. These nominations shall require no seconds, and there shall be no discussion. No nominations from the floor will be in order. (Canon 26.2)
- 4. In accordance with regular order as provided by Canon 3.9, the clergy and lay voting delegates shall sit as one body. In accordance with Article VII.4, the vote shall be by orders (clergy and lay), by secret ballot, and a concurrent majority in both orders shall be necessary for an election.
- 5. There shall be separate electronic voting devices for the clergy and lay orders.
- 6. Before any vote, the President shall invite a senior, canonically resident priest to lead the Convention in prayer, after which, the Convention will keep silence while delegates vote as directed by the President.
- 7. The Committee on Elections, as previously appointed by the President, will serve as tellers to complete the count of the ballots. After each ballot, this Committee will report to the President the count of the ballots cast indicating for each order, clerical and lay, the total number of votes cast, the number needed for a majority, and the number of votes cast for each nominee.
  - a. The President will read aloud the report of the tellers to the Convention. If a nominee receives a majority of the votes in each order, the President shall declare this nominee to be elected.
    - b. The report of the tellers shall be posted by the Secretary

after each ballot in such a way as to be clearly visible to all delegates.

- c. If there is no election, members of the Transition Committee will be instructed by the President to call the nominees.
- 8. If no nominee receives a majority of the votes in both orders on a ballot, then, following announcement of the results of the ballot, time, not to exceed ten minutes, may be allowed for deliberation among the delegates.
- 9. The President shall call for subsequent ballots, as needed, following the procedure stated in Rule 5 above.
- 10. The name of a nominee shall be removed from subsequent ballots if the nominee either personally or through a representative, requests that his name be removed.
- 11. In the event of an election, the President shall appoint the President of the Standing Committee and the Chair of the Bishop Search Committee to notify the Bishop-elect of his election. After the Bishop-elect has accepted, members of the Bishop Transition Committee shall be appointed to inform the other candidates of the result of the election.
- 12. The President shall call for appropriate prayers to be offered, and the Testimonial of Election as provided in General Canon III.11.3 (a) shall be signed by a constitutional majority of the Convention.
- 13. In the event of no election at a reasonable hour, the Bishop, as President, shall announce a plan, previously agreed to by him and the Standing Committee, to recess the Convention and to call a recessed Convention to continue the voting.
- 14. This special order of business being concluded, the Convention will return to regular order.

Upon motion by Dr. Hamilton, the Special Rules of Order for the Election of the IV Bishop were unanimously adopted.

Dr. Hamilton then moved that a Special Order of Business for the Election of the IV Bishop of the Diocese be set for the next day, Saturday, February 21, 2015, following the morning celebration of the Holy Eucharist. The motion was adopted unanimously.

For the Committee on Finance, Michel Nicrosi, delegate from Trinity, Mobile, and Treasurer of the Diocese, on behalf of The Rev. John Riggin, chair of the Committee on Finance, reported that the committee met on the previous afternoon and submitted the following:

The Committee on Finance met after the open meeting on the budget on the previous afternoon and reviewed the proposed 2015 Diocesan Budget. The Committee unanimously recommends the adoption of the proposed 2015 Diocesan Budget as recommended by both the Commission on Finance and the Standing Committee.

The Committee also recommends that half of the collection received during this Convention be given for scholarships for children to attend summer camps at Beckwith and half to the new Wilmer Hall Thrift Shop in Mobile which is a new ministry in this community and a joint effort between Wilmer Hall and the Church of the Redeemer, Mobile.

Upon her motion, the Convention adopted both recommendations of the Committee on Finance.

After a short break, the Bishop recognized Eugene Johnston, St. John's, Mobile, and Diocesan Coordinator for Episcopal Relief and Development (ERD), who reported on the 75<sup>th</sup> anniversary of ERD.

Upon motion by The Rev. Mr. Pankey, the Convention agreed to suspend the regular rules of order and accept the following report which was previously scheduled for the afternoon session.

On behalf of the Committee on Resolutions, The Rev. Glenn Rohrer presented the following report:

The Convention Committee on Resolutions met on Thursday afternoon, February 19, to review the pre-filed resolutions found on pages 15 and 16 in the Convention second packet. As to pre-filed Resolution 1 regarding Prison Reform.

Whereas, the jurisdiction of the Diocese of the Central Gulf Coast spans the states of Alabama and Florida,

And Whereas, it was the intent for this resolution to encompass both the Alabama and Florida correctional facilities,

The Committee recommends that Resolution 1 be amended as follows, to include the State of Florida:

RESOLVED, that the 44th Annual Convention of the Episcopal Diocese of the Central Gulf Coast calls upon the Governors, the Attorneys General, the Commissioner of the Alabama Department of Corrections, the Secretary of the Florida Department of Corrections, and leaders of both houses of the legislatures of the State of Alabama and the State of Florida, to take necessary actions to end all forms of abuse in Alabama prisons and to uphold the fundamental dignity of every human being; and

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED, that this Resolution be conveyed to the officials of the State of Alabama and State of Florida named above; and

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED, that this Resolution be conveyed to the Episcopal Diocese of Alabama and the several Episcopal dioceses in the State of Florida urging them to take similar action with regard to the prisons in Alabama and Florida respectively.

As to pre-filed Resolution 2 regarding the Diocesan Cycle of Prayer for Prisons, the Committee recommends that the resolution be adopted as presented.

Upon his motion and after discussion, the Convention adopted the Committee's recommendations on both resolutions without objection.

The President called for the Convention to take a short break.

After reconvening, the Bishop filed by title the summary of his official acts and the official list of clergy. (*Appendix I*)

Upon motion duly made and seconded, the Convention voted to accept by title the reports of the General Officers, the Standing Committee, and the commissions, committees, and coordinators of the Diocese. (*Appendix II*). The Secretary read the list of reports which had not been received.

Sally Greene, Executive Director of Wilmer Hall added comments to her official report.

Eleanor Reeves, Interim Director of Beckwith Camp and Retreat Center added comments to the official report, including announcement of the new Christopher Currie Scholarship Fund established by Vincent and Dianne Currie in memory of their son. The purpose of this fund is to provide financial assistance to children and teenagers to attend summer camps.

James Laurence, Diocesan Youth Coordinator, added comments to his official report.

Dr. Melinda Henderson, Coordinator of the 5-Year Plan, added summary comments to her official report.

The Rev. Thomas Heard, Chair of the Murray House board, added comments to the official report.

Three Diocesan seminarians brought greetings from their seminaries and made additional remarks: Curtis Kennington, Holy Spirit, Gulf Shores (General Theological Seminary); The Rev. Deacon Ashley Freeman (Episcopal Theological Seminary of the Southwest); The Rev. Deacon David Green (School of Theology, The University of the South, Sewanee).

Announcements were made by the host rector concerning transportation to the luncheon for clergy spouses and also concerning lunch for delegates.

The Secretary made announcements concerning procedures for assembling for the election on Saturday and also concerning registration for delegates arriving during Convention.

The President presented to the Convention the following priests who have been ordained since the last Convention: The Rev. Walt Kindergan, now Curate of St. Christopher's, Pensacola; The Rev. Mary Alice Mathison, now Curate of St. Paul's, Daphne; and The Rev. Canon Dan Wagner, now Curate and Canon Pastor of Christ Church Cathedral, Mobile.

The President then presented the following transitional deacons: The Rev. Deacon Linda-Suzanne Borden, now serving at St. Simon's, Fort Walton Beach; The Rev. Deacon Ashley Freeman, Episcopal Theological Seminary of the Southwest; The Rev. Deacon David Green, School of Theology, The University of the South, Sewanee; and these *in absentia*: The Rev. Deacon Christie Hord, The Rev. Jeff Hual, and The Rev. Eric Mancil, all at Virginia Theological Seminary.

The President presented the following priests who have begun service in this Diocese since the last Convention: The Rev. Jeff Garner, Rector of Holy Spirit, Gulf Shores, *in absentia*; The Rev. Matt Dollhausen, Rector of St. Mary's, Milton (received from the Evangelical Lutheran Church in America); and these non-canonically resident priests: The Rev. Beth Hoffman, Priest-in-charge, St. Augustine's, Navarre, and The Rev. Maurice Goldsmith, Priest-in-charge, St. Christopher's, Pensacola.

The Rt. Rev. James E. Waggoner, Jr., Bishop of Spokane and Convention Chaplain, led Noonday Prayers after which the Rt. Rev. Philip M. Duncan, II, commissioned the missioners of the construction and medical teams going to the Diocese of the Dominican Republic March 6–15, 2015. Missioners present were The Rev. Thack Dyson, St. Paul's, Daphne; Ed Bosch, St. Paul's, Foley; Florence Crawford,

Trinity, Mobile; Geary Gaston, St. Paul's, Mobile; Elaine Reedy; Roger and Becky Vance, Trinity, Mobile; and Howard Wilson, St. Paul's, Daphne. After prayers, the Convention stood in recess at 11:16 am. Box lunches were served in the parish house of Trinity Church.

#### Friday afternoon, February 20, 2015 - Second Business Session

The Convention was called to order for the second business session in Trinity Church, Mobile, by the Bishop of the Diocese, at 1:31 pm on Friday, February 20, 2015.

The Bishop's nominees for General Officers, Architectural Consultants, members of the Standing Committee, Diocesan agency boards, commissions, and coordinators, as distributed to delegates on the previous evening, were unanimously elected. (See the Directory of the Diocese)

The President called for elections to the Standing Committee. After the first ballots were collected for counting, the Bishop of the Diocese made his official address to the Convention. (*Appendix I*) The delegates responded with a standing ovation.

After the Bishop's address and before the results of the first ballot were announced, Parliamentarian Kathy Miller made the following motion which was adopted unanimously:

If, after the second ballot, all open positions are not filled by majority vote, then on the third and next succeeding ballots, there shall be retained only twice the number of nominees as there are unfilled positions, said nominees to be taken from those receiving the highest number of votes, until, by majority vote, a nominee is election.

Elected to the Standing Committee in the lay order, on the first ballot, were Vincent Currie, Jr., and Lynn Ferren. Elected in the clerical order, on the second ballot, was The Rev. Reid McCormick.

The President then recognized McGee Loren, St. Francis', Gulf Breeze, who, on behalf of the Transition Committee, announced that two farewell events are planned for the Bishop and Mrs. Duncan: May 10, 2015, at Holy Nativity, Panama City, and on May 17, 2015, at Redeemer, Mobile. Then, to the Bishop's surprise, she read a poem commemorating his tenure as III Bishop of the Diocese. Following her reading, Dwight Babcock, Christ Church, Pensacola, on behalf of the Diocesan staff, presented the Bishop with a gift of a windbreaker jacket with the seal of the Diocese. For these presentations, Mrs. Duncan was seated beside her husband. The presentations were concluded with a standing ovation.

The Rev. Thack Dyson, St. Paul's, Daphne, reminded the Convention of the invitation to his parish, accepted by the previous Convention, for the 45<sup>th</sup> Annual Convention to meet February 18–20, 2015. Upon motion, the Convention unanimously accepted the invitation extended in the morning session by the Rev. Peter Wong for the 46<sup>th</sup> Annual Convention to meet in Nativity, Dothan, February 23–25, 2017.

After announcements by the Secretary regarding voting procedures in the next day's election of the IV Bishop, and announcements by the host rector concerning the evening gala, the Bishop called upon the Rt. Rev. James E. Waggoner, Jr., Bishop of Spokane and Convention Chaplain to lead prayers for the early evening.

Following prayers, the Convention stood in recess at 3:05 pm

#### Friday evening, February 20, 2015 - Convention Gala

Convention delegates, alternates and visitors enjoyed cocktails, dinner, and dancing at the Alabama Cruise Terminal beginning at 6:30 pm.

### Saturday morning, February 21, 2015 – Holy Eucharist

The Bishop of the Diocese, the Rt. Rev. Philip M. Duncan, II, celebrated the Holy

Eucharist at 8:00 am on Saturday, February 21, 2015, in Trinity Church, Mobile. He was the preacher for this service. Assisting in the sanctuary were The Rt. Rev. James E. Waggoner, Jr., Bishop of Spokane and Convention Chaplain; The Rev. Bailey Norman, rector of the host parish; The Rev. Walt Kindergan, St. Christopher's, Pensacola; The Rev. Deacon Laura Kelson, St. Francis, Gulf Breeze; and The Rev. Deacon Terry Goff, Trinity, Mobile.

The Rev. Deacon Linda-Suzanne Borgen, St. Simon's, Fort Walton Beach, led the prayers of the people which included intercessions for clergy and lay persons who departed this life since the previous Convention, and who, in their lifetimes served as delegates to a Convention of this diocese or to the Diocese of Alabama or Diocese of Florida prior to 1970: The Rev. Ashmun Brown, St. Agatha's, DeFuniak Springs; The Rev. Herbert Vandort, St. Cyprian's, Pensacola; The Rev. John C. Miller, St. John the Evangelist, Robertsdale; The Rev. Mark Wilson, St. James', Fairhope; The Rev. Coleman Inge, St. Luke's, Mobile, and St. Paul's, Foley; Claude S. Swift, St. John's, Monroeville; Bo Haslbauer, St. John's, Monroeville; Jane Foard, St. Francis, Gulf Breeze; Bill King, St. Francis, Gulf Breeze; and Roger Palmer, St. Francis, Gulf Breeze.

The lessons were read by Britt Landrum, Holy Cross, Pensacola, and chair of the Bishop Search Committee, and by Christian Kennedy-Milligan, Diocesan Youth Representative, Good Shepherd, Mobile, and Sally Greene, St. Paul's, Mobile, and Executive Director of Wilmer Hall, and Adelaide Babcock, Christ Church, Pensacola. Acolytes and ushers were members of the host parish. Music was led by the choir of the host parish under the direction of Kevin Davis, organist-choirmaster.

At the end of the service, all members of the congregation left the church so that it could be prepared for the election of the IV Bishop.

#### Saturday morning, February 21, 2015 – Fourth Business Session Election of the IV Bishop of the Diocese

The Convention was called to order at 10:25 am on Saturday, February 21, 2015 in Trinity Church, Mobile, with the Bishop of the Diocese, The Rt. Rev. Philip M. Duncan, II, presiding. The Convention took up the special order of business adopted the previous day, this being the election of the IV Bishop of the Diocese, and for this special order, the Convention proceeded in accordance with the Special Rules of Order adopted the previous day.

The Secretary reported the presence of a quorum as required by Article VII.4 of the Articles of Incorporation, this being two-thirds of all clergy and lay delegates eligible to vote. Of 165 certified lay delegates, 160\* were registered and present. Of 54 clergy entitled to vote, 53 were registered and present. (\*The correct number, after the Secretary's report and all late registrations were recorded, before the first ballot, was 163.)

Britt Landrum, Holy Cross, Pensacola, and chair of the Bishop Search Committee, read the nominations of the Committee chosen in accordance with the provision of Canon 26:

The Rev. James Russell Kendrick

Rector, St. Stephen's Church, Birmingham, Alabama, Diocese of Alabama The Very Reverend Edward F. O'Connor

Dean, St. Andrew's Cathedral, Jackson, Mississippi, Diocese of Mississippi The Rev. D. William C. Treadwell, III

Rector, St. Paul's Church, Waco, Texas, Diocese of Texas.

(The Rev. Canon E. Daniel Smith, Canon to the Ordinary, Diocese of

Missouri, withdrew from nomination before the Convention.)

The President called upon the Convention Chaplain to lead the Convention in the Baptismal Covenant and prayer. Before voting on each ballot began, the President called upon the following priests for prayers: The Rev. L. Robert Graves, St. Dismas, Atmore, before the first ballot; The Rev. Mary Robert, All Saints, Mobile, before the second ballot; and The Rev. Jerry Huft, St. John's, Wewahitchka, before the third ballot.

Voting on the first ballot began at 10:44 am and balloting continued as follows:

11:28 am – Voting on ballot one was closed.

11:31 am – The President reported no election.

11:46 am – Voting on ballot two began.

12:13 pm – Voting on ballot two was closed.

12:15 pm – The President reported no election.

 $12:36\ pm$  – The President reported that The Very Rev. Edward F. O'Connor, withdrew from the election.

12:38 pm - Voting on ballot three began.

At 1:08 pm, after the result of the third ballot was reported, the President declared that The Rev. James Russell Kendrick was elected having received a majority vote in both orders. (Returns of all ballots shown in Appendix IV.)

The President directed The Rev. George Riggall, President of the Standing Committee, and Britt Landrum, chair of the Bishop Search Committee, to inform the Rev. Mr. Kendrick of his election. Within a few minutes, they reported to the President the he had accepted his election whereupon all present stood and sang the Long Meter Doxology to *Old Hundredth* and the *Gloria in excelsis* (Robert Powell setting).

The Secretary read the Testimonial of Election required by Title III, Canon 11, of the Canons of The Episcopal Church and informed delegates the Testimonial was at the Secretary's table for their signatures.

At 1:22 pm, the Special Order of Business being concluded, the Convention returned to regular order.

The Parliamentarian informed the President that there was no further business before the Convention.

At 1:24 pm, after prayer, the President declared the Convention adjourned sine die.

## Appendix I BISHOP'S ADDRESS

+Bishop's Address at the Forty-fourth Diocesan Convention+ The Diocese of the Central Gulf Coast 20 February 2015, Friday Afternoon Trinity Church, Mobile, Alabama

"Do not be conformed to this world, but be transformed by the renewing of your minds . . ."

I begin today sharing with you from a series of mystery novels set in the Southwest and its major character. We might call him by various names. We could call him a medicine man, a witch doctor, a shaman. Some might use the term "seer". Some might even call him a priest.

But in Jim Chee's world, the world created by author Tony Hillerman set on the Big Rez that encompasses the ancestral worlds of the Navajo and Zuni in the Four Corners region of the American Southwest, Jim Chee is not just a Tribal Police Sergeant, he is a "ha ta li", a Singer of the Dineh, a Singer of the People.

I find the Hillerman novels fascinating not just for the mysteries or even the indigenous settings; I find them fascinating because Hillerman has a singular perspective that drives all of his Native American characters. Hillerman portrays a world inhabited by heroes and villains and just plain citizens whose actions are predicated, whether consciously or not, upon their religious world view. They always...always...act within the context of cult and culture. Sin and evil and goodness and peace, insofar as they increase or diminish, are the results of those attributes and harmonies.

Imagine that! Think about the implications, the possibilities, the challenge to a world dominated by news cycles of violence and chaos. Even better, imagine a theoretical world in which our behavior reflects our best religious values rather than institutionalizing our most demeaning cultural prejudices.

Former Yale University Chaplain and one time Pastor of Riverside Church in New York City, The Rev. William Sloan Coffin said, "The Church is full of people who are seeking that which they have already found, and only want to become that which they already are. That is one of the greatest problems we have in the Church." In other words, we have become content with a Church that blesses, but become angry or anxious or embittered with a Gospel that challenges. We see a Gospel of compassion to others as a Gospel of restraint upon ourselves. However, this is not unique to our time, to our place, to our Diocese.

In the late 50's and early 60's, an interdenominational Protestant group, including The Rev. George Weber, an Episcopal priest, formed the East Harlem Protestant Parish. In his book on that movement, GOD'S COLONY IN MAN'S WORLD, Weber offers observations similar to William Sloan Coffin's.

"From our heritage we are aware that the forms and institutions which men create in response to the Gospel quickly take on their own patterns of sinfulness, which make them less than full instruments by which the mission of the church may be fulfilled...The gospel is the same yesterday, today, and forever... (but)... the failure of the gospel to gain a hearing in the inner city and the too easy acceptance of its message by the churches in suburbia, both point to the failure of the church to take seriously the radical nature of the gospel."

"A gospel which turns life upside down and demands that we make every human loyalty subsidiary to our allegiance to Jesus Christ, flies dead in the face of everything that men naturally find acceptable. When men too readily accept the gospel, when our churches are accepted as a good thing for the American way of life, are these not warning signals that the forms by which we are carrying on our Christian life have lost the power to contain the gospel?"

"The once strong wineskins by which American Protestantism expressed its life, have grown old and obsolete without our noticing that at many points, they have sprung subtle leaks or even split wide open."

"We have forgotten that mission is the task of the church wherever it finds itself: a quote from 1 Peter 4:17 'The time has come for judgement to begin with the household of God.'"

We observe and honor Black History month. Fifty years after the Edmund Pettus Bridge the message still stings our conscience. Dr. King said then and we need to hear it now: "(But) the judgement of God is upon the churches as never before. If today's church does not recapture the sacrificial spirit of the early church, it will lose its' authenticity, forfeit the loyalty of millions, and be dismissed as an irrelevant social club with no meaning, no meaning for the Twentieth Century."

We are over 2,000 years into the Christian epic and experience. More than 2,000 years! Yet it seems that, while what the Greeks would have called the "accidents" of our world have changed, the nature, the "Real" has not changed. In many ways, all of the problems the Church faces now are the same we faced in our first 500 years. We may not have the full descriptions of ecclesiastical language:...Donatism, Docetism, Marcionism, or the Quatrodecimian Controversy, nonetheless they are real. Above all, we still struggle with the relationship of the Church as an institution to the culture in which we exist.

It has been our cultures' problems which we have found to be convenient excuses, and brand them as the real problems. We cannot grow because of the economy; we cannot proclaim the Gospel with power and conviction because of the oil spill and why can't we get some of that BP money? We cannot speak to issues of justice and mercy because our country is politically divided; we cannot offend; we cannot risk... We are dominated by our fears on the one hand and our desperate need to conform on the other. It is not Christ and Culture, it is Christ as long as He agrees with our lifestyle, as long as He drinks our kind of wine.

How do we define ourselves? How do we define who we are? By ethnicity, gender, political affiliation, sexuality? Do we define ourselves by football loyalties, by Starbucks' Grande or Vente? Do we define ourselves by nationality, occupation, family

order? Do we define ourselves by our faith, our congregation, our denomination, our communion?

The better question is: How do others define us? From a Letter to Diognetus written by Clement, Bishop of Rome in the second century, we are reminded: "Christians are not different from the rest of men in nationality, speech, or customs; they do not live in states of their own, nor do they use a special language, nor adopt a particular way of life....Whether fortune has given them a home in a Greek or foreign city, they follow local customs in their matter of dress, food, and way of life; yet the character of the culture they reveal is marvelous and it must be, admitted, unusual. They live, each in his native land, but as though they were not really at home there.

They share in all duties like citizens and suffer all hardships like strangers. Every foreign land is for them a fatherland and every fatherland a foreign land. They marry like the rest of men and beget children, but they do not abandon the babies that are born. They share a common board but not a common bed. They dwell on earth but they are citizens of heaven. They obey the laws that men make but are better than the laws. They lack all things, and yet in all things they abound.

In a word, what the soul is to the body Christians are to the world. So Christians live in the world, but they are not of the world. So Christians sojourn among perishable things, but their souls are set on immortality in heaven. So, when Christians are persecuted, their numbers daily increase. Such is the assignment to which God has called them, and they have no right to shirk it."

Clement says nothing about the down economy or competition from other faith groups or the increasing secularization of the Empire. He says that Christians live in the world, but are better than the world.

Could any of the things Clement writes to Diognetus be said about us? Would Sergeant Jim Chee find us innocent or guilty? What would Dr. King find changed?

At one point in his story, THE BLESSING WAY, Singer, Sergeant, Shaman Jim Chee's crime investigation leads him to consult his mentor and teacher, Sam Nakai. Sam Nakai says to Jim, "When you are a young man, you do not know where the path will take you. When you are an old man, you look back at your tracks in the sand and see where you stepped off the path and where you have stayed straight."

Doubtless, I have stepped off that path many, many times. Doubtless, we all have. The straight path is lightly trod. I tell the story not to use this time to reflect upon my Episcopacy. I tell it to help us all remember.

At least for a moment, allow me the privilege to look back at the tracks in the sand. Allow me the privilege of honoring those who walked that path.

I honor **The Rev. Ashmun Morris Brown**. (silence)
I give thanks for the life of **The Rev. Dr. Herbert John Vandort**. (silence)
I cherish the memory of **The Rev. John (Jack) Clement Miller**. (silence)
I hold in my heart prayers for the rest of **The Rev. Mark H. Wilson**. (silence)
I pray for the gracious soul of **The Rev. Frances Coleman Inge**. (silence)

We thank them all for their faithfulness along the path of Jesus Christ.

I remember the children's song about The Church, perhaps you do too.

"I am the church. You are the church. We are the church together.

All who follow Jesus all around the world.

Yes, we are the church together.

The church is not a building. The church is not a steeple.

The church is not a resting place. The church is the people.

I am the church. You are the church. We are the church together.

All who follow Jesus all around the world. Yes, we are the church together."

We are to be Church that is why we are here. That is why we are listening, sharing, praying, learning, studying, seeking and soon will be voting! It is a process, often a messy process, a holy process centered in Christ seeking God's will.

"Do not be conformed to this world, but be transformed through the power of your mind, that you may prove what is the will of God, what is good and acceptable and perfect."

And then St. Paul goes on to describe what a transformed Christian world might look like, what a transformed Christian mind might believe, what a transformed Christian culture might honor, what a transformed Christian life might offer. An appreciation of our individual gifts as they serve the Body that is Christ's. +Acting with mercy and cheerfulness. +Holding fast to what is good, letting our love be genuine, rejoicing in hope, contributing to the needs of the saints. +Blessing not cursing, weeping and rejoicing. +Living in harmony with one another.

"Not, not, not", being overcome by evil, but overcoming evil with good. In other words, being not conformed to this world. In other words, believing that our religious world view, our faith, if you will, can determine the boundaries and context of our lives. In other words, refusing to wrap ourselves in excuses and blame, choosing instead the transformation into hope and expectation.

I know the temptation for us to put things in little boxes - I know that temptation! (Some of us remember the song that told us the little boxes are all made out of tickietackie).

I know the temptation to find security in our separate and distinct categories. I know the temptation to live in certainty rather than possibility. I also suspect, however, that St. Paul and Sam Nakai and St. Clement and Jim Chee all are expressing their similar quest for the Holy. And it is the quest for the Holy that is our task this day. A Holy moment. A Holy life. A Holy Church. A Holy Diocese. A Holy election.

I have looked back at those tracks in the sandy path. I own them. I rejoice in them. They have been Holy. Thank you for them.

It is now time, however, for another to step forward and continue the journey. And it is time for him to gather his companions around him, time for his companions to share the path. Indeed, keeping to the path is the call of Jesus, and it is directed to all of us.

There are other things you have to do this day other than listen to me. There are other things I have to do today, as well. And now the thing I have to do is tell you one last story.

It is one of those "preachers' stories" that people like me collect from time to time. It is a tale told over generations in many settings and denominations. It is not even a particularly Christian story.

Once upon a time...once upon a time....because that is the way all such stories start...in a land far, far away..."In the beginning"...In another time and in another place.....Once upon a time there was an old man who lived on the edge of the forest. He was the shaman, the medicine man, the Sam Nakai, the Singer, the "ha ta li." Amongst the people of the surrounding village it was said that the old man knew everything, that he always had the answer, and he was never wrong. Clearly he was not an Episcopal Bishop!

One day two boys, as boys will by luck and sometimes a banal evil, captured a bird. The one said to the other. "This is what we will do. We will cup the bird in our hands and take him to the old man at the edge of the forrest."

"We will say, 'Old man, old man, tell us if you can; Is the bird we hold in our hands...is the bird in our hands...is it dead or is it alive?"

"If the old man says, 'It is dead, then we will open our hands and show that the bird lives. If he says, 'It is alive,' then we will close our hands and crush it to death."

You think that what we are to do this Convention is to put the life of this Diocese into the hands of another, into the hands of a new Bishop. That is true...but it's only partially true - just a little bit. There is a fuller Truth. Even now I will reveal it to you:

### The bird is in your hands! The bird is in your hands!

Yours!....Your hands! In Andalusia.... In Wewahitchka....in Atmore....in Navarre and Dothan and DeFuniak and Crestview. All of you! All of you! The bird is in your hands!

I ask you: Do your old men still dream dreams and do your young women see visions? Do your young men still prophesy and your old women utter wisdom? Are you content with conformity? Do you believe in transformation? The life of this diocese is in your hands. Is it alive?...or is it dead?

I am particularly grateful for the able help and friendship of Vincent Currie, Jr., who, among his other duties as Diocesan Administrator, served as Assistant Secretary for over thirty Diocesan conventions.

## REPORT OF THE TREASURER/COMMISSION ON FINANCE

In 2014, income received (\$1,026,828) from parishes and missions fell short by \$46,740 (4.35%) from the amount pledged; total revenue (\$1,215,716) ended down by \$38,385 (3%). On the expense side, the Diocese ended the year under budget by \$20,171. The primary cost savings came from reduced costs for seminarians, the Coastline/communications, salary and pension for financial secretary, and the budgeted new hire position which was not filled. The Diocese incurred additional costs due to the search process for the 4th Bishop, the overlap in the Diocesan administrator position along with the retirement bonus paid to the outgoing administrator, the addition of a canon to the ordinary position, and increases in workers compensation insurance.

The Diocese ended the 2014 budget year with a deficit of \$19,779 against a projected deficit of \$1,565. The deficit was a direct result of the fact that parish pledges were not paid in full. Forty-two percent of the parishes in the Diocese (26) failed to pay their pledges in full for 2014. Fifteen parishes (24%) paid more than they pledged. Without these extra pledge payments and the cost savings from the expense side, the Diocese's deficit would have been just under sixty thousand (\$59,825). Notwithstanding these challenges, the Diocese remained a lean, efficient operation with a staff that worked very hard to be good stewards of Diocesan resources.

The Commission on Finance met quarterly during 2014. In addition to its work with the Diocesan budget and operations, the Commission began a review of the Diocese's portfolio managed by State Street Global Advisors with the view of possible restructuring of the Diocese's investments to maximize returns. The Commission will continue with this review in 2015 and make a recommendation to the Standing Committee. The Commission also began gathering information to help establish a program at the Diocesan level to assist parishes in the establishment of Legacy Societies to support parishes for the long term. This project will be ongoing in 2015 and will be assisted by The Episcopal Church Foundation.

Through its work, the Commission noted that pledging towards the Diocese has trended downward since 2004. In the last ten years, annual pledges decreased from approximately \$1.7 million to just over \$1 million. For the 2015 budget year, the pledges received as of the date of this report total \$984,581.

The 2015 budget projects a deficit of \$15,859. Highlights from the 2015 budget include: the Bishop's salary decreased from \$150,000 to \$120,000 effective January 2015. In June, the salary of the Bishop and the Bishop-Elect increases to \$135,000. There will be a salary overlap for two months (June and July) with both the Bishop and the Bishop Elect on staff. The Bishop's travel expense budget increased from \$10,000 to \$15,000 for the 2015 year. Salaries in the Diocesan office were increased for merit/cost of living (but still remain low). The total budgeted for Diocesan staff salaries/pensions (excluding bishops) is \$20,000 less than the amount budgeted in 2014. The salary for the Diocesan administrator reflects a change from a part-time to a full-time position. The Coordinator for Youth Ministry expenses, which are covered 50% by Beckwith Camp and Retreat Center and 50% by the Diocese, will be administered through the Diocesan office in 2015. This arrangement provides for administrative and medical savings to both Beckwith and the Diocese. The medical and life insurance budget items are based on premium increases and the overlap with the bishops. The budgeted amount for internal audit was increased to account for additional audit activities due to the change in the Episcopacy.

## REPORT OF THE STANDING COMMITTEE

What follows is a summary of the activities of the Standing Committee over the past year. As a summary, this report is not meant as a record of our proceedings. (Recordings of proceedings are the Standing Committee meeting minutes, retained in the Diocesan Office.) Rather, we wish to give an overview of our work on behalf of the people of this Diocese and thank them for their trust in our efforts.

### Meeting of February 22, 2014

The Standing Committee convened at the close of the forty-third Annual Convention of the Diocese of the Central Gulf Coast on February 22, 2014, at St. Christopher's Church, Pensacola.

Outgoing President, Tim Gaston, introduced Dr. Bill Hamilton, St. Thomas, Greenville; Ms. Anne Talbert Stevens, St. Paul's, Foley; The Rev. Thack Dyson, St. Paul's, Daphne:

and the Rev. Neal Goldsborough, Christ Church, Pensacola. Mr. Billy Jones, St. John's, Monroeville, was not present. The Committee then proceeded to elect the Rev. Eric Long as President, and Dr. Samuel Shelton as Secretary.

The Committee ratified its January 31, 2014 email action to designate \$70,000 of Bishop Duncan's 2014 as housing allowance under Section 107 of the Internal Revenue Code. The Committee also ratified its February 7, 2014 email action to amend the proposed 2014 budget by increasing income by \$2,000, and raising the Bishop's secretary's salary by \$809 plus appropriate pension and tax adjustments.

The Committee elected the Bishop's nominees Mr. Joe McDaniel, Christ Church, Pensacola, and the Rev. John Riggin, St. Paul's, Mobile to the Commission on Finance.

The Committee designated the 2015 Annual Convention of the Diocese as the Electing Convention for the 4th bishop of the Diocese.

## Meeting of April 29, 2014

The Standing Committee met at Christ Church, Pensacola, and the Rev. Eric Long presided. Much of the business at this meeting concerned funding the process of searching for and electing a new bishop. Details can be found in the minutes of the meeting which are on file in the Diocesan office.

Other business:

- Approved St. Mary's, Andalusia, borrowing \$100,000 to finance much needed building repairs
- Approved renewing a note for St. Mary's, Coden, for repairs made to buildings after Hurricane Katrina. The loan balance is \$141,363
- Considered the request of St. Peter's, Bon Secour, to sell its rectory. The
  Committee did not take any action on the request but referred it to the
  Commission on Finance and the Bishop for further review and
  recommendations

### Meeting of May 14, 2014

The Standing Committee gathered at the Diocesan Office, Pensacola, and the Rev. Eric Long presided. President Long explained the purpose of the meeting was to discuss staff changes at the Diocesan Office.

- The resignation of Jennifer Barnard as Financial Secretary
- The announcement by Vince Currie of his resignation effective July 1.

President Long asked the Bishop to provide the Committee with an appraisal of the effects of these personnel changes. The narrative of the Bishop's remarks are in the meeting minutes.

Bishop Duncan also announced his intention to add a part-time Canon to the Ordinary to his staff at a cost of \$1,000 per month. This is a temporary position.

### Meeting of July 29, 2014

The Standing Committee convened at the Diocesan Office and the Bishop presided at a celebration of the Holy Eucharist.

The first order of business was to elect a new Standing Committee President to replace the Rev. Eric Long, who had accepted a call to be rector of St. John's, Roanoke, Virginia. The Rev. George Riggall was nominated and unanimously elected.

The second order of business was to fill two other vacancies on the Standing Committee necessitated by the Rev. Frank Cooper's retirement and Fr. Long's resignation. After much discussion, the Bishop nominee, the Rev. Tommy Dwyer and the Rev. Jim Flowers were elected to fill the unexpired terms of Fr. Cooper and Fr. Long, respectively.

The Bishop announced the appointment of the Rev. B. Massey Gentry as part-time Canon to the Ordinary.

The Committee approved the recommendation of the Commission on Finance to permit St. Peter's, Bon Secour, to sell its rectory. The principal fund would be retained and the interest utilized to help support a part-time priest.

The Committee ratified the following actions taken by email:

- The Rev. Brian Richard Seage to be Bishop Coadjutor of the Diocese of Mississippi
- The Rev. Canon Heather Cook to be Bishop Suffragan of the Diocese of Maryland
- The Rev. Alan M. Gates to be Bishop Diocesan of the Diocese of Massachusetts

The Committee also ratified and obtained signatures for the following actions taken by email on June 12, 2014:

- The Rev. Walter Bradford Kindergan and the Rev. Mary Alice Mathison as transitional deacons to be ordained priests
- Linda Suzanne Cecelia Borgen, Ashley Burton Freeman, David Keith Green, Christine Danielle Hord, Jeffrey Charles Hual, and Eric Nathan Mancil as Postulants for Holy Orders

The Committee also unanimously consented to the election of the Rev. Robert Stuart Skirving as Bishop Diocesan of the Diocese of East Carolina

Dwight Babcock provided a report of his activities after having served his first month as Diocesan Administrator.

### Meeting of October 14, 2014

The Standing Committee met at St. Thomas, Greenville beginning with the Holy Eucharist at which the Rev. Reid McCormack, Rector of St. Thomas, presided.

The Chair of the Bishop Transition Committee, Carolyn Jeffers, Christ Church Cathedral, presented a detailed update of the Transition Committee's work-to-date. Details of her report, including a description of the activities planned for the Diocesan Walkabout in January, 2015, are in the meeting minutes.

The Committee approved the sale of a piece of property by St. James, Eufala. Dwight Babcock, Diocesan Administrator, explained updates and revisions to the diocesan medical plan and group life insurance.

## Meeting of December 3, 2014

The Standing Committee met in a joint session with the Bishop Search Committee at Wilmer Hall Children's Home, Mobile. President George Riggall presided at the Holy Eucharist and the Rev. John Riggin was preacher.

The convened committees went into executive session for about forty-five minutes. When the regular session resumed members of the Bishop Transition Committee and other guests were invited into the room. President Riggall announced the Standing Committee had unanimously voted to accept the four candidates the Search Committee had nominated. He then went on to announce the names of the candidates and to thank the Search Committee for its hard and good work.

President Riggall asked Mr. Scott Remington, Chancellor, to discuss the Petition Process for the Election of a Bishop. At the conclusion of Mr. Remington's presentation, the President announced the period to present petition candidates was open and would remain open for the next five business days, ending at 5 P.M. on December 11.

The President and Mr. Britt Landrum contacted the nominees to confirm their status. All nominees agreed to be placed on the ballot.

Ms. Carolyn Jeffers, Chair of the Bishop Transition Committee updated all present on the upcoming events and milestones in the process leading to the election on February 23, 2015.

The Committee consented to the election of the Rt. Rev. David Mitchell Reed as Bishop Coadjutor of the Diocese of West Texas.

## Meeting of February 4, 2015

The Committee gathered at All Saints' Church, Mobile, preceded be a celebration of the Holy Eucharist, the Rev. Jim Flowers, presiding.

The Treasurer of the Diocese, Ms. Michel Nicrosi, assisted by the Diocesan Administrator, Dwight Babcock, gave a detailed explanation of the financial situation of the Diocese. She then presented the proposed Diocesan budget for 2015.

The proposed budget had a small deficit but Ms. Nicrosi believed the deficit could be overcome with a small increase in giving from congregations in 2015. The budget set the new Bishop's salary at \$135,000 per year and included very modest adjustments for Diocesan staff members. After thoughtful discussion the Standing Committee unanimously approved sending the budget to the Convention.

The Rev. Albert Kennington, Secretary of the Convention, was invited to explain the special rules of order for the election portion of the Convention, including the voting process. Fr. Kennington's presentation was well received and he answered several pertinent questions from Standing Committee members.

Ms. Carolyn Jeffers gave an update on the logistics of the Convention. Her committee members were all very engaged in preparing for the convention as well as the continuing work of the Transition Committee through the Ordination of the new Bishop in July.

## **Concluding Remarks**

This past year has been challenging and exciting for the people of the Diocese. We believe that we, the members of the Standing Committee, have worked hard to be faithful to the tasks entrusted to us. We all look forward to the future with hope and joy.

We thank our retiring Bishop, Philip Duncan, for his faithful ministry among us and we wish Bishop and Mrs. Duncan peace and happiness in their retirement years in Texas.

We also note with gratitude the ministry of Mr. Vincent Currie for his thirty-five year ministry in the post of Diocesan Administrator. One of his many duties as Diocesan Administrator was to serve as Recording Secretary of the Standing Committee. We send Vince and Dianne all our best in their retirement.

## REPORT OF THE COMMISSION ON MINISTRY

The Commission on Ministry has two primary responsibilities. The first is to assist individuals in their response to God's call to ministry. In particular, the Commission seeks to support those who are discerning a call to ordained ministry. The second responsibility is to advise the Bishop, when requested, in matters concerning discernment and formation.

## **COM Mission Statement**

The COM seeks to prayerfully ascertain, discriminate, and discern a sense of God's call in a person's life and in the life of the church for his/her lay or ordained vocation and ministry. The Commission on Ministry will

-be a resource for aspirants for ordination

-be an advisor to the bishop concerning aspirants, postulants, and candidates

-be a shepherd and advocate for those being prepared for ordination, providing pastoral care and guidance on an individual basis -assist the bishop in developing and furthering continuing education for the clergy of the diocese.

In this diocese, individuals called to ordained ministry may follow one of two separate paths. One path is for those who are called to the Priesthood. In general, this process includes a period of seminary education. At present, seminarians from this diocese are enrolled at the Seminary of the Southwest, the University of the South, Virginia Theological Seminary and Church Divinity School of the Pacific.

In addition to those currently attending seminary, two (2) individuals from this diocese were approved as Postulants. Those approved will begin Seminary in the Fall of 2015. Our six (6) senior seminarians were ordained to the Transitional Diaconate in November 2014. Of our two (2) Transitional Deacon's, one (1) was ordained in July of 2014 and the other was ordained in August of 2014.

The other pathway to ordination is the Diocesan School for Deacons. The School, under the direction of the Bishop and supervised by the Commission, was established in 2008. This program of formation prepares persons who are called to be Vocational Deacons. The process includes a period of discernment and at least 24 months of instruction. A second Deacon's School class began in January of 2012. There were two (2) individuals in attendance who graduated in December 2013 and were ordained at the 2014 Diocesan Convention. The next class is scheduled to begin in January 2016.

Discernment for those called to the Priesthood and for those called to the Diaconate requires participation by many from the community, as the individuals prayerfully seek God's direction for their lives. The Commission is grateful for the willingness of so many within this diocese to support and assist those who are examining their call to ordained ministry.

This year we celebrated the ninth anniversary of Christ Church, Mobile being named the cathedral of the Diocese of the Central Gulf Coast. We continue to grow into our mission.

Bishop Duncan served as celebrant at Christ Church Cathedral on Ash Wednesday and Easter Sunday and during the Ninth Annual Cathedral Celebration on Sunday, May 11. Bishop Duncan and Kathy continue to enjoy being in residence in their apartment at Christ Church Cathedral throughout the year.

We said goodbye to longtime Cathedral Organist/Choirmaster Peggy Lyden in May. During the summer Adam King served as our interim organist and choir master until Christopher Powell joined the staff in August.

In the summer The Reverend Daniel Andrew Wagner joined the Cathedral staff as Deacon. He graduated from the Seminary at the University of the South at Sewanee in June and was ordained to the Transitional Diaconate in the Diocese of Upper South Carolina. He was ordained to the priesthood at Christ Church Cathedral, Mobile on January 10, 2015, by Bishop Duncan on behalf of Bishop Waldo of the Diocese of Upper South Carolina. Bishop Duncan has named him Canon Pastor to the Cathedral.

Six seminarians were ordinated to the Diaconate on Saturday, November 22. Bishop Duncan was the Celebrant. The preacher was The Right Reverend James Louis Jelinek, Eighth Bishop, Episcopal Diocese of Minnesota, retired. The ordinands were Linda Suzanne Cecelia Borgen, Ashley Burton Freeman, David Keith Green, Christine Danielle Hord, Jeffrey Charles Hual, and Eric Nathan Mancil. David Brady chaired the Commission for Disaster Preparedness and Response.

As we continue to grow into our ministry as Cathedral, it remains a joy for us as we serve the diocese.

### REPORT OF THE BECKWITH BOARD OF DIRECTORS

It's a beautiful day at Beckwith Camp and Retreat Center! In fact, life is always beautiful at Beckwith, and 2014 was no exception. We are grateful to God and to our supporters in the Diocese of the Central Gulf Coast that we are able to continue to do ministry on the shores of Week's Bay.

Our Retreat business ran ahead of budget for the first time in several years. We were able to share this beautiful place with folks from Credo, Airbus, the Road's Scholar Program at the University of South Alabama, and public and private schools from all over Alabama. Summer Camp was, by every measure, a great success. With continuity in the position of Summer Camp Director, early marketing, and plans for two sailing camps, we anticipate that the 2015 Summer Camp Session will allow even more young people the chance to get away and come together.

In August, we said good-bye to the Rev. Canon Massey Gentry who had served as our Executive Director since 2010. We are grateful for Massey's leadership during some very challenging years. In thanksgiving for his work among us, the Beckwith Board purchased a rocking chair that sits on the porch of Wilson Hall. There will always be a place for Massey in the heart of Beckwith. The transition was made seamless with the appointment of Eleanor Reeves as Interim Executive Director. Eleanor led Beckwith capably in the second half of 2014 and we appreciate her willingness to work with the Board as we plan for the future.

Part of that future involves a realignment of the staff under an Operations Manager. Beth Beery, joined the staff effective January 5, 2015, and is beginning to flesh out what this new operational style looks like. Though she most recently lived in Atlanta, Beth hails from the Gulf Coast is we're glad she's back at sea level and on our team

Beckwith still has a long way to go toward financial stability. Service on our debt, which currently stands at more than \$1.3 million, creates significant cash flow issues during our slow season from November to March. The roofs on Wilson and Hardman Halls are long overdue for replacement, and other buildings are not far behind. As we look to 2015 and beyond, capital improvement and debt service continue to threaten the viability of Beckwith, but we're certain that our benefactors will step us, as they always have, to ensure that Beckwith remains a beautiful place where ministry is done and lives are changed to the glory of Jesus Christ.

The Ministry of the Diocese at Murray House continues to be a positive one. Under the direction of Connie Anderson, the Executive Director and a member of the Parish of Saint John's in Mobile, and Sharon Phillips, the Administrator, the census for this year ran a bit lower, with an average of 35 residents over the course of the year.

This year, the Board adopted Amended and Restated Bylaws, streamlining and clarifying the Board's The Ministry of the Diocese at Murray House continues to be a positive one. Under the role in the operation and governance of the Benevolent Home of the Episcopal Diocese of the Central Gulf Coast. The major changes include establishing a regular meeting schedule and adjusting the size of the Board. In addition, having met the financial performance requirements stipulated by our lender, we secured the release of the Diocese from its role as loan guarantor.

Murray House is an assisted living facility. The Board continues to investigate the possibility of the addition of a second level of care, a Specialty Care Assisted Living Facility ("SCALF"), which we believe will significantly enhance the level of ministry provided by Murray House. That is a long term project, but one we continue to explore. Murray House is a significant ministry of the Diocese. Thanks to the work of the staff and Board, Murray House is financially sound, and continues to be a successful ministry.

Wilmer Hall Children's Home was founded in 1864 by Bishop Richard Wilmer as a home for children in need. One hundred and fifty years later Wilmer Hall continues to care for children and young adults in need due to poverty, abuse, neglect and homelessness. Wilmer Hall provides a warm, loving and nurturing home where children can live, learn and grow, both physically and spiritually.

Sally Greene, Executive Director, along with the Board, continue to implement cost reduction measures through effective management of staff and operations. In addition, we have been successful in our fundraising and grant writing efforts. The board and staff appreciate the continued funding from the Diocese as this is one of our few sources of fixed income.

We continue to reach out to the community by partnering with other local agencies such as Penelope House, Sybil Smith, Salvation Army, McKemie Place and the Mobile County Public School System's Coalition for Homeless Teens in an effort to combine talent and resources to benefit children and young adults in need.

During 2014, we have been celebrating 150 years of mission and ministry. We recognize this remarkable milestone in our history by honoring not only our past, but looking to the future as we strive to continue our legacy of caring for children and young adults. In response to the needs of our community we serve our residents through 4 programs: the Residential Living Program, the Transitional Living Program, the Transitional Family Program and the Education Program.

Due to an ever increasing census, there was a need to renovate Carpenter Hall and Quigley Hall in order to expand our Transitional Living Program and our Transitional Family Program. We have completed the renovation work and the residents moved into the newly renovated and refurbished homes in October. They are very happy and excited with their new rooms! In addition to the renovation work, we grateful and thrilled for the donation of a new sign in the front which identifies our ministry while serving as a landmark.

This past year has been a very positive one for Wilmer Hall and with the continued generosity and support of our diocese we will continue this very special ministry God has called us to do.

### REPORT OF THE COMMISSION ON AFFIRMATIVE AGING

In 2014 the Commission on Affirmative Aging's mission was to facilitate the enrichment of lives by the grace of God in Christ Jesus, to serve as a resource for training, education, consultation, and to present programs relating to issues of positive aging throughout the life cycle. Through much work and planning, many of the Commission's goals have come to fruition.

In October of 2014, in tandem with the Women's Ministries Fall Conference and Retreat, the Commission on Affirmative Aging offered a seminar for Licensed Health Care Providers, Priests, Deacons and Lay Leaders entitled ALZHEIMER'S DISEASE/DEMENTIA: COPING STRATEGIES FOR THE PRESENT AND FOR OUR FUTURE. The seminar was approved for 3 hours of continuing education credit. The idea for this Seminar grew out of needs expressed by leaders of The Episcopal Church Women's Council, who desired information on what was viewed as an especially timely topic. Many of the Council in various ways were and are caring for family members exhibiting Alzheimer's or dementia like behaviors. The seminar offered a clinical overview of Alzheimer's and Dementia by: reviewing symptoms that characterize the stages of Alzheimer's Disease, differentiating between the terms Alzheimer's Disease and Dementia and discussing diagnostic and treatment processes for Alzheimer's/dementia in general terms. As the seminar continued participants were provided with listings of community resources and offered strategies for dealing with caregiver stress, ways to prevent compassion fatigue, addressing the spiritual needs of those living with Alzheimer's disease or dementia as well as those caring for them.

A discussion providing insights into legal concerns, competency and guardianship issues, estate planning, living wills, power of attorney and health care surrogacy, which are pertinent for all who care for those suffering from Alzheimer's or dementia, took place and as the seminar concluded, those present participated in a well-received question and answer session.

To further its goals to support and enhance the quality of life for the whole person, physically, spiritually, intellectually, emotionally, and socially, the Commission hopes in the year 2015 to secure grant monies with a goal of making this type of seminar available on a wider scale throughout the Diocese of the Central Gulf Coast. ## REPORT OF THE COMMISSION ON PRISON MINISTRIES

The Commission on Prison Ministries has had a busy year. The commission has spent significant time discussing and studying several major issues related to the criminal justice system. Topics for these discussions included:

- Trends in sentencing and corrections.
- Little Children Big Challenges: Incarceration. This is a \$350 million project sponsored by the SESAME WORKSHOP educational organization. The project is focused on children of incarcerated parents.
- The General Convention of the Episcopal Church's resolution calling for \$50,000 a year for three years for the support of new and existing camps for children of the incarcerated.
- Wisconsin Faith Communities efforts to cut the prison population in half in that State.

- The Las Vegas police department's "Buddy" program which has significantly cut the recidivism rate in that city.
- Studies related to the effects of incarnation of juveniles in the adult correctional system.
- Issues surrounding the repeal of California Proposition 36, the state three strikes law.
- The effects of Private Prisons on the correctional systems in the USA and the industries \$45 million spent on lobbying efforts for harsher prison sentencing laws.
- The bipartisan efforts in America to reform the criminal justice system.
- The 250th convict exonerated through DNA testing in America by the Innocence Project.

The commission supports significant prison ministries within the diocese including:

- The Life Tec. Project in Alabama.
- The Kairos ministry Group.
- The Threshold Prison Ministry Group-Federal Correctional Institution Marianna, Florida.
- St. Dismas Mission- Fountain Prison.
- Penelpe House Ministry, Mobile Alabama.
- Money Smart Class, Pathways for Change, Pensacola.
- Pike County Jail Ministry, St Marks Church, Troy Alabama.
- The Florida Innocence Project, Tallahassee Florida.

### REPORT OF THE COMMISSION FOR WORLD MISSIONS

The Commission on World Missions met twice during the Calendar year 2014, at St. Paul's Daphne. The first meeting always follows the Medical and Construction Teams' annual trip to the Dominican Republic. The second meeting is used to formalize plans for the next year's mission trip.

There is currently not enough funding for one mission trip, much less two. Therefore, each year, the decision to continue two teams, is left up to the Team Leaders, Keith Greene and Geary Gaston, who must convince the Commission that the team members can fund a budget deficit of \$37,000. How is this done? Most of the deficit is made up by the team members, who pay their own airfare: approximately \$900.00 and must raise an additional \$350.00 for their team. The \$10,000 received from the Diocese is used to pay for medicine, construction materials, and lodging for the team members. It is important to note that fund raising activities continue all year long, with cake bakes, red bean and rice dinners, and donations from our churches thrift stores. Some of the churches sponsor their members by raising the \$350.00 for them, others have spouses, friends and benefactors to help. Any additional donations are greatly appreciated. If your church is not involved in this work in the DR; consider making a contribution for 2015.

The 2015 Medical Team will be in San Marcos and the Construction Team will work out of San Andreas. Please keep these teams in your prayers while they put Christianity into practice, by spreading the word of Christ through faith, love, and hard work.

## REPORT OF THE COMMISSION ON YOUTH AND YOUNG ADULT MINISTRIES

It's been a busy and exciting 2014 for the youth of the Central Gulf Coast! We started the year working with the Diocese of West Tennessee, as we attended their Happening in February, with the anticipation of starting our program about a month later. After discerning with the coordinators in West Tennessee about launching the program in March, we determined it was too early, as we didn't have enough applications. Since that time, we have continued to make the Happening weekend available by partnering with West Tennessee and Alabama, and have a Happening Steering Committee who has discerned to re-launch Happening in February or March of 2016. Youth have attended Happening in West Tennessee and Mississippi, with a group planning to attend the Alabama Happening in February 2015.

We now have a mission statement, "To support and connect youth in the body of Christ as they grow in discipleship." The Commission wrote this during one of the four Commission meetings this year. This mission statement is helping to shape the work of youth and young adult ministry in our diocese, and for that I am most grateful!

Diocesan Convention was an exciting time, with many opportunities to share ideas and meet folks throughout the diocese. During Convention, we also hosted a Young Adult Gathering, where young adults gathered for fellowship, food and discussion. Area Ministry Gatherings continued in 2014 and we will use the newly formed regions of the Diocese to plan a youth event in each geographic area in 2015. These, like many events offered by the Commission on Youth and Young Adults, will bring activities for young people closer to your church!

Our first annual Adults Who Work with Youth conference was held in March and included a keynote speaker, Kathy Culmer, who focused on teaching the skills of Biblical Storytelling. Twenty six lay and clergy leaders gathered to learn and share about their ministries, in an effort to better serve the young people in their congregations. There was also a retreat aspect to the weekend held at Beckwith. This event will rotate around the Diocese in future years.

With nearly 700 campers this summer, we have had an excellent season of Summer Camp at Beckwith! The summer staff has received an abundance of positive feedback from campers and parents alike! Our deans and nurses have generously provided great care and spiritual growth for our Summer Camp program! We raised \$4,300 and were able to provide scholarships to 18 campers from our Camp Scholarship fund, through the sale of Summer Camp Photo CDs. We were also able to welcome back 15 Special Ministries graduates to our camp sessions through a MAPP Family Foundation grant! Thank you for your continued prayers and support of our Summer Camp!

We took a group of 15 youth to attend the Pensacola Blue Wahoos baseball game in August and our Junior High Kickoff in September was held at Beckwith. The Junior High Kickoff included 54 youth and 6 adults from six different churches between Milton, Pensacola, Foley, and Mobile. We started the day with Worship on the Water, which included Eucharist on Weeks Bay on paddle boards and then had lunch, activities and games on the water!

Three youth and two adults represented our diocese at the Province IV Youth Leadership Gathering in the Diocese of Louisiana, in early December. Our youth had

the opportunity to share a teambuilding activity and devotional with our province, in addition to getting to know youth around Province IV. We visited a few churches around New Orleans and learned how their ministries have changed since Hurricane Katrina. Details on a Province IV Middle School event will be coming for this summer! Next year's Province IV Youth Leadership Gathering will be held in the Episcopal Church in South Carolina on December 3-6, 2015.

To wrap up the year, we offered Fall Camp for sixteen 6-12th graders during BayLights at Beckwith, and just concluded two sessions of Winter Woods for 6-8th graders and our Special Ministries campers in 3-5th grades, serving a total of thirty four young people.

There are many exciting events for young people, youth leader development, and much more to meet the needs of your parish ministries with children, youth and young adults! Thank you for your continued prayers and support!

- Now have the largest amount of Leadership Team Members on board in over a decade including 6 Province Presidents, 1 Province VP and 82 Diocesan Coordinators, Assistant Diocesan Coordinators and Liaison Advisors.
- Social media enhancements: Digital Faith Web Page format, Facebook, BStA Blog, Twitter accounts, Adobe Connect, Go to Meetings, Constant Contact, Survey Monkey, and Drop Box.
- National Day of Service acceptance coast to coast even featured on TEC web page under key events.
- New program initiatives designed to attract millennials while supporting parish growth efforts. These enhancements include: Revamped Boy Scout format; Manhood, Mentoring; Fatherless/Homeless children; Blended Families; Prison Ministry expansion; Pornography (addictions); and Veteran Friendly Congregations.

In the Diocese of the Central Gulf Coast 2014, we offer accountability, prayer, study, service and a safe place to men to walk this journey together. As the 'guys' in the churches locally we are ushers, choir members, lay readers, chalice bearers, EYC Assistants, EFM participants, leaders and members of Christian Education classes and Bible Study, iconographers, Treasurer and financial committee officials, Vestry members, Wardens, Cub Scout leaders, raise food for Manna Food Pantries, provide meals to the homeless at Greater Union Baptist Church, and financial support to the St. Joseph's Medical Mission.

Other church and Diocesan activities.

- Organized the Diocesan Annual Men's Conference and Retreat
- Recognized graduating HS seniors with personalized Bibles
- Held a Cub Scout outing for 35 youth, food and tickets to minor league baseball
- Participated in Brotherhood National Work Day by doing repairs at Camp Beckwith
- Brothers led a major effort in Pensacola by bringing in 225 youth from all across America to work on 33 homes.
- Delivered altar flowers to over 200 church members or others in the community (approx. 4/week)
- Cooked for Parish Picnic, Christmas Pageant, Mardi Gras/Lent, Easter Champagne Breakfast

- Held Annual Bar-b-q that raised over \$3,750 for Wilmer Hall
- Organized a Mardi Gras fundraiser that netted over \$1,000 for local Service to Others projects
- Supported Diocesan Seminarians directly with over \$3,000 in three years.

### CHAPLAINS TO RETIRED CLERGY AND SPOUSES

In 2014, a team of fourteen members of the Diocese continued to serve as the Bishop's Chaplains to Retired Clergy, Spouses, and Surviving Spouses: The Rev. Richard and Pam Schmidt, Bishop Ci and Ashby Jones, The Rev. Jandy and John Watkins, The Rev. John and Ann Phillips, The Rev. Thomas Nixon, Ms. Sheila Campbell, and The Rev. Thomas and Linda Weller. My wife, Nancy, and I continued to serve as members and coordinators of this team. Our Diocese is a popular place for retired clerics, spouses, and survivors. There are about 170 of us, two-thirds of us living within the Diocese. The others live all across the country.

The chaplaincy is one of many ministries of the Church Pension Group (CPG) supporting pastoral care, health, and wellness for retirees. In May 5-7, seven of our chaplains attended the Province IV Chaplains Conference at Camp Weed in the Diocese of Florida (Dick and Pam Schmidt, Jandy and John Watkins, Sheila Campbell, Albert and Nancy Kennington) and enjoyed worship, fellowship, and much good learning with fellow chaplains and officers and staff of CPG.

On May 20, a Clergy Focus Group was offered by the Bishop Search Committee for retired clergy, most of whom had not been informed of the focus groups for other clergy. Retired clergy are appreciative to the Search Committee for providing this opportunity, especially to The Rev. Reid McCormick of the Search Committee who was the facilitator for this session, and to Epiphany, Crestview, for offering a location.

While most of the retired clergy (and retired is defined mostly by the CPG but not by the canons) do not have a vote in convention, it should be known and remembered that of the retired clergy living with the Diocese, 61% of us offer regular or occasional ministry in our congregations. About one third of our congregations depend upon retired clergy for sacramental, preaching, and pastoral ministry. Over 20 of our retired clerics serve in over 30 diocesan ministries.

A highlight of 2014 was the October 27-29 retreat at Beckwith Camp and Retreat Center for the retirees with Bishop Charles and Nancy Duvall as special friend home again. There were 42 retirees present, plus Bishop Philip and Kathy Duncan who were the honored retirees-in-training. The weather and Beckwith were both at best for October, and Bishop Duvall gets better and better with his stories. Most of the group enjoyed a delightful afternoon sail on Mobile Bay on the schooner Joshua.

As of this writing, an "Enriching Your Retirement" Conference for retirees will meet at St. Simon's, Fort Walton Beach, on January 28, 2015, sponsored and paid for by CPG. The Rev. Laura Queen, VP and Director of Pastoral Care of CPG, will lead the conference.

The chaplains convey a special affection to our predecessor and our own Chaplain-emeritus, Fr. Bob Graves, who with Jane, continues to be our best supporters and participants.

During the year, chaplains exercised personal ministries in a variety of ways including notes on special days, praying the cycle of prayer for retirees, phone calls, small lunches and dinners, presence in times of sickness and death. Fr. Tom Weller reports the importance of staying connected and that all of the retirees in his area are busy in parishes. Sheila Campbell echoes the value of staying connected and of praying

for each other. Fr. Dick Schmidt calls together the retirees of Baldwin County about every two months for lunch (thanks to gracious hospitality from the Baldwin House) and extends the boundaries of Baldwin County creatively.

The Geezer Gazette continued as an occasional newsletter for the retirees.

The Church Pension Group calls retirees "the church's treasures." Well, it feels good, whether or not it's true. Retired clergy treasure our vocation as bishops, priests, and deacons of Jesus Christ for all our days. We treasure the steadfast love and support of our spouses. Our spouses and surviving spouses treasure being remembered for their lovingly given partnership in the ministry of clergy.

### **DIOCESAN ALTAR GUILD**

Will English (All Saints, Mobile), John Howard Wilson, Jr. (St. Paul's Daphne), Michael Hardin (Christ Church, Pensacola), and Mints McGowin (St. Thomas Greenville) have agreed to sever as Regional Disaster Coordinators.

Region 1 consists of Mobile County; Will English will be the Regional Coordinator.

Region 2 consists of Baldwin County; John Howard Wilson, Jr is the Regional Coordinator.

Region 3 consists of Escambia (FL) and Santa Rosa Counties; Michael Hardin is the Regional Coordinator.

Region 4 consists of Okaloosa, Walton, Jackson, Washington, Bay, Franklin and Gulf Counties; Regional Coordinator position is currently vacant and David Brady is serving as interim.

Region 5 consists of Clarke, Monroe, Escambia (AL), Butler, Covington, Troy Barbour, Coffee, Dale, and Houston Counties; Mints McGowin is the Regional Coordinator

### **ECUMENICAL OFFICERS**

In the 1980s, leaders from the Evangelical Lutheran Church in America Southeastern Synod, the Episcopal Diocese of Alabama, the Episcopal Diocese of the Central Gulf Coast, the Roman Catholic Archdiocese of Mobile, and the Roman Catholic Diocese of Birmingham in Alabama established the annual LARC Conference (Lutherans, Anglicans, and Roman Catholics) to explore their shared commitment to partner in justice and social issues. The conference was an occasion to learn and cherish more deeply what is held in common by all three denominations. Responsibility for the conference was shared on a rotating basis among the denominations.

Over the past few years, as reflected in attendance from each denomination, it seemed that interest in the conference had been waning. At each conference, the bishops gathered to discuss conference planning. In 2012, the bishops agreed to engage in conversation after the conference to discuss the future of the conference. It was decided that the LARC Conference for 2013 would not be held. In its place, the Archdiocese of Mobile offered to host a joint Evening Prayer service on Martin Luther King Day. It, however, was canceled due to schedule conflicts. It has been your Ecumenical Officers' hope that the Roman Catholic, Episcopal, and Lutheran bishops would engage in conversation regarding the future direction of the LARC Conference.

In 2013, at the suggestion of the Most Reverend Thomas Rodi, the Archbishop of Mobile, the bishops and their ecumenical officers were requested to enter into

dialogue regarding the future of the LARC Conference. The Right Reverend John McKee Sloan, the Bishop of Alabama, has invited the bishops and ecumenical officers to a meeting to further this conversation in Montgomery, Alabama, on March 10, 2015.

### EPISCOPAL RELIEF AND DEVELOPMENT (ERD)

This past year was a very busy year for Episcopal Relief & Development in our diocese, in our country and around the world. In addition to the usual natural disasters the organization responded to the migrant crisis and the growth of the Ebola virus.

In our diocese we have parish representatives in about 50 of the 64 parishes. They are the spokespersons for Episcopal Relief & Development in their congregation and they are busy throughout the year. They received communications at least once a month from the Diocesan Coordinator and twice that many from the New York office of Episcopal Relief & Development. Before Lent, they notified their congregation of the 2014 Lenten Devotional and how to conduct an Episcopal Relief & Development Sunday, which is the first Sunday in Lent.

In addition, they let everyone know about the Gifts for Life catalog, which provides gifts such as animals, emergency supplies, tools and seeds, and clean water which you can buy for families and communities in need. Parishioners can use the catalog as a way to give gifts for holidays, birthdays, and other special occasions, especially Christmas. A congregation can also choose to collectively support a Parish and School Selection from the catalog, as a way to reach people living in poverty.

Finally, church representatives made sure congregations were aware of natural disasters in the United States and around the world and what Episcopal Relief & Development was doing to assist those affected. They saw that Episcopal Relief & Development bulletin insets where used and many got collections, in particular for the

Matching Gift Challenge, where donations to all funds will be matched dollar-for-dollar.

Next year promises to be busier than this year, as we will celebrate the 75th Anniversary of Episcopal Relief & Development.

### "FIVE-YEAR PLAN"

SYNOPSIS: DEVELOPMENT AND IMPLEMENTATION OF THE DIOCESAN FIVE YEAR PLAN (2008-2015)

The Challenge: The Standing Committee accepted The Rev. Albert Kennington's challenge to fulfill its Canon 9 planning obligations for the diocese. The Revs. Ken Cumbie, Martha Harris, Martha Kreamer and Melinda Henderson, PhD met to consider how to accomplish this without a lengthy retreat or protracted workshops. M. Henderson submitted suggestions to the subgroup by e-mail and it was agreed that a few minutes prior to each meeting, with occasional additional time, would be utilized for planning according to the processes outlined in the proposal. Dr. Henderson agreed to act as facilitator and the Standing Committee met for 15-30 minutes prior to their quarterly meetings during 2008,

The Planning Processes: Nominal group process (a group works as individuals on a given task eliminating the influence of high status or domineering group members and ensuring input from retiring or shy group members) provided a vehicle for input by all. The task assigned was to determine how to meet the sole stipulation (to "redesign" the diocese) of an imaginary multi-billion dollar bequest. The group came up with 60 different programs, goals or wishes they would put in place under these ideal circumstances. Thus, the "preferred future" for the diocese as envisioned individually by Standing Committee members, the Bishop, and diocesan officers took the form of a "Wish List." These efforts were later dubbed "Operation Redesign".

The task was made less idealistic/more realistic by giving 100 points to each participant who then allotted these points to the "Wish List" (minimum 5 points per item, no maximum) after prayerful consideration of the most important or urgent things to do for the diocesan redesign. These "votes" were submitted by e-mail. While awaiting the votes, the "Wish List" was categorized by the Facilitator in several ways (urgency, the resources needed to accomplish, and whether item was an outcome statement or a means (way to achieve some unstated outcome). This was done as a demonstration to the group for how the "Wish List" could be utilized.

Developing Mission and Outcome Statements: The votes were tallied and items prioritized by descending rank. The item with the most votes was ranked as # 1 or the most important "wish." The list was categorized yet again based on similarity of items. This yielded 4 categories tentatively named Spread of the Gospel (I), Redesign of the Diocesan Office (II), Stewardship (III), and Communication (IV). A tentative outcome statement or goal was eventually adopted for each category by answering the question "Why are these group wishes important and what will be gained if they are achieved?" A Roman numeral was assigned to each category (I-IV) according to the number of high ranking items in each or the total number of "votes" in each category. Items in each category ranked at 15 or higher in the initial vote were retained and rest were either placed in a ten year schema for achievement or discarded (by vote of the group). Thus, Spread of the Gospel (I), which was later called Ministry, became the first section of the plan because it contained the most "wishes" with high rankings, etc.

Redesign of the Diocesan Office later became Leadership (II) as realization spread that concepts beneath it involved more than just the Diocesan office.

When re-presented to the group in the latter part of 2008 there was general agreement that this material (after clarification, debate, editing and further reality checks) could form the basis or starting point for a five year plan. Thus, an organizational development technique, not an exact process or perfect research process, was used to derive a common set of wishes and dreams, to prioritize and categorize them and to define a tentative goal that would be achieved in the "redesign" process if all the "wishes" in each category were put in place or achieved.

As 2009 began, a mini workshop was held on types of planning. Proactive planning (originally proposed by Russell Achoff) was selected as most compatible with a faith based entity that wanted to determine where they needed to go and what they wanted to be and what they wanted to achieve in five years or so. Then methods would be outlined and recommendations made to assist the Diocese in reaching their "Preferred Future."

Subgroups were formed around the 4 categories to debate where the Diocese was at present in relation to each "wish" and to begin the planning process outlined by Achoff. As a first step, "gap analysis" was needed to identify differences between the present condition of the Diocese and where we wanted to be in the future, who the stakeholders were who might facilitate or hinder movement toward what was really desired (the "wishes"). The Bishop suggested the findings and recommendations of the Blue Ribbon Committee to Study the Diocese (a task force led by The Rev. Thack Dyson to study existing conditions, needs and desires of parishioners and groups in the Diocese) might serve as an important tool to determine "where we are now." This special committee presented their recommendations at the January meeting and the consensus was to incorporate these into the final planning document. In addition, a survey of the diocese was needed to further identify existing resources (people and programs already in place) and explicitly stated needs. The survey was formulated by Dr. Henderson based on input from the group in relation to the "wishes" already identified. The survey was administered and tabulated with the assistance of Dr. Sam Fisher (University of West Florida). The results (grouped data from congregations) were made available on the Diocesan web site.

The results were used to help to determine what "means" (resources, personnel, time, talent, treasure or funds) might be needed in order that the prioritized wishes and goals might be achieved. In other parts of the planning process the groups determined who or which group had major responsibility to "Just do it," (work toward the goals) and how success in achieving each goal ("How did we do?"), project or outcome might be determined or measured. This work was done primarily by e-mail with the facilitator typing the subgroup determinations into a planning framework to be shared with the total group.

Perfecting the Draft Plan: Subgroup submissions were fluid and changed as suggestions from other subgroups and from the entire group were incorporated. Most importantly, the ranking of programs and projects (wishes) in each category changed as each group reviewed and integrated the recommendations of the Blue Ribbon Committee into the trial planning document. Finally, selected Resolutions from the 2009 General Convention were considered and prioritized into appropriate categories when accepted as important for the Diocese as a whole to work toward or achieve (HIV education, Domestic Violence education, and insurance coverage for employees).

This process of perfecting materials, submitting it to others for review and making changes based on the suggestions received (survey/feedback technique) continued between subgroups and within the entire group until it was felt that realistic outcome statements could be used as mission statements for each category. In addition, methods to achieve each of the outcomes (wishes, programs, policies, etc)

were determined to be or not be achievable to some degree by selected Diocesan groups over time. A mini-lecture on content, process and outcome evaluation methods was provided

Deriving a Vision Statement: Then the question was proposed, "If we believe these prioritized wishes, programs, etc. are important to achieving these four mission statements then how do we determine, from this work, what our vision for the next five to ten year might be and how do we state it meaningfully?" A mini-lecture was given on the differences between vision and mission statements and how both might be written and conveyed.

After debate about how the vision should be stated a sub-committee was appointed to ascertain proper wording and to determine the values and meaning to be conveyed in the vision statement based on the work accomplished to date. The Rev. Dr. Beverly Gibson, Mr. Vincent Currie and Dr. Melinda Henderson debated in e-mails and meetings until a vision statement that reflected the preferred future of the diocese as a whole (not just the diocesan office) was derived from all completed work. This vision statement written for approval was "As the body of Christ in the Diocese of the Central Gulf Coast we share a vision of unity through effective ministry, leadership, stewardship and communication." To the committee this implied that as a diocese we were obligated to assist one another and to receive assistance from the Diocesan Office (even if it was a referral to a particular parish or person for assistance) in order to improve abilities in the four major areas (ministry, leadership, stewardship, and communication) and that by functioning in this way differences and divisions could be overcome, less finger pointing at the diocesan office would occur and unity might be enhanced.

Unfortunately, when presented to the entire group late in a tiring meeting, rationale for the vision statement was not requested or discussed and someone quickly suggested an alternative that was very suitable for a parish or mission (Our vision is to share Christ crucified and God's reconciling love through effective ministry, leadership, stewardship and communication) but not reflective or suitable as a vision statement for the preferred future of the Diocese as a whole. Nor was it reflective of unity as the overarching value that would promote and even allow effective ministry, etc. from and to the various subunits of the entire diocese.

It was indeed late and all were tired. The substitute resolution won the quickly cast vote and the group went home. However, this vision statement was the most criticized element of the plan (based on feedback to the facilitator) because most felt the focus of Episcopalians was more on the Risen Lord and/or that the statement was what they were doing at the parish/mission level already. They, as well as the Standing Committee that suggested the substitute vision statement, were unsure how the vision of the diocese as an entity, separate from and/or inclusive of an individual parishes or missions, differed from one they might have selected as their own vision statement.

Final Review and Revisions: The Five Year Plan then consisted of a vision statement, four mission statements, a commitment statement and twelve pages outlining the prioritized wishes, programs, policies, recommendations and resolutions, etc. felt to be important (at the time) in achieving each mission statement. Individuals or groups felt to be most responsible or knowledgeable for implementation, possible approaches and possible outcomes were also identified although these were primarily suggestions that were put forth with full assurance that each individual or group would have their own methods and would utilize their own ideas and apportion their resources in working toward the critical elements of the plan as was possible for them.

As a final survey/feedback or Delphi technique the Bishop submitted a complete "Five Year Plan" document to five bishops from other dioceses. Their critiques were received anonymously and incorporated where ever possible. Then a resolution proposing acceptance of the plan was readied for the 2010 Diocesan

Convention with the stipulation that the document be accepted as "Guidelines" rather than directives for congregations to participate in achieving the proposed mission and vision.

Acceptance of the Plan: The 2010 Diocesan Convention delegates received a copy of the plan in their preconvention packets and heard/saw a presentation on the method of planning used, the document itself and how they could each participate (as part of the Diocese) in achieving it to the extent of their current resources and capabilities. The plan was accepted unanimously by vote of the delegates.

Plan Implementation: To aid in the implementation of the FYP the Bishop appointed a Facilitator. Dr. Henderson was available to assist clergy/congregations, commissions, agencies and boards to understand the plan and to integrate the Diocesan plan into their own planning processes. The Facilitator was also tasked with reporting to the Bishop and Standing Committee on Diocesan progress toward Plan implementation. This was done on a quarterly and or annual basis for four years and at the end of the fifth year an annual report comparing the first scores with the final scores was submitted to convention delegates.

The first activity was to write letters to each parish and commission or group requesting their assistance. If there was material from the survey that related to a particular group it was included in this initial communication. For example, a number of parishes requested assistance with Congregational Development, a number were interested in establishing Parish Nursing, etc. The letters to these interest groups specified exactly which churches desired assistance so that they might be contacted.

Initially, Bishop Duncan stipulated that each priest write a letter every six months specifying the parish's progress in the implementation process. After the first letters were received it became apparent that this method was too time consuming for priests as well as for the facilitator who had to design qualitative research techniques to summarize and report data. Thereafter, the Bishop instructed the Facilitator that "push back" or complaints had been received about the reporting method and about the plan as a whole. The decision was made that other than seeking periodic feedback on progress, all facilitation efforts would take place only at the request of the entity involved.

Making Things Easier: Prior to the second reporting period unique Self Evaluation Report (SERs) forms were formulated for use by: 1. Clergy and Congregations(C/Cs); 2. Chairmen, Coordinators, Agencies and Boards (CCABs); 3. The Standing Committee; and 4. The Bishop. The SERs became much easier and quicker to complete as well as to quantitatively analyze. In 2012 scoring was expanded to cover subsections of the elements containing multiple components. Every six months a Self-Evaluation Report (SER) was e-mailed to congregations, commissions, agencies, boards, the Bishop and the Standing Committee. Someone (it need not be the priest or head of an agency or group) who knew what had been planned and/or implemented by that group, in terms of the FYP, determined how well they were progressing. The report was returned to the Facilitator for tabulation When the SER arrived it was an opportunity for each group to review the core elements of the plan that related to them and to determine how well they had done in achieving them. This determination was made based on where they were in the planning/implementation process. Evaluation was not made based on some "ideal" situation the evaluator knew of or had experienced, but on how well the group was doing based on their current capabilities, resources and circumstances. This periodic review, like a list on the refrigerator, helped to maintain focus.

Of course, data accumulated in this way could be biased. All wanted their group to do well. All had to make time for completing evaluations and submitting them in a timely manner. If the evaluators feared retribution they may be tempted to be overly generous in their evaluation or even fail to submit one. Thus the SERs for clergy

congregations were tabulated and reported only as grouped rather than as individual data. Strict confidentiality was maintained and only grouped data was given to the Bishop, the Standing Committee and the Convention. Because of the anonymity it was not possible to share with others some of the excellent ministries that were reported.

The SERs for the 36 commissions, agencies and boards presented different problems. Each had radically different goals and capabilities therefore it was impossible to write one SER to fit all. Each group had to review the FYP, extract outcomes, goals or programs that they could help to achieve, then add their group goals to the SER forms before evaluating themselves. The facilitator, when asked, was available to assist them in this process. Consultations with clergy/vestry, commissions, coordinators and agencies were provided, on request, by e-mail, telephone, FAX and in person by the Facilitator.

Results: Any organization as geographically scattered and as divergent as The Central Gulf Coast (20 missions, 42 parishes in two states, 36 commissions and 3 agencies) would find it difficult to work together to accomplish one thing much less something as complex as a 12 page Five Year Plan. Indeed, that is the reason for producing a written document and for extracting elements specific to various groups into the SERs. It serves as a guideline for each segment of our diocese to understand what the group as a whole should address (material down the left column of the plan) and gives some recommendations or suggestions on how the stated mission statements or projects may be accomplished.

Nothing in the plan said that each segment of the Diocese must work in the same way or to the same extent as some other group. Some chose not focus on particular aspects of the plan, others did what they could while still others can do a stellar job in a particular area. The Plan gives some information about what we would like to accomplish, as a Diocese. It is a road map for achieving our preferred future and our vision.

In spite of the fact that some complained about or did not like the plan, documentation obtained over the last five years shows that some agencies, congregations, and commissions of the Diocese attended to the plan. They gradually worked, within their individual capabilities, to meet some of the applicable elements specified in the Plan. For those designing their unique SERs, for Commissions, Coordinators, Agencies, the Bishop and the Standing Committee percentage scores were provided as feedback. Responses for these groups were disappointing. The Standing Committee submitted 2 SERs and Bishop submitted 2 SERs with scores increasing on the second submission for both groups. Their efforts to implement programs, projects, etc. specified in the plan were disappointing and/or not reported.

The Commissions on Prison Ministry, on Disaster Preparedness, on Women's Ministries (ECW) and Diocesan Mission Churches submitted SERs on a fairly consistent basis as did the various Coordinators for Parish Nursing. The only agency to respond fairly consistently was Beckwith and their SERs showed, as did the others responding consistently, progressive growth in achievement of objectives unique to the group and in understanding the process.

SERs received from Clergy and Congregations ranged from 15 to 39% of the 61 parishes and missions expected to reply. St. Marks for the Deaf and St. Dismas were not expected to reply. As personnel (clergy, secretaries, Senior Wardens in Charge, etc.) rotated it seemed that churches did not respond consistently. However, after a requested presentation was made to small and mission churches at their Fall Conference these churches seemed to respond more consistently that did the larger parishes.

Comparison between 23 churches (a 38% response rate) in July 2010 and 24 churches (39% response rate) in December 2014 revealed a slight decrease in scores in the area of implementing the entire section on MDGs. Examined individually, on a

scale of 1-4 with 4 as the highest, "Eradicate extreme poverty and hunger" was scored significantly higher (2.9) in 2014. College and university ministry (0.7) and Prison ministry (1.5) scores were similar for both groups. "Providing intentional college and/or university ministry," and "...appreciating various ways in which the Bishop communicates..." scores were almost the same.

In all other areas the 2014 SERs showed increases over the 2010 reports. The largest increase in scores was in the Five Marks of Mission and particularly in: "Proclaim the good news of the Kingdom (3.9); Teach, baptize and nurture new believers (2.8); and Respond to human needs by loving service (2.8). Scores in the areas of Providing intentional Health Ministry or Parish Nursing increased one full interval except when a similar element contained the words collaborative ministry of healing/health the score increase was 2.6 points higher in 2014. HIV/AIDS education; Emphasizing Disaster Preparedness; Domestic Violence Education; Awareness of the health/spirituality interrelationship; and Programs/activities in local churches increased by one full interval. Percentage scores increased 12%. Two Commissions and one Agency returned SERs.

Evaluating the Plan: An Evaluation of the Five Year Plan and Suggestions for the Next Planning Process were requested and submitted at the time the last SERs were requested. Results (33% response rate) indicated that the current Five Year Plan influenced the following to some extent: 1. An awareness of the missions statements and goals set by the Standing Committee as important for the Diocese to work toward; 2. Implementation of specific plans, programs and/or directions implied by the Plan goals; and 3. A sense of the need for unity with other Diocesan elements as all work toward selected plan goals. Respondents felt the current Five Year Plan barely influenced participations (to the extent possible given current resources and capabilities) in working toward Plan goals

Future Plans: The "We Dream..." Committee envisioned a three year cycle for Diocesan activities. Therefore this idea was proposed in the final evaluation. Respondents were uncertain to somewhat agree that a three year plan would/could: 1. Encourage needed changes or updates in the plan; 2. Be on a cycle that would allow addition of elements or goals selected from General Convention resolutions; 3. Specify approaches to be used in each of the three years of the planning cycle; 4. Specify certain goals/outcomes that each congregation, etc., would achieve (rather than listing guidelines only). There was a wide variety of opinions on exactly who should participate in making the next plan and only two individuals (Nettie Eaton and Melinda Henderson) were named by more than one respondent as having some degree of planning experience and expertise for assisting in development of the next Diocesan plan.

Survey researchers implement findings based on a 10% response rate. With a 39% response rate, perhaps our SERs are representative of our Diocese as a whole. A graphic presentation of the first (2010) and last (2014) SERs and the plan evaluation were given to delegates at the 2015 Diocesan Convention and the Facilitator's verbal report thanked a variety of people who participated in any way. However, the final evaluation process should include a repeat of the initial Diocesan survey with an analysis of any changes between 2010 and 2015 in the elements (from the Five Year Plan) selected for study. If done, such a survey would: 1. Give a clearer picture of changes over the past five years; 2. Provide a summary of current needs; 3. Serve as a starting point for future planning efforts.

Highlights (Critique/Concerns/Recommendations): Included below are highlights of the entire five years. They are in the form of critiques, concerns, and recommendations. It is hoped this content will be useful to future planning efforts. Although some concerns may be addressed only through changes in organizational

structure, role definition or supportive supervision this type of recommendation was not within the job description of the Facilitator.

- 1. Although authored by the Standing Committee, no provisions were made to orient new members of the Standing Committee (5 elected/appointed yearly, complete turnover in three years) to the FYP.
- 2. After the convention adopted the FYP it was many months before the old Diocesan Vision Statement was replaced by the new one. The new vision statement was never publicized, to my knowledge, beyond the Standing Committee, except on copies of the FYP. If the vision is not "owned" and publicized then the work toward achieving it never becomes part of the organizational culture.
- 3. Except for one Coastline article on MDGs by Fr. Gregg Hein, none of the promised priest and lay articles about sections of the plan materialized. Articles were periodically requested when the facilitator reported on the FYP at each quarterly Standing Committee Meetings. Again, unpublicized plans and programs are viewed as unimportant.
- 4. Budget provisions for the top priority items in the FYP never materialized. The rationale given by the administrator was that after fixed expenses were addressed there was little to no discretionary income remaining for items on the FYP. No opportunity was provided to orient the finance committee to the FYP and its rationale. Noted however were increases in allocations for agencies (under the top ranked section on ministries).
- 5. Standing Committee responsibility to increase contact with the diverse groups in the Diocese (a strong recommendation of the Blue Ribbon Committee to Study the Diocese) through visits to assigned congregations and to the Commissions to which they were liaisons never materialized. At year three a subcommittee (the Facilitator, the Finance Director, the Bishop and the Chairman of the Commission on Diocesan Mission Churches) was designated by the Standing Committee to discuss this particular issue and to make a plan to meet this obligation. This was done but members were reluctant and did not follow through with visitations. At one point, the President of the Standing Committee (Fr. Gregg Hein) requested that typed Commission/Agency Liaison Reports be submitted at each Standing Committee Meeting. This was not done except for those with liaison responsibility for ECW, Parish Nurses, and Diocesan Mission Churches. Thus, the Bishop (in the absence of a Canon) found it difficult to maintain contact with the 36 entities of the Diocese). In a sense the Standing Committee neglected or did not wish to assume any programmatic oversight or any activity that would make individual churches, commissions, etc. feel that they were indeed a part of the whole (Diocese) and that their individual work and opinions were valued.
- 6. Following the initial Diocesan wide survey, various Commissions, Coordinators etc. were mailed a list of all churches that desired consultation within their area of expertise. Except for the Parish Nursing Network and perhaps the Commission on Environment, the facilitator was unaware that Commissions provided any follow-up contact to these churches. The final survey, if authorized, may provide further data on this aspect of the plan.
- 7. The majority of Commissions, Coordinators, and Agencies failed to participate in the plan in any way. In fact it was discovered that some were not even meeting.
- 8. Although it had been the intent of the Standing Committee (that developed the plan) that suggestions received might result in periodic changes in the plan to make it a living and progressive process. Although provisions were made for this on the SERs no suggestions were forthcoming.
- 9. The few Commissions and Agencies who did complete periodic SERs had difficulty with the concept that written goals developed by their group as well as the scores on various components should be passed on to successive leadership. Thus as leadership changed it was too difficult to "start over."

- 10. For the most part, Priests did not inform vestries and congregations of the FYP. Therefore the FYP could not serve as a model for local planning nor could elements of the plan be included into already existing local plans.
- 11. Mission and small churches got the concept of the FYP early. Perhaps this was due to the workshop on the FYP sponsored by the Commission on Diocesan Mission Churches. The majority of the questions received and consultations given (on implementing the plan locally and on what ministries in their churches might relate to plan elements) were from small and/or mission churches.
- 12. The Parish Nursing Network worked diligently to meet some of the outcomes they had written for the portions of the plan relating to them. See their annual report for how they saw their roll and responsibilities change over the five year period.
- 13. Identification of ministries offered by various churches (extra points at last question on SERs) demonstrated that a lot of great and creative ministries are in place in Diocesan churches. These will be submitted under separate cover and the churches will be identified only for this question.
- 14. The FYP allowed the facilitator to contact various churches, groups, and commissions occasionally for instruction, consultation, assistant, support, etc. Many times this was by phone or e-mail but a great deal of travel was also involved.
- 15. It was somewhat of a surprise that various groups and churches, when given the opportunity to plan, prioritize goals, etc. consistently ranked spiritual items/goals higher than temporal ones even when "the roof was leaking" (there were serious and sometimes overwhelming temporal needs).
- 16. On the whole, Commissions failed (with the exception of Disaster preparedness, ECW, Parish Nursing, Diocesan Mission Churches and Beckwith) to participate in the FYP and any evaluation of their programs in relation to it. As noted, some were not active.
- 17. SERs for the Standing Committee and the Bishop were returned only twice. Percentage scores increased for both but many aspects of the plan (as listed on the SERs) received low or zero scores indicating little or no work toward plan elements or Blue Ribbon Committee recommendations. Efforts put forth by individual congregations or combinations of groups (an example is "Baylights") helped to meet plan goals.
- 18. The Bishop was instrumental in keeping the Facilitator's focus on the concept of "Guidelines" and on providing assistance and instruction only when requested. Never the less, so many groups heard about the FYP and received encouragement to participate to the extent of their current resources and capabilities from the Facilitator that she was regarded by some as the FYP "policeman." Others believed that the document was engineered solely by her, or by the Bishop (who supported the plan and encouraged participation and response to the SERs) rather than by the Standing Committee and still others failed to understand that the Recommendations of the Blue Ribbon Committee to Study the Diocese had been incorporated into the plan. Many felt that the plan was a requirement of "The Diocese" failing to realize that they themselves were "The Diocese."
- 19. Except for copying of the initial 12 page plan for delegate approval in 2010 and copying one set of annual reports (about 200 pages) for handout at the convention, the Diocesan office bore no expense for the copying, travel, consultation, etc.
- 20. A final survey is strongly recommended to complete the evaluation process. This should include the questions on the initial survey in order to assess change. A few additional questions designed to aid any future planning efforts should also be included.

### FRESH START

Fresh Start continues to be a vital ministry in the Diocese of the Central Gulf Coast. Participants routinely share program and ministry offerings from their congregations that benefit us all. Fresh Start meets each month (third Thursday) in the Diocesan office.

Sadly, in 2014, we said goodbye to our co-facilitator, The Rev. Norman Bray. Norman's involvement in so many different areas of the Diocese was a reflection of the purpose of Fresh Start and what it means to be a Diocese. His commitment to the program over his five years of service, was a gift to each of us.

### INTERFAITH OFFICER, ALABAMA

The Diocese continues to remain active in Interfaith activities in Alabama. Participation in the Mobile Christian–Jewish Dialogue continues with broader participation than other programs. Meetings of the MCJD occur roughly monthly, through the academic year. While the Diocese is represented at the meetings, there is always room for more participation.

The "Trialogue of Mobile" is sponsored by the Spring Hill College Department of Theology, and brings together the Abrahamic faiths to get to know each other with conversation on topics of mutual interest. The Trialogue continues to grow stronger with each meeting. A transition has occurred in the governance of the Trialogue. Spring Hill College has instituted a Center for Interreligious Understanding ("CIU") that will have oversight of the Trialogue program. I represent the Diocese on the Steering Committee of the CIU.

Over 19 through 21 August, I attended the International Conference of Christians and Jews ("ICCJ") in Buenos Aires via GoToMeeting connection. While it might have been better to have been participating in-person, this approach afforded me a place at the table. In October, the 13th Annual Meeting of the Council of Centers for Jewish-Christian Relations ("CCJR") met in Mobile, hosted by Spring Hill College, the Mobile Christian-Jewish Dialogue, and Congregation Ahavas Chesed. This 4-day conference brought together US-based groups to worship, pray, share, and learn.

The opportunities for interfaith conversation are key to developing an understanding those from other faith traditions. In whatever area of the Diocese you might reside, I encourage you to seek out opportunities to participate in these conversations.

#### **ADMINISTRATIVE:**

The Bishop's salary was returned to \$120,000 effective January 2015. The salary of the Bishop was approved by Standing Committee and set at \$135,000 to be effective June 2015. Note there is a Bishop / Bishop-elect salary overlap for 2 months (June & July). Pensions were adjusted accordingly. The Bishop's travel expenses were increased to \$15,000 per year. Salaries in the Diocesan office have been increased for merit / cost of living. Salary for the Diocesan Administrator reflects a change from a part-time to a full-time position and corresponding responsibilities. While budgeted in 2014, the Diocesan Office did not hire a part-time staff member in 2014 and is not requesting funding for this item in 2015. The Coordinator for Youth Ministry expenses, which are covered 50% by Beckwith Camp and Retreat Center and 50% by the Diocese, will now be administered through the Diocesan Office. This arrangement provided for administrative and medical savings to both Beckwith and Youth Ministry. Medical and Life Insurance budget is based on premium increases and the Bishop's overlap. This portion of the Budget also includes office maintenance, supplies, equipment and audit, which all should be self-explanatory. The budget for Audit was increased to account for additional audit activities for the change in the Episcopacy. The line Item Episcopal Search is shown at \$80,000 representing the balance to be spent from funds raised (and is included in the Income section of the Budget). Diocesan Office Depreciation is taken as an audit adjustment after the end of the year and is not shown as an expense in the Budget.

# PRE-FILED RESOLUTIONS (RULES OF ORDER VI)

#### **RESOLUTION R1**

Submitted by Wayne Verry, Lay Delegate, Saint Paul's Foley

Resolved, that the 44th Annual Convention of the Episcopal Diocese of the Central Gulf Coast calls upon the Governor of the State of Alabama, the Attorney General, the Commissioner of the Alabama Department of Corrections, and leaders of both house of the Legislature of the State of Alabama to take necessary actions to end all forms of abuse in Alabama prisons and to uphold the fundamental dignity of every human being; and

Be it further resolved, that this Resolution be conveyed to the officials of the State of Alabama named above; and

Be it further resolved, that this Resolution be conveyed to the Episcopal Diocese of Alabama and the several Episcopal dioceses in the State of Florida urging them to take similar action with regard to the prisons in Alabama and Florida respectively.

#### **Background**

The following is a summary of recent events regarding Alabama state prisons:

In January 2014, the U.S. Department of Justice sent a letter to Governor Bentley, which documented years of neglect and abuse of the female prisoners at Tutwiler Prison by the prison staff, and called upon the Alabama state government to take prompt and appropriate action to correct these conditions, or face additional actions by the federal government.

Gov. Bentley subsequently established the Alabama Prison Reform Task Force, which appears to be focusing primarily on prison overpopulation and sentencing reform, but no apparent attention to prisoner living conditions and abuse.

Several Alabama non-profit organizations have filed lawsuits against the Alabama Department of Corrections, claiming that there has been inadequate physical and mental health care for inmates, and that inmates have been subjected to extreme physical abuse, including homicide.

Throughout 2014, the Alabama Media Group, which includes newspapers and online websites in Mobile, Montgomery, Birmingham, and Huntsville, has written extensively on the situation in the Alabama state prisons. One of the principal themes of these articles and editorials is the continued lack of attention to the appalling living conditions and inexcusable prisoner abuse. The Alabama Media Group editors have asserted that corrective action must be taken immediately, because it is "the right and necessary thing to do."

In September, the Annual Meeting of the Alabama Baptist Convention passed a resolution calling "upon the Governor, Attorney General, and Alabama Legislature to seek ways to end abuse in Alabama prisons."

On January 4, 2015, the Prison Reform Task Force announced that it would be considering various proposals to resolve prison overcrowding, and hopes to have a bill ready for the Alabama Legislature when it convenes in March.

These events emphasize that solving the myriad of problems within our state prisons is a complex challenge, and many issues will require significant time, planning, and money. But other issues can – and should – be addressed immediately. Most significantly, incarceration should not deprive a person of his or her fundamental right to be treated as a human being, or to have their inherent dignity taken from them. As these conditions in our state prison are considered, may we all reflect upon our Baptismal Covenant:

**Celebrant:** "Will you strive for justice and peace among all people, and respect the dignity of every human being?"

People: "I will, with God's help."

#### **RESOLUTION R2**

Submitted by Wayne Verry, Lay Delegate, Saint Paul's Foley

Resolved, that the Diocesan Cycle of Prayer for Prisons continue to be used in regular worship in the congregations of the Diocese of the Central Gulf Coast, including prayers for persons in leadership work to end inhumane practices; and

Be it further resolved, that clergy and wardens provide members of our congregations with current information about the various prison ministries listed in the report of the Commission on Prison Ministry, and encourage members of our congregations to become active participants in prison ministry within our Diocese.

#### Appendix IV

#### Final Report of the Bishop Search Committee

February 21, 2015

The work of the Bishop Search Committee began on Friday, January 17, 2014, at a joint retreat attended by the members of the Standing Committee, Transition Committee, Search Committee, and our search consultant, Lynn Schmissrauter. The charge presented to the Search Committee by the Standing Committee was to nominate from four to seven candidates for the office of Bishop of the Diocese of the Central Gulf Coast.

At this organizational meeting Lynn presented an overview of the elements and time line for the search process. The Rev. Christie Olsen was chosen as Chaplain, and Debra Kosche agreed to be responsible for communications. Because of her considerable skills in computer technology, Debra also agreed to be responsible for developing a Bishop Search website. After extensive research on her part, Debra also recommended that we adopt a common Internet based platform known as Basecamp, for sharing and tracking information on our candidates. All information on each candidate was entered into the database by Debra, and each member of the committee, upon entering their unique password, could access that information at any time via the Internet. This was a tremendous help to us in sharing the information and comments made by committee members, while protecting the confidentiality of the candidates.

At subsequent meetings in January, February and March we planned a strategy for listening to and gathering information from all clergy and lay members of the diocese in preparation for the publication of our diocesan profile. We chose an online survey tool developed by Holy Cow Consulting, an experienced survey consulting firm recommended by our consultant.

The Search Committee had a display booth at the diocesan convention and encouraged all in attendance to complete the survey using laptop computers provided by the committee. We sent out numerous reminders to churches and in diocesan newsletters, urging all to participate. The response to the survey was such that the consulting firm indicated the results could be considered 95% accurate.

Congregational focus group meetings were held in at least twelve different locations across the diocese. Three clergy focus groups were held in locations that we thought were accessible to all clergy members. Separate focus groups were conducted for diocesan and agency staff members.

A Bishop Search Profile, written and produced by a subcommittee headed by the Very Reverend Beverly Gibson, included all information gleaned from the survey analysis and focus groups. Our goal was to make the profile meaningful and honest so that potential candidates would know who we are as a people...what we desire...and who we hoped to call as our bishop.

The period for receiving nominations began in mid-June and lasted until September 1st. Notices were published on the Search Committee website, and emailed to clergy for publication in church bulletins. Nominations were encouraged from all clergy and lay members of the diocese. Our search consultant sent notices to the House of Bishops, to Episcopal news digital services; to other bishop search consultants, and to a considerable network of clergy friends. Nomination forms were available on the website, and could be completed digitally or printed and mailed. No nominations were received after the cutoff date.

Over the nearly three month period we received nominations for 65 candidates. All potential nominees were contacted with about half choosing to enter the process.

All candidates were asked to provide a current resume, updated Office of Transitional Ministries (OTM) Profile and answers to three questions developed by our committee. The questions were designed to provide insight into each candidate as an individual as well as to their sense of call to the Diocese of the Central Gulf Coast.

All responses from the candidates were posted on Basecamp making them available to all members of the committee for review and study. A meeting was held early in September to discern which candidates were the best fit for our diocese. After prayer and lengthy discussion, the field was narrowed and a group of candidates was invited to participate in the video interviewing phase of our process.

The committee conducted the video interviews over the Internet using the GoToMeeting platform. Three or more members, including at least one clergy member, conducted each interview asking standard questions that were developed by the committee. The interview was recorded and posted to Basecamp so that all other members could listen to the candidate's responses to the questions.

Our second discernment meeting was held late in October. At that meeting members reviewed the responses made by the candidates to the questions asked by the interview team. After careful consideration and much discussion, the field was narrowed again and a smaller group of candidates was chosen to be invited to the onsite interview retreat. Each candidate was assigned a shepherd from among the committee members for contact and communications.

Reference checking was done by two-member teams. Each team made telephone contact with most of the individuals listed by the candidates as references. Additional references were developed and each candidate's bishop was contacted as well. The team asked the same questions of each person in order to make a proper comparison of all candidates.

Background screening was conducted on each of the candidates by Oxford Document Management Company. Each candidate was screened for criminal background and credit history, and all were cleared.

Our final round of interviews was conducted at a two and a half day retreat on Pensacola Beach in early November. All committee members, candidates and their spouses attended. The Rev. Steve Bates served as chief planner and moderator. Worship services, including a brief teaching or homily, were led by the candidates with each taking a turn. Candidates and their spouses sat with different committee members at each meal, so that all had an opportunity to visit and get to know each other. The various assessment activities for the candidates included role play requiring improvisational responses to various scenarios and situations. Committee members responded to questions asked by the candidates who in turn were asked to respond to issues and concerns that were raised during previous interviews or reference checking. The Diocesan Chancellor for Florida attended the first day of the retreat for the purpose of asking all candidates the "difficult" behavioral questions. On the final day, a group forum was held for the purpose of answering questions of interest to all candidates.

The retreat was experienced by both committee and candidates as a very meaningful and valuable period of mutual discernment. Following the retreat, the members of the committee met again to make a final decision. After a period of prayer and thoughtful discussion, the committee was unanimous in its decision to invite four candidates to become nominees for the Fourth Bishop of the Diocese of the Central Gulf Coast. All nominees were contacted and accepted.

The nominees were:

- The Rev. James Russell Kendrick, Rector, St. Stephen's Episcopal Church, Birmingham, Alabama.
- The Rev. Dr. William Charles Treadwell, Rector, St. Paul's Episcopal Church, Waco, Texas.

- The Rev. Canon Dr. E. Daniel Smith, Canon, Diocese of Missouri, St. Louis, Missouri.
- The Very Rev. Edward Francis O'Connor, Dean, Cathedral Parish of St. Andrew, Jackson, Mississippi

With the announcement of the four candidates the work of the Bishop Search Committee was concluded.

On January 19th, 20th and 21st, three "Walkabout" sessions and two lunch meetings were held in the diocese. All sessions and lunches were advertised and open to all members to attend. Luncheons were held at St. Francis of Assisi in Gulf Breeze and St. Mary's in Andalusia. Walkabout sessions were held at the Church of the Nativity in Dothan, St. John's in Monroeville, and St. Paul's in Daphne. The session at St. Paul's was recorded and made available on the diocesan website for all to view.

Prior to the February  $21^{st}$  election at the diocesan convention, the president of the standing committee was notified by Canon Smith that he was withdrawing his name from consideration.

Prior to the election the names of the remaining three nominees were formally presented for consideration by the chair of the nominating committee, Britt Landrum.

# SPECIAL RULES OF ORDER FOR THE ELECTION OF THE IV BISHOP OF THE DIOCESE

Adopted Friday, February 20, 2015 by the 44<sup>th</sup> Annual Convention of the Diocese of the Central Gulf Coast

On the Saturday morning of the Convention, February 21, 2015, immediately following a Celebration of the Holy Eucharist, the Convention shall take up this Special Order of Business for the Election of the IV Bishop of the Diocese.

- 1. The Secretary shall determine that the quorum required in Article VII, Section 4, of the Articles of Incorporation is present, this being two-thirds of all clergy eligible and two-thirds of all lay delegates entitled to vote in Convention.
- 2. Designated seating shall be provided for clergy and lay delegates eligible to vote and shall be restricted for them, and also for the Chancellors, the Secretary, Assistant Secretaries, the Interpreter for the Deaf, and the Committee on Elections who serves as tellers of the voting.
- 3. Upon the Secretary reporting that the required quorum is present and that seating of voting delegates is in order, the President shall call upon the chair of the Bishop Search Committee who shall read the names of the nominees of the Search Committee. In so doing, the chair shall read only the name, canonical residence, and current ecclesiastical cure of each. These nominations shall require no seconds, and there shall be no discussion. No nominations from the floor will be in order. (Canon 26.2)
- 4. In accordance with regular order as provided by Canon 3.9, the clergy and lay voting delegates shall sit as one body. In accordance with Article VII.4, the vote shall be by orders (clergy and lay), by secret ballot, and a concurrent majority in both orders shall be necessary for an election.
- 5. There shall be separate electronic voting devices for the clergy and lay orders.
- 6. Before any vote, the President shall invite a senior, canonically resident priest to lead the Convention in prayer, after which, the Convention will keep silence while delegates vote as directed by the President.
- 7. The Committee on Elections, as previously appointed by the President, will serve as tellers to complete the count of the ballots. After each ballot, this Committee will report to the President the count of the ballots cast indicating for each order, clerical and lay, the total number of votes cast, the number needed for a majority, and the number of votes cast for each nominee.
  - a. The President will read aloud the report of the tellers to the Convention. If a nominee receives a majority of the votes in each order, the President shall declare this nominee to be elected.
  - b. The report of the tellers shall be posted by the Secretary after each ballot in such a way as to be clearly visible to all delegates.
  - c. If there is no election, members of the Transition Committee will be instructed by the Chair to call the nominees.
- 8. If no nominee receives a majority of the votes in both orders on a ballot, then, following announcement of the results of the ballot, time not to exceed ten minutes may be allowed for deliberation among the delegates.

- 9. The President shall call for subsequent ballots, as needed, following the procedure stated in Rule 5 above.
- 10. The name of a nominee shall be removed from subsequent ballots, if the nominee either personally or through a representative requests that his name be removed, or
- 11. In the event of an election, the President shall appoint the President of the Standing Committee and the Chair of the Bishop Search Committee to notify the Bishop-elect of his election. After the Bishop-elect has accepted, members of the Bishop Transition Committee shall be appointed to inform the other candidates of the result of the election.
- 12. The President shall call for appropriate prayers to be offered, and the Testimonial of Election as provided in General Canon III.11.3 (a) shall be signed by a constitutional majority of the Convention.
- 13. In the event of no election at a reasonable hour, the Bishop, as President, shall announce a plan, previously agreed to by him and the Standing Committee, to recess the Convention and to call a recessed Convention to continue the voting.
- 14. This special order of business being concluded, the Convention will return to regular order.

#### POLICY STATEMENTS OF THE STANDING COMMITTEE

#### VISION OF THE EPISCOPAL DIOCESE OF THE CENTRAL GULF COAST

Adopted, Standing Committee, January 25, 2010 Adopted, 39<sup>th</sup> Diocesan Convention, Christ Church, Pensacola, Florida, February 26, 2010

#### Vision Statement

Our vision is to share Christ crucified and God's reconciling love through effective ministry, leadership, stewardship and communication.

#### **Mission Statement**

We seek to accomplish our vision by the following:

- Provide and sustain ministries that enable committees, commissions, agencies, boards, clergy and congregations (CCABCC) to share the Good News of God in Christ.
- II. Develop clerical, lay and staff leadership within the diocese through effective organizational structures, human resource practices, continuing education and deployment.
- III. Proclaim our theology of stewardship to include financial, environmental, charitable and personal (mind, body, spirit) principles of Christian living.
- IV. Convey our Vision and Mission and our progress toward their accomplishment through effective communication.

#### **Commitment Statement**

As we strive to attain this Vision via our stated Mission, we recognize our fundamental dependence upon God's grace, mercy and love and thus commit ourselves to begin all our endeavors with quiet, listening prayer to discern God's will.

#### STEWARDSHIP STATEMENT

Adopted, Standing Committee, April 20, 1989 Reaffirmed with Amendment, Standing Committee, January 24, 2004

Stewardship is at the heart of the main work of the Church. As the Standing Committee of the Diocese of the Central Gulf Coast, we acknowledge the importance of stewardship in the life of all Christians and call ourselves and others to responsible use of the abundant gifts God has given us.

- We affirm the minimum standard of the tithe in personal giving and pledge ourselves individually to the tithe or to work toward the tithe in our personal giving.
- We assert the importance of choosing leaders in the Church who are committed in Christian stewardship to tithing. We encourage that all candidates for the Standing Committee, in particular, affirm the minimum standard of the tithe in personal giving and pledge themselves individually to tithe or work toward the tithe in their personal giving.

- 3. We believe outside giving is also important for the Diocese. As the Standing Committee, we pledge to continue, as faithfully as possible, the Diocese's policy of giving at least 25% beyond the Diocese, including support of the national Church; and to increase funding of agencies which are our ministry beyond ourselves.
- 4. This statement will be reviewed annually at the first regular meeting of the new Standing Committee.

Stewardship is giving freely of what we have received. Stewardship causes us to reflect on what has been given to us. In the end, stewardship is fun! It is our way of participating in the work of Christ in the world.

# STATEMENT OF PRINCIPLE REGARDING STEWARDSHIP TO THE DIOCESE OF THE CENTRAL GULF COAST AND MATTERS OF CONSCIENCE

Adopted, Standing Committee, October 19, 1995 Reaffirmed, Standing Committee, April 20, 2001

#### Recognizing and Reaffirming that:

- It is our privilege and responsibility as members of the Diocese of the Central Gulf Coast to support our diocese; and
- (2) The Diocese of the Central Gulf Coast is dependent on our stewardship for the extension and building up of the Kingdom of God in our diocese; and
- (3) It is the privilege and responsibility of our Diocese to support the Domestic and Foreign Missionary Society (The Episcopal Church) for the extension and building up of the Kingdom of God beyond our Diocese; and
- (4) In concurrence with our Diocesan Stewardship Statement commending the tithe as the individual minimum standard of giving and 25% as the minimum standard of giving beyond the Diocese, we should continue our support beyond our Parishes and Missions, and beyond the boundaries of the Diocese of the Central Gulf Coast, as faithfully as possible; When a congregation in whole or in part cannot faithfully meet these standards for reason of conscience, it shall be embraced and loved as a full member of this diocese.

# POLICIES FOR THE PROTECTION OF CHILDREN AND YOUTH FROM ABUSE

#### Code of Conduct for Protection of Children and Youth

Relationships among people are at the foundation of Christian ministry and as such are central to the life of the church. Defining healthy and safe relationships through policies and codes of conduct is not meant, in any way, to undermine the strength and importance of personal interaction in our ministries. Rather, it is to assist in more clearly defining behaviors and practices that allow the church to more fully demonstrate its love and compassion for children and youth in sincere and genuine relationships.

Relationships in ministry should, ideally, always be experienced as caring and without intention to do harm or allow harm to occur. This Code of Conduct has been adopted by the Episcopal Diocese of the Central Gulf Coast to help the church create safe environments for children and youth and for those who minister to them. All Church Personnel are asked to carefully consider each statement in the Code and within the Policies for the Protection of Children and Youth from Abuse before agreeing to adhere to the statements and continue in service to the church.

#### Code of Conduct for Protection of Children and Youth

- $\cdot$  Church Personnel agree to do their best to prevent abuse and neglect among children and youth involved in church activities and services.
- $\cdot$  Church Personnel agree to not physically, sexually or emotionally abuse or neglect a child or youth.
- · Church Personnel agree to comply with the policies for general conduct with children and youth as defined in these Policies for the Protection of Children and Youth from Abuse.
- · All Church Personnel agree to comply with the Guidelines for Appropriate Affection with children and youth.
- · In the event that Church Personnel observe any inappropriate behaviors or possible policy violations with children or youth, church personnel agree to immediately report their observations.
- · All Church Personnel acknowledge their obligation and responsibility to protect children and youth and agree to report known or suspected abuse of children or youth to appropriate church leaders and state authorities in accordance with these policies.

· Church Personnel understand that the church will not tolerate abuse of children and youth and agree to comply in spirit and in action with this position.

#### **General Definitions**

- **A. Church Personnel**: For the purposes of this policy, the following are included in the definition of Church Personnel when they are functioning in their respective roles for the church:
- 1. All clergy, whether stipendiary, non-stipendiary, or otherwise, who are engaged in ministry or service to the church.
- 2. All paid personnel, whether employed in areas of ministry or other kinds of services by the diocese, its congregations, schools or other agencies.
- 3. Those who contract their services to the diocese, its congregations, schools or other agencies.
- 4. Volunteers, including any person who enters into or offers him or herself for a church related service, or who actually assists with or performs a service, whether or not they have been selected or assigned to do so. Volunteers include members of advisory boards, vestries, Bishop's Committees, and boards of directors.
- **B.** Children and youth: A child is defined as anyone under the age of 12 years. A youth is defined as anyone who is at least 12 years old, but not yet 18 years old. A youth may also be an individual who is 18 years old or older, but still in high school.
- **C. Regularly or Occasionally Work With or Around Children or Youth:** For the purpose of this policy, the following are included in the definition of Church Personnel who **Regularly Work With or Around Children or Youth:**
- 1. All clergy, whether stipendiary, non-stipendiary, or otherwise, who are engaged in ministry or service to the church.
- 2. All paid or volunteer Church Personnel whose work regularly takes them throughout the facility or grounds or who has keys giving them access to the buildings on the grounds.
- 3. All persons who supervise or assist with supervising children or youth (other than church school teachers) in ministries, programs or activities more often than occasionally.
- 4. All persons who provide transportation to children or youth without other adults in the vehicle more often than occasionally.
- 5. Any paid personnel whose living quarters are on the grounds of the church, school or other related agency.
- 6. All vestry members or other members of similar decision-making groups who have the authority to approve the creation of ministries, programs or activities for children or youth.

Examples of Church Personnel who **Regularly Work With or Around Children or Youth** include, but are not limited to:

- · Children's or youth choir directors
- · Organists who work with children or youth
- · Lay youth ministers
- · Volunteer youth directors

- · All Church Personnel who work or assist in the nursery more than four times a year
- $\cdot$  All Church Personnel who work in the nursery if they are the only person over 21 present at any time
- · All staff, whether volunteer or paid, at church camps
- $\cdot$  Adults who participate in overnight activities with children or youth more than twice a year

For the purpose of this policy, the following are included in the definition of Church Personnel who **occasionally Work With or Around Children or Youth:** 

- 1. Church school teachers.
- 2. All persons who supervise or assist with supervising children or youth in ministries, programs or activities infrequently, generally no more than three times a year or for one program or activity during a year that lasts less than a month (i.e. assisting with preparation for the Christmas pageant, or teaching one "unit" of Church School for a month).
- 3. All persons who provide transportation to children or youth without other adults in the vehicle infrequently, generally no more than three times a year.
- 4. All persons who work or assist in the nursery four or fewer times a year, whether on an emergency basis or otherwise.
- 5. Adults who participate in overnight activities with children or youth once or twice a year.

#### D. Types of abuse

- 1. **Physical abuse** is non-accidental injury, which is intentionally inflicted upon a child or youth.
- 2. **Sexual abuse perpetrated by an adult** is any contact or activity of a sexual nature that occurs between a child or youth and an adult. This includes any activity, which is meant to arouse or gratify the sexual desires of the adult, child or youth.
- 3. **Sexual abuse perpetrated by another child or youth** is any contact or activity of a sexual nature that occurs between a child or youth and another child or youth when there is no consent, when consent is not possible, or when one child or youth has power over the other child or youth. This includes any activity which is meant to arouse or gratify the sexual desires of any of the children or youth.
- 4. Emotional abuse is mental or emotional injury to a child or youth that results in an observable and material impairment in the child or youth's growth, development or psychological functioning.
- 5. **Neglect** is the failure to provide for a child or youth's basic needs or the failure to protect a child or youth from harm.
- 6. **Economic exploitation** is the deliberate misplacement, exploitation, or wrongful temporary or permanent use of a child or youth's belongings or money.

#### Safeguards for Children and Youth

#### A. Screening and Selection

- **1.** Any and all Church Personnel who Regularly Work With or Around Children or Youth shall be screened and selected utilizing at least the following:
- a. **A standard application** completed by the applicant that includes an authorization for the release of information to conduct background checks and the Code of Conduct

- b. **Criminal records check** in any state where the applicant has resided during the past seven (7) years, and other states, if any, as determined by the church.
- c. **Sexual offender registry check** in any state where the applicant has resided during the past seven (7) years.
- d. Individual interview with the applicant.
- e. **Reference checks** of persons outside the congregation who know the applicant, preferably who know how the applicant works with children.
- f. **Driving or Motor Vehicle records** check if the person may be transporting children or youth.
- **2.** Any and all Church Personnel who Occasionally Work With or Around Children or Youth shall be screened and selected utilizing at least the following:
- a. A standard application completed by the applicant that includes an acknowledgment for the release of information to conduct background checks and the Code of Conduct.
- b. Individual interview with the applicant.
- c. **At least one Reference Check** of a person or persons outside the congregation who know the applicant, preferably who know how the applicant interacts with children.
- d. **Driving or Motor Vehicle records check** if the person will be transporting children or youth.
- **3.** All information gathered about an applicant will be carefully reviewed and evaluated to make a determination, in consultation with others as necessary, of whether or not the person is appropriate to work with children or youth.
- **4.** Church Personnel who work with or around children or youth must have a personnel file that is kept where other church records are kept.
- **5.** Criminal records checks and sexual offender registry checks will be conducted every five (5) years for Church Personnel who Regularly Work With or Around Children or Youth.
- **6.** To the extent possible, no person will be permitted to supervise an immediate family member when working with or around children or youth. For the purpose of this policy, immediate family member is defined as spouse, partner, child, parent, sister, brother, similar in-law relationship, stepchild, stepparent, step-sibling, grandparent, or co-habitant.
- 7. Church Personnel who transfer within the Diocese of The Central Gulf Coast and apply for or are asked to or who do undertake a position working with or around children or youth are required to undergo the same screening and selection process in Section A above. This requirement may be met through a transfer of a copy of their personnel file to the new congregation, school, agency, or program together with completion of a new application, individual interview and reference checks with the congregations, schools, agencies or other programs for which the applicant has worked with or around children or youth since the screening was last done as shown in the applicant's personnel file.

#### **B.** Education and Training Requirements

1. Three hours of child abuse prevention education and training is required for all Church Personnel Who Regularly Work With or Around Children or Youth before they start their work with children or youth or, if that is not possible, one hour of child abuse awareness training before they start their work and the rest of the training within three months of starting.

- 2. One hour of child abuse awareness education and training is required for all Church Personnel Who Occasionally Work With or Around Children or Youth before they start their work with children or youth.
- 3. Church Personnel who are responsible for screening, selection and supervision of others in programs for children and youth are required to complete an additional three (3) hours of specialized education and training in screening, selection and monitoring every two years.

#### C. Monitoring and Supervision of Programs

The monitoring and supervision of programs and activities involving children or youth is important for safeguarding children and youth and involves several aspects. One aspect involves having structural guidelines or standards for the programs and activities for children and youth. These include such things as who approves new programs, how many adults need to be present and the like. In addition to setting structural guidelines and standards, church leaders must make sure the structural safeguards are followed. Programs and activities have to be monitored and supervised to do that.

Another aspect of monitoring and supervision is that supervisory personnel and others monitor and supervise the behavior of adults, youth and other children with children and youth, so that inappropriate behaviors and interactions can be detected and stopped. Some behaviors and interactions are potentially harmful to children or youth in and of themselves. Examples include providing alcohol or drugs to children or youth or actually having sexual contact with a child or youth. Other behaviors and interactions are not necessarily harmful in and of themselves but are the same behaviors and interactions known to be used by those who abuse children or youth to "groom" them or their parents for eventual abuse or which provide the privacy child molesters need in order to abuse children or youth. Examples of those behaviors and interactions include holding children over the age of three on the lap, transporting a child or youth alone, and the like.

The structural guidelines and standards are covered in both this Monitoring and Supervision section and in the following section, General Conduct for the Protection of Children and Youth. The behaviors and interactions of persons with children and youth that need to be monitored and supervised are covered in the section on General Conduct for the Protection of Children and Youth and in the Guidelines for Appropriate Affection.

- 1. Every program for children and youth must have established ratios for adults and children in compliance with the established ratio, including activities that occur off church premises.
- 2. Church Personnel are prohibited from being alone with a child or youth or multiple children or youth where other adults cannot easily observe them.
- 3. Church Personnel over the age of 21 must directly supervise Church Personnel under the age of 18 and be physically present during all activities.
- 4. An up to date list of approved congregation-sponsored programs for children and youth will be maintained in the church office or other place where church records are kept.

- 5. Church Personnel are not permitted to develop new activities for children and youth without approval from the rector or canonical equivalent. Requests to develop new activities should be submitted in writing to the rector. The rector will consider whether the plan for a new activity includes adequate adult supervision.
- 6. Each program will develop age-appropriate procedures to ensure the safety of children and youth using restrooms and showers or baths.
- 7. When supervising or assisting private activities such as dressing, showering or diapering infants or children, Church Personnel will remain in an area observable by other adults or work in pairs.
- 8. At least two unrelated Church Personnel must supervise activities. When both boys and girls are participating, male and female adults must be present.

#### D. General Conduct for the Protection of Children and Youth

The following guidelines are intended to assist Church Personnel in monitoring and supervising behaviors and interactions with children and youth to identify and stop those that may be inherently harmful to children or youth, that are the type used by child molesters to groom children, youth and their parents, or that may create the conditions where abuse can occur more easily. These guidelines should also be used to make decisions about interactions with children and youth in church sponsored and affiliated programs. They are not designed or intended to address interactions within families. When exceptions to these guidelines must be made, they should be reported to the supervisor of the Church Personnel making the exception as soon as possible.

- 1. All Church Personnel who work with children or youth must agree to comply with the Diocese of the Central Gulf Coast's Guidelines for Appropriate Affection (Appendix A).
- 2. No person will be allowed to volunteer to Regularly Work With Children or Youth until the person has been known to the clergy and congregation for at **least six months**.
- 3. Programs for infants and children under six (6) years old will have procedures to ensure that children are released only to their parents or legal guardians or those designated by them.
- 4. Church Personnel are prohibited from the use, possession, distribution, or being under the influence of alcohol, illegal drugs, or the misuse of legal drugs while participating in or assisting with programs or activities specifically for children or youth.
- 5. Parents or guardians must complete written permission forms before Church Personnel transport children and youth for a church sponsored activity or for any purpose on more than an occasional basis.
- 6. Church Personnel will respond to children and youth with respect, consideration and equal treatment, regardless of sex, race, religion, sexual orientation, culture or socio-economic status. Church Personnel will portray a positive role model for children and youth by maintaining an attitude of respect, patience, and maturity. They will avoid even the appearance of favoritism.
- 7. One-to-one counseling with children or youth will be done in an open or public or other place where private conversations are possible but occur in full view of others.
- 8. Church Personnel are prohibited from dating or becoming romantically involved with a child or youth.

- 9. Church Personnel are prohibited from having sexual contact with a child or youth. 10. Church Personnel are prohibited from possessing any sexually oriented materials (magazines, cards, videos, DVDs, films, clothing etc.) on church property or in the presence of children or youth except as expressly permitted as part of a pre-authorized educational program.
- 11. Church Personnel are prohibited from using the Internet to view or download any sexually oriented materials on church property or in the presence of children or youth.
- 12. Church Personnel are prohibited from discussing their own sexual activities, including dreams and fantasies, or discussing their use of sexually oriented or explicit materials such as pornography, videos or materials on or from the Internet, with children or youth.
- 13. Church Personnel are prohibited from sleeping in the same beds, sleeping bags, tents, hotel rooms or other rooms with children or youth unless the adult is an immediate family member of all children or youth in the bed, sleeping bag, tent, hotel room or other room. It is acceptable to have multiple adults sleep with all the children or youth participating in one open space such as a church basement or camp lodge.
- 14. Church Personnel are prohibited from dressing, undressing, bathing, or showering in the presence of children or youth.
- 15. Church Personnel are prohibited from using physical punishment in any way for behavior management of children and youth. No form of physical discipline is acceptable. This prohibition includes spanking, slapping, pinching, hitting, or any other physical force. Physical force may only be used to stop a behavior that may cause immediate harm to the individual or to a child, youth or others.
- 16. Church Personnel are prohibited from using harsh language, degrading punishment, or mechanical restraint such as rope or tape for behavior management.
- 17. Church Personnel are prohibited from participating in or allowing others to conduct any hazing activities relating to children's or youth ministry or camp activities.

#### **Responding to Problems**

#### A. Reporting Inappropriate Behaviors or Policy Violations with children or youth

- 1. When Church Personnel observe any inappropriate behaviors, behaviors that are inconsistent with the Guidelines for Appropriate Affection, or which may violate any provision of these Policies for the Protection of Children and Youth from Abuse, they must immediately report their observations. Examples of inappropriate behaviors or policy violations would be seeking private time with children or youth, taking children or youth on over-night trips without other adults, swearing or making suggestive comments to children or youth, or selecting or using staff or volunteers without the required screening.
- 2. Such inappropriate behaviors or possible policy violations that relate to interactions with children or youth should be reported in one of the following ways:
- a. A telephone call or meeting with the immediate supervisor of the person,
- b. A telephone call or meeting with the rector, if the person is not the rector;
- c. A telephone call or meeting with a church warden if the person is the rector;
- d. A telephone call, meeting or fax to the bishop;
- e. Submit a Notice of Concern signed or unsigned, to the bishop.
- 3. All reports of inappropriate behavior or policy violations with children or youth will be taken seriously.

#### B. Reporting Suspected Abuse of Children or Youth

- 1. All Church Personnel are required by this policy to report known or suspected abuse of children or youth to the appropriate state authorities.
- 2. Failure to report suspected abuse of children or youth may be a crime. Reports may be made confidentially or anonymously. Every state provides immunity from civil liability for persons required to report suspected abuse in good faith and without malice. Simply stated, "in good faith" means that the person submitting the report believes what he or she is reporting to be true.
- 3. In addition to reporting to the state authorities, Church Personnel are required to report any suspected or known abuse of children or youth that may have been perpetrated by Church Personnel directly to the rector of the parish or institution so that immediate and proper steps may be taken to ensure the safety of alleged victims.
- 4. Reports of suspected or known abuse that involve Church Personnel may be reported to the Diocese of The Central Gulf Coast in the following ways:
- a. A telephone call, meeting or fax to the bishop;
- b. A telephone call or meeting with the rector, if the rector is not the person being complained about.
- c. Submit a Notice of Concern signed or unsigned, to the bishop.
- 5. The Diocese of The Central Gulf Coast and the parish or institution will cooperate with any investigation by state authorities to the fullest extent appropriate, and inform authorities that a concurrent internal investigation will be directed by the Diocese of The Central Gulf Coast.

#### **Appendix**

#### A. Guidelines for Appropriate Affection

The Diocese of The Central Gulf Coast and the parish or institution are committed to creating and promoting a positive, nurturing environment for our children's and youth ministries that protect our children and youth from abuse and our Church Personnel from misunderstandings. When creating safe boundaries for children and youth, it is important to establish what types of affection are appropriate and inappropriate; otherwise that decision is left to each individual. Stating which behaviors are appropriate and inappropriate allows Church Personnel to comfortably show positive affection in ministry, and yet identify individuals who are not maintaining safe boundaries with children or youth. These Guidelines are based, in large part, on avoiding behaviors known to be used by child molesters to groom children or youth and their parents for future abuse. The following guidelines are to be carefully followed by all Church Personnel working around or with children or youth.

- 1. Love and affection are part of church life and ministry. There are many ways to demonstrate affection while maintaining positive and safe boundaries with children and youth. Some positive and appropriate forms of affection are listed below:
- · Brief hugs.
- · Pats on the shoulder or back.
- · Handshakes.
- · "High-fives" and hand slapping.
- · Verbal praise.
- · Touching hands, faces, shoulders and arms of children or youth.
- · Arms around shoulders.

- · Holding hands while walking with small children.
- · Sitting beside small children.
- · Kneeling or bending down for hugs with small children.
- · Holding hands during prayer.
- · Pats on the head when culturally appropriate. (For example, this gesture should typically be avoided in some Asian communities).
- 2. The following forms of affection are considered inappropriate with children and youth in ministry setting because many of them are the behaviors that child molesters use to groom children or youth and their parents for later molestation or can be, in and of themselves, sexual abuse.
- · Inappropriate or lengthy embraces.
- · Kisses on the mouth.
- · Holding children over three years old on the lap.
- · Touching bottoms, chests or genital areas other than for appropriate diapering or toileting of infants and toddlers.
- $\cdot$  Showing affection in isolated areas such as bedrooms, closets, staff only areas or other private rooms.
- · Occupying a bed with a child or youth
- · Touching knees or legs of children or youth.
- · Wrestling with children or youth.
- · Tickling children or youth.
- · Piggyback rides.
- · Any type of massage given by a child or youth to an adult.
- $\cdot$  Any type of massage given by an adult to a child or youth.
- · Any form of unwanted affection.
- $\cdot$  Comments or compliments (spoken, written, or electronic) that relate to physique or body development. Examples would be, "You sure are developing," or "You look really hot in those jeans."
- · Snapping bras or giving wedgies or similar touch of underwear whether or not it is covered by other clothing.
- · Giving gifts or money to individual children or youth.
- · Private meals with individual children or youth.

#### **GUNS AT WORK POLICY**

Adopted, Standing Committee, June 22, 2001

RESOLVED, the following shall be considered a guns at work policy of the Standing Committee: "No firearm of any type shall be permitted on or in any church building, chapel, educational building, or parish house, of any parish, mission, or mission station and on the grounds or in the buildings of any diocesan institution (Beckwith Camp & Conference Center, Murray House, Wilmer Hall) in the Diocese of the Central Gulf Coast."

#### POLICY ON SERVING ALCOHOLIC BEVERAGES

Adopted at the  $18^{TH}$  Annual Convention of the Diocese of the Central Gulf Coast, February 18, 1989, St. Paul's, Mobile, Alabama.

Minimum guidelines (or standards) for use by parishes and missions pertaining to the serving of alcoholic beverages on the premises of parishes and missions in the Diocese of the Central Gulf Coast:

- 1. All applicable federal, state, and local laws shall be obeyed including those governing the serving of alcoholic beverages to minors.
- 2. Alcoholic beverages and food containing alcohol must be clearly labeled as such.
- 3. Whenever alcohol is served, non-alcoholic alternatives must always be offered with equal attractiveness and accessibility.
- The serving of alcoholic beverages at church events should not be publicized as an attraction of the event.
- 5. The group or organization sponsoring the activity or event at which alcoholic beverages are served must have permission from the Rector or Vicar and Vestry for this plan.
- Recognizing the effect of alcohol as a mood-altering drug, it would be advisable to consider the nature of the function at which alcoholic beverages are proposed to be served.
- 7. Chemical usage other than alcohol is clearly controlled under federal, state, and local laws and, as such, should be forbidden at any church foundation.

## STANDING COMMITTEE RESOLUTION and FORM for PARISHES and MISSIONS TO USE WHEN MORTGAGING PROPERTY

WHEREAS, from time to time it is necessary for congregations to borrow funds for construction or other purposes, and mortgage properties as security for such loans.

WHEREAS, standards are necessary for an orderly procedure in applying for approval of such loans and mortgages, therefore be it

RESOLVED, that the total amount of indebtedness of a Parish or Mission shall not under ordinary circumstances, exceed one-and-a-half times the average of the current and past two years' annual operating budget of the Parish or Mission, and be it

FURTHER RESOLVED, that the monthly payments on indebtedness of such Parish or Mission, including interest and housing allowance if applicable, shall not exceed twenty-five (25%) of such Parish or Mission's monthly operating budget, and be it

FURTHER RESOLVED, that if any Parish or Mission is of the opinion that such limitations imposed hereon are unacceptable, it may make application to the Bishop and the Standing Committee for an exception to these provisions, provided there is supporting evidence of the ability to pay such requested indebtedness, and be it

FURTHER RESOLVED, that all requirements and necessary data outlined in this resolution be submitted to the Commission on Finance, Diocesan Office, Post Office Box 13330, Pensacola, Florida 32591-3330, not less than one month prior to a scheduled meeting of the Standing Committee, and be it

FURTHER RESOLVED, that this resolution and the Form for Use of a Parish or Mission When Mortgaging Property or Borrowing from the Congregational Loan Fund shall be published annually in the Diocesan Journal.

THE FOLLOWING RESOLUTION WAS ADOPTED BY THE  $38^{\mathrm{TH}}$  ANNUAL CONVENTION OF THE DIOCESE:

RESOLVED, that a current audit report required by Canon 10, Section 2, of the Diocesan Canons be prepared and submitted by any congregation or agency that seeks Diocesan approval for any loan transaction, including any renewal or refinancing, or that requests a loan from the Congregational Loan Fund.

#### **GUIDELINES FOR CONGREGATIONAL LOAN FUND**

Adopted March 17, 1983 Amended January 25, 2010

RESOLVED, that the Standing Committee approved the following guidelines for a CONGREGATIONAL LOAN FUND (CLF):

- 1. The total amount of indebtedness of a congregation shall not under ordinary circumstances, exceed one-and-a-half times the average of the current, and past two (2) years annual operating income of the congregation.
- 2. The monthly payments on indebtedness of such congregation, including interest, and housing allowance if applicable, shall not exceed 25% of each congregation's monthly operating income.
- 3. Any congregation is eligible to borrow up to \$20,000 from the CLF, regardless of the operating income formula.
- 4. Mission congregations are eligible to borrow up to one and one-half times average of the current, and past two (2) years' annual operating income from the CLF.
- 5. Parish congregations are eligible to borrow up to 75% of the average of the current, and past two (2) years annual operating income from the CLF.
- 6. Rates and terms for loans to mission congregations and Diocesan institutions from the CLF are 4% per annum and for loans to parishes, 5% per annum, with the amortization terms to be up to fifteen years, with a five year balloon note if more than five years is required to pay off the loan. Payments to the CLF will be monthly unless arranged otherwise.
- Any extraordinary loan request or grant request should be submitted to the Bishop for consideration.

# ADMINISTRATIVE PROCEDURES TO BE FOLLOWED BY VESTRY

- 1. Engineering, construction and other necessary contracts should be with the Diocesan corporation, as owner. In similar fashion, bonds, insurance and other underwriting should run in favor of the Diocesan corporation.
- 2. All such contracts, bonds, insurance and the like should be negotiated and/or procured by the Vestry undertaking such construction. Contracts should be forwarded to the Diocesan office with a statement by the vestry that such instruments have the approval of the vestry and with a request that they be executed by the Diocesan corporation.
- Mortgages and notes to finance any such construction must be executed by the Diocesan corporation, whether it be temporary financing for construction or permanent financing.
- 4. Where there is temporary construction financing, it would be desirable for the Vestry to designate some local bank or other institution as a trustee to disburse funds upon requisition by a designated person. The vestry will request that the Diocese approve a named person as agent to approve requisitions for payment.
- 5. The Diocese should obtain from the responsible vestry a letter or statement incorporated in the request for the execution of the construction contracts, agreeing that the parish will repay the debt with all costs and expenses thereto.

# 2015 Diocesan Minimum Compensation for Full-Time Clergy

The Standing Committee has determined, effective January 1, 2015, that the initial minimum compensation schedule for clergy with 0-4 years of experience will be as follows:

Years of Service in the Episcopal Ministry	Minimum Annual Salary for Full-Time Clergy

The new minimum standard is a 1.7% increase from 2014 and aligns with both the Social Security Cost of Living Adjustment (COLA) and the Church Pension Group annual recommendations.

Remember that these are minimum salary standards and not maximums. It is recommended that that clergy and staff compensation should be based on the local circumstances, not just on the minimum requirement; merit should be recognized. Of course, a balance should be met between raising minimum salaries and reward for service and performance. If appropriate and affordable, congregations are encouraged to provide increases for merit. Do note that salaries lower than these minimums will be permitted only with agreement between the Bishop and the clergy involved.

These minimums include a housing allowance to fit the individual circumstances; they do not include travel. Business travel is reimbursed at the IRS allowance. Clergy are required to be included in the Church Pension Fund. Clergy are to be included in a Church Medical Trust group medical plan and provided an agreed upon portion of the cost of their insurance. Your church also pays the premium for a clergy group life insurance policy. Dental and/or short-term disability insurance are at the negotiated options of the parties.

The pay for supply clergy will remain the same in 2015, \$175 for one service and \$200 for two services on the same Sunday, plus the IRS allowable rate for automobile mileage reimbursement (57.5 cents per mile in 2015).

# **CANON 17**

Section 6. The Parish Vestry shall pay its clergy at least the minimum salary and allowance which have been or may be established by the Standing Committee for clergy serving in this diocese.

EXPENSE ALLOWANCE: Clergy should have a Qualified Reimbursement Plan (QRP) approved by their vestry to be reimbursed for travel and automobile expenses, meals and lodging expenses, if away from home overnight, as well as allowable educational expenses.

CAR ALLOWANCE: The car allowance standard refers to Diocesan clergy, and one of the following alternatives should be utilized and mutually agreed upon between vestry and clergyman:

- 1. Reimbursed for use of personal automobile for business use at the IRS allowable rate for automobile mileage reimbursement. (For 2015 the rate is 57.5¢ per mile.)
- 2. The congregation supplies the car and makes provisions for work-use expense.

HOUSING AND HOUSING ALLOWANCES: The Standing Committee reviewed the subject of clergy housing and reached the conclusion that it is advantageous for a clergyman to be provided a housing allowance. He can then select housing commensurate with the allowance and in keeping with the size of his family. This would allow the clergyman to begin accumulating an equity and at the same time take advantage of certain income tax advantages which accrue when a clergyman buys his own house. It also provides a measure of security in the event of his retirement or death. This is a major problem for clergymen who live in church-owned housing.

Where a congregation decides to sell an existing rectory and provide a housing allowance, every consideration should be given by said congregation to restrict use of the proceeds for capital purposes or use the income from an investment of proceeds to help provide a housing allowance.

Congregations are cautioned not to act as a financing agent for purchasers of church-owned property. The Standing Committee recommends that local banks or other like institutions be used by purchasers, since most churches are neither organized to keep up with amortization schedules nor able to take affirmative action when foreclosure becomes necessary due to non-payment on the note.

Where housing is provided, it should be kept in good repair, equipped with stove and refrigerator where required, and, if possible, carpeting and drapes in the main rooms. Additionally, full payment of heat, water, gas, electricity, sewage and garbage disposal, and church-related telephone calls is standard.

MOVING EXPENSES: Where a parish issues a call to a clergyman, the payment of his moving expenses by the calling parish to the new position is standard. In the case of calls by the Bishop to mission churches, it is suggested that the local congregations and the Diocese come to an agreement on the amount of sharing the moving expenses.

GROUP LIFE INSURANCE: All active clergy, retired clergy canonically resident in the Diocese, and lay employees of the Diocese, will be enrolled through the Church Life Insurance Corporation, a subsidiary of the Church Pension Fund, for life insurance coverage. This coverage will be in the amount of \$40,000 life benefit for clergy; \$50,000 for lay employees of the diocesan office; \$40,000 Accident Death and Dismemberment coverage and \$2,000 benefit for retired clergy. Premiums for Group Life Insurance will be paid by the employing unit, except that lay employees of parishes may participate in this program by paying premiums as they become due.

COMPREHENSIVE MEDICAL INSURANCE - (adopted by the Standing Committee October 15, 2012):

In accordance with Resolution A177 adopted by the 76<sup>th</sup> General Convention of the Episcopal Church and Resolution B026 at the 77<sup>th</sup> General Convention of the Episcopal Church, and to comply with Title 1, Canon 8, Section 1 of the Constitution, and Canons of the Episcopal Church, effective January 1, 2013:

- The Episcopal Diocese of the Central Gulf Coast and all of its congregations shall participate in health insurance coverage administered by the Church Pension Group through the Episcopal Church Medical Trust, for all qualified employees (those employed to work 1,500 scheduled hours or more per year);
- · Employees may formally opt-out of the Diocesan medical coverage if they have health care benefits through other approved sources (e.g. coverage under spouse's plan, former employer, or government plan (TRICARE, Medicare, etc.));
- · Schools, and other institutions (Beckwith, Murray House, and Wilmer Hall) whether or not they operate under a separate tax ID from the sponsoring institution, are encouraged to participate in the Diocesan plan through the Episcopal Church Medical Trust on the same basis, but will not be required to do so.

The Episcopal Church Medical Trust offers seven separate plans for church employees. Congregations will be billed monthly, by the Episcopal Church Medical Trust, for the appropriate premiums for their employees.

MAJOR MEDICAL SUPPLEMENT TO MEDICARE: Retired clergy are eligible for major medical supplement to Medicare at age 65 or over, providing an annual benefit up to \$50,000 and a lifetime maximum benefit of \$200,000. Retired clergy canonically resident in the Diocese at the time of their retirement are eligible for a Medicare Supplement benefit from the Episcopal Church Medical Trust of the Church Pension Fund, based on years of service. One such plan is at no cost to qualified participants. Other plans are available if a participant chooses, at their own expense.

Retired lay employees of congregations may participate in this program by paying premiums when they become due. Medicare supplement premiums (approximately 85% of the appropriate premium), for retired lay employees of the Diocesan office and their dependents, will be paid by the Diocese based on the total number of years of service, which need not be continuous:

In the case of retirement before age 65 and eligibility for Medicare, clergy and spouse will pay the premium for their appropriate benefit, except in the case of disability retirement.

LAY EMPLOYEES PENSION - The following resolution was adopted by the Standing Committee at a regular scheduled meeting October 15, 2012:

In accordance with Resolution A138 adopted by the 76th General Convention of the Episcopal Church and Resolution C042 adopted by the 77th General Convention of the Episcopal Church, and in compliance with Title 1, Canon 8, Section 1 of the Episcopal Church, no later than January 1, 2013:

- The Episcopal Diocese of the Central Gulf Coast and all of its congregations shall participate in the Lay Employees Pension Plan provided by the Church Pension Fund (CPF) of the Episcopal Church for all qualified employees (those employed to work 1,000 scheduled hours or more per year);
- · Lay employees pensions systems shall offer benefits that shall include the Defined Benefit Plan(s) and Defined Contribution Plan(s):
- · If the Defined Benefit Plan is selected, the employer's assessment and/or contribution shall not be less than 9% of the employee's compensation;
- If the Defined Contribution Plan is selected, the employer's contribution will be a minimum of 5% of the employee's compensation, plus a match of 1% for an employee's 1%, up to a total of an additional 4% (at the maximum, the employer's portion will be 9%);
- · Employers currently providing lay pension benefits through a non-CPF Defined Benefit Plan may continue to use that plan as long as the plan delivers pension benefits not less than the pension benefits required by Resolution A138. Employers, other than schools, that are currently providing lay pension benefits through a non-CPF Defined Contribution Plan must enroll in the Church Pension Fund Defined Contribution Plan no later than January 1, 2013;
- Schools that the Diocese had determined to be subject to the authority of the church and who are not currently providing benefits through a Defined Benefit Plan must adopt either a TIAA-CREF sponsored plan or CPF sponsored pension plan no later than January 1, 2013;
- · Schools have an extended phase in schedule on employer contributions, allowing them to be in full compliance by January 1, 2018.

WORKERS' COMPENSATION INSURANCE: All parish and mission clergy and all lay employees of all parishes and missions and of the Diocese, with the exception of those persons employed in Parochial schools, will be covered under a blanket Workers' Compensation Insurance policy written through the Diocese. This will cover accidental or occupational disease arising out of or in the course of employment. State laws vary, but in general, medical expense is paid, with a small weekly benefit. Congregations will be billed individually for these premiums.

**PROPERTY AND CASUALTY INSURANCE:** Canon 17, Section 7 provides "the parish vestry shall procure such property and liability insurance coverage as the Standing Committee may establish from time to time." The following Standing Committee Policy was adopted October 5, 1993:

- Each church and church institution in the Diocese should be covered by the same insurance carrier if possible.

- If being on the same policy is not practical, the church policy should be concurrent
  with the diocesan policy in dollar limits and coverage, including 90% percent to
  replacement value cost coverage on property insurance and the same dollar
  amount for liability coverage.
- Congregations or institutions must comply with minimum policy limits on the diocesan policy or must be on the diocesan policy in order to insure concurrent coverage in the case of sexual misconduct liability.
- On "outside policies", the Diocese shall be named as "an additional named insured" and the diocesan office shall be furnished a complete copy of the policy.

ANNUAL LEAVE: All active clergy are to be provided four weeks annual leave or vacation with pay, which can be taken at a time agreed upon by the Rector and/or Vicar and the Vestry. Lay employees in the Diocesan office shall have the following annual leave schedule: 0-2 years, two weeks; 3-7 years, three weeks; over 7 years, four weeks. Lay employees of parishes, missions, and Diocesan institutions should also have an established annual leave policy.

LEAVE OF ABSENCE FOR CONTINUING EDUCATION: All employees are encouraged to continue professional or advanced education or training. This can be taken at an agreed-upon time. The amount of time for this purpose is a decision of the parties involved.

MILITARY LEAVE: Leave of absence must be granted for employees who are conscripted or enlist in the Armed Services. Payment will be made through the last day worked; and, upon return, such persons are entitled to all the re-employment benefits of the Selective Services Act.

Absences for a short period (usually not more than two weeks) shall be granted for annual training and special active duty for those members of reserve units who have such obligations. Pay will be continued during the period, if possible.

JURY DUTY: Excused absence will be granted with part pay, the employing unit paying the difference between the jury fee and the employee's regular salary. If the jury duty assignment only requires a part of the work day, it is expected the employee will return to complete the balance of the normal regular work day.

DEATH IN THE FAMILY: An emergency leave with pay should be granted in the event of death in the immediate family of a regular employee with at least three months' service. Immediate family includes parent, step-parent, spouse, child, step-child, brother or sister. The length of time may be up to three days, depending on the travel distance.

SICK LEAVE - CLERGY AND EXECUTIVE LAY EMPLOYEES: It is suggested that clergy and executive lay employees be maintained on sick leave with full pay up to 13 consecutive weeks of prolonged illness. Salary payment may then reasonably be discontinued, although adjudication should be made in each instance, and there may be circumstances where this policy should be extended for a longer period.

SICK LEAVE - OTHER LAY EMPLOYEES: It is suggested that full-time lay employees, other than described above, absent from work because of illness shall during such illness receive up to 15 working days' full pay in any calendar year.

In the case of a long-term employee suffering from a long-term illness, the Vestry, the Rector, the Bishop or the Standing Committee, as the case may be, could give special consideration to extension of sick leave beyond prescribed limitations, taking into account the employee's record of use of sick leave.

Good personnel practice elaborates the right of an employer to require a medical report or evaluation where prolonged illness deprives the office of the services of a staff member or where frequent brief illnesses cut seriously into efficiency. It should be pointed out also the obligation of a staff member in justice to inform the employing unit of health factors which may interfere significantly with effective fulfillment of duties.

OFF-DAYS - Clergy and lay employees will be expected to take a minimum of one day each week away from his or her work.

OTHER TIME SPENT AWAY FROM LOCAL CONGREGATIONS: Many clergy have skills that can be utilized outside their parish, both for their own personal growth and for the assistance of other agencies. Time spent away should be on a clear agreement between a vestry and its clergy.

HOLIDAYS: The Diocesan office will observe the following holidays:

New Year's Day Labor Day

Martin Luther King, Jr. Day

Good Friday (half day)

Thanksgiving Day

Day after Thanksgiving

Easter Monday Christmas Eve Memorial Day Christmas Day Independence Day Day after Christmas

Should a holiday fall on a Saturday or Sunday, the day recognized by the State of Florida will be substituted.

If an employee is required to work on a holiday, compensating time off should be given within 30 days, or if that is not possible, the employee should be paid at the base rate for the holiday worked.

Parishes, missions, and Diocesan institutions should have an established holiday observance policy.

SOCIAL SECURITY: Both clergy and lay employees will observe the applicable Federal laws regarding participation in the Social Security Program.

# ARTICLES OF INCORPORATION OF

# THE PROTESTANT EPISCOPAL CHURCH IN THE DIOCESE OF THE CENTRAL GULF COAST, INC.

(A Corporation Not for Profit)

We, the undersigned, with other persons being desirous of forming a corporation for religious purposes, under the provisions of Chapter 617 of the Florida Statutes, do agree to the following:

#### ARTICLE I. Name

The name of this corporation shall be: "The Protestant Episcopal Church in the Diocese of the Central Gulf Coast, Inc."

# ARTICLE II. Purposes

The general nature of the objects and purposes of this corporation shall be:

- a. To propagate and disseminate the Gospel of the Lord, Jesus Christ.
- To do all things necessary and proper in the pursuit of such objects and purposes.
- c. To be a constituent governing part of the "Protestant Episcopal Church in the United States of America" and, subject only to any limitations in the laws of Florida, the corporation recognizes, accedes to, and adopts the Constitution of the Protestant Episcopal Church in the United States of America, and acknowledges its authority accordingly.

#### ARTICLE III. Location

The office of the corporation shall be in the City of Pensacola, County of Escambia, State of Florida, or such other place as may be designated from time to time by the Annual Diocesan Convention. Under the Constitution of the Protestant Episcopal Church in the United States of America, and until further action by such national body, the jurisdiction of the corporation comprises that part of south Alabama being south of the northern boundaries of the Counties of Barbour, Pike, Crenshaw, Butler, Wilcox, Clarke and Choctaw (that is, roughly south of Montgomery and Selma and north of Eufaula, Troy and Greenville), and that part of northwest Florida which lies west of the eastern boundaries of Jackson, Calhoun and Gulf counties (that is, along the Apalachicola River, including that portion of Franklin County lying west of the River), as they exist in the year 1970.

#### ARTICLE IV. Qualification of Members

The membership of the corporation shall consist of all persons resident within the jurisdiction of the corporation who are members of the Protestant Episcopal Church as such membership may be defined from time to time by the Canons (By-Laws) of the corporation.

# ARTICLE V. Term of Existence

This corporation is to exist perpetually.

# ARTICLE VII. Organization

**Section 1.** The affairs of the corporation are to be managed by the Bishop of the Diocese (who shall be president and chief executive officer), a Standing Committee (which shall consist of not less than three (3) persons), and such other officers and committees as may be provided from time to time by the Canons (By-Laws). The Canons shall provide for the time and manner in which the Standing Committee and other officers and committees are elected or appointed.

**Section 2.** The Bishop shall be the Ecclesiastical Authority of the Diocese. When there is no Bishop, the Standing Committee shall be the Ecclesiastical Authority of the Diocese for all proper purposes.

**Section 3.** The Diocesan Convention shall be the Legislative Authority of the Diocese. It shall be composed of Clergy and Lay Delegates as provided by the Canons. There shall be an annual meeting of the Diocesan Convention at such time and place as the Canons shall provide. The Ecclesiastical Authority of the Diocese shall have power to call a Special Diocesan Convention, provided thirty (30) days' notice thereof shall be given to all Clergy and Congregations entitled to representation, in writing, specifying the time and place of meeting and the business to be transacted.

**Section 4.** The Election of a Bishop of the Diocese shall be had in Regular or Special Diocesan Convention. The quorum required for the election of a Bishop shall be two-thirds of all Clergy entitled to vote and two-thirds of all Lay Delegates entitled to be members of the Diocesan Convention. The election shall be in the following manner: After nominations have been made in open Convention, the vote shall be by Orders (Clergy and Lay) and by secret ballot, and a qualified Bishop or Presbyter shall be chosen. A concurrent majority in both Orders shall be necessary for a choice.

ARTICLE VIII. Interim Organization
The affairs of the corporation shall be managed by the following officers and bodies who shall serve until the first Annual Diocesan Convention.

#### ARTICLE IX. Canons (By-Laws)

**Section 1.** The Diocesan Convention shall provide such Canons for the conduct of the business and the carrying out of the purposes of the corporation as it may deem necessary from time to time, consistent with the Constitution and Canons of the Protestant Episcopal Church in the United States of America and the laws of the State of Florida.

**Section 2.** Such Canons shall be subject to amendment from time to time by the Diocesan Convention in such manner as may be provided therein.

# ARTICLE X. Amendments

These Articles of Incorporation may be amended by a resolution introduced in writing and considered in the Diocesan Convention. If approved by a majority of the Diocesan Convention it shall lie over until the next Diocesan Convention when, upon consideration again, if it be approved by a majority of each Order, voting separately, the amendment shall become effective.

# ARTICLE XI. Non-Profit Status

- **Section 1.** No part of the net earnings of the corporation shall inure to the benefit of any individual or member.
- **Section 2.** No person, firm or corporation shall ever receive any dividends or profits from the undertakings of this corporation.
- **Section 3.** The corporation shall not carry on propaganda, or otherwise act to influence legislation.

**Section 4.** In the event of dissolution, the residual assets of the corporation shall be turned over to one or more organizations which are exempt organizations as described in Section 501©) (3) and Section 170© of the Internal Revenue Code of 1954 or corresponding sections of any prior or future Internal Revenue Code, or by income tax regulations, amended, or to the Federal, State or local government for exclusive public purpose.

# ARTICLE XII. Powers

In order to promote the purposes of this corporation, it may acquire property by grant, gift, purchase, devise or bequest, and hold and dispose of such property as the corporation shall require for the benefit of the members and not for pecuniary profit.

# RULES OF ORDER FOR CONDUCTING THE BUSINESS OF THE CONVENTION OF THE DIOCESE OF THE CENTRAL GULF COAST

#### RULE I.

After Divine Service, the President shall take the chair, and call the Diocesan Convention to order, when the order of proceedings shall be as follows:

Section 1. The Secretary, or Assistant Secretary, of the last Diocesan Convention, if present (or the Secretary of the Standing Committee) shall determine, by roll call, or registration, which of the Clergy entitled to seats are present.

Section 2. The Secretary shall, in like manner, determine which of the Lay Delegates, for whom the Certificates of Election are in order, and who are, therefore, entitled to seats, are present.

#### RULE II.

A quorum being found present, the President shall declare the Diocesan Convention organized for business.

#### RULE III.

The Diocesan Convention shall then proceed to the election of a Secretary, who shall have the power to appoint assistants, with the concurrence of the Convention.

#### RULE IV.

The President may appoint the following standing committees of the Diocesan Convention:

- 1. Unfinished Business (Dispatch of Business)
- 2. Credentials and Privileges
- 3. Charter and Canons
- 4. Status of Parishes and Missions and Admission of New Parishes
- 5. The State of the Church
- 6. Finance
- 7. Elections
- 8. Such other committees as the President shall determine

#### RULE V.

All reports of officers and Committees to the Convention shall be in writing, and shall be submitted thirty (30) days prior to the opening of the Convention.

#### **RULE VI**

(a) All Resolutions to be presented to the Convention shall be submitted, in written form, to the Secretary forty-five (45) days prior to the opening of the Convention. These pre-filed Resolutions shall be distributed to each congregation within the Diocese no later than thirty (30) days prior to the first day of each Convention. Resolutions to alter or amend the Canons of the Diocese shall be submitted, in written form, to the Secretary not less than ninety (90) days prior to the opening of the Convention and shall be distributed to the congregations of the Diocese not less than sixty (60) days prior to the opening of Convention.

- (b) At the first business meeting of the convention, the substance of each Resolution presented under the provisions of paragraph (a) shall be made known to the Convention together with assignment of such Resolution to committees, and Resolutions shall be read at length at that time if requested. Copies of all Resolutions shall be made available at Convention to all Delegates.
- (c) Any Resolution not presented in accordance with paragraph (a) may be introduced to the Convention for consideration only by a two-thirds (2/3) vote of Convention taken at the first business meeting.
- (d) Nothing in this Rule shall prevent the Bishop from introducing new matters to the Convention for consideration or action through his address to Convention; and nothing in this Rule shall prevent a committee of Convention from introducing new matters to Convention through its majority report.
- (e) The Bishop may refer any Resolution to a committee for such action as it deems proper.

#### RULE VII.

The Order of Business shall be:

The Bishop's Address

The Report of the Standing Committee

The Reports of the General Officers

The Reports of standing committees of the Convention

The Adoption of the Operating Budget for the Diocese

The Elections of the Officers and Committees of the Diocese

#### RULE VIII.

No member shall absent himself from the sessions of the Convention unless he has leave or is unable to attend.

#### RULE IX.

When a member is about to speak in debate, or deliver any matter to the Convention, he shall rise from his seat, and, with due respect, address himself in an audible voice to the President, confining himself to the point in debate. No member shall speak twice in the same debate without leave of the Convention.

# RULE X.

When the President is putting any question, the members shall continue in their seats and not hold private discourse. Every member present shall vote when a question is put, unless excused by the Convention. In a vote by orders, the name of the President shall be called last.

# RULE XI.

When a question is under consideration, no motion shall be made unless to lay upon the table, to postpone to a certain time, to commit, to amend, or to offer a substitute. Motions for any of these purposes shall have precedence in the order named. A motion to lay on the table shall be decided without debate.

# RULE XII.

A motion to adjourn shall always be in order, and, if unqualified, shall be decided without debate.

#### RULE XIII.

No motion shall be considered as before the Convention, unless seconded and reduced to writing.

#### RULE XIV.

A question being once determined shall stand as the judgment of the convention and shall not again be considered during the session; but, a question being decided may be reconsidered with the consent of two-thirds (2/3) of the members present on a motion to that purpose by one (1) of the majority of the first decision.

#### RULE XV.

All committees shall be appointed by the President unless otherwise ordered.

#### RULE XVI.

The daily business of the Convention shall be called up and acted upon in the following order unless changed by vote of the Convention:

- 1. Communications from the President
- 2. Reports of the Standing Committee of the Diocese and other Diocesan Officers
  - 3. Reports of standing committees of the Convention.
  - 4. Reports of special committees
  - 5. Petitions and Memorials
  - 6. Motions, resolutions and general business

#### RULE XVII.

All questions of order shall be decided by the President in the first instance; but, any members may appeal from such decision, and, on such appeal, no member may speak more than once without leave of the Convention.

#### RULE XVIII.

Clergymen of the Protestant Episcopal Church not entitled to seats, and candidates for Holy Orders of the Diocese shall be admitted to the sittings of the Convention, and their names entered in the Journal, or reporting themselves to the Secretary; but without the right to take part in the proceedings.

#### RULE XIX.

The Rules of Order may be suspended by a vote of two-thirds (2/3) of the members present.

# RULE XX.

Except in conflict with the Constitution or Canons, or any Rule herein contained, the latest edition of *Roberts' Rules of Order* shall govern the interpretation of these Rules and the procedures to be followed.

#### RULE XXI.

The above shall be the Rules of Order of all future Conventions of the Diocese, unless altered or rescinded

# THE CANONS OF THE PROTESTANT EPISCOPAL CHURCH IN THE DIOCESE OF THE CENTRAL GULF COAST, INC.

#### **TERMINOLOGY**

- 1. "The Church" shall refer to The Protestant Episcopal Church in the United States of America, otherwise known as The Episcopal Church (which name is hereby recognized as also designating the Church);
- 2. "The Diocese" shall refer to The Protestant Episcopal Church in the Diocese of the Central Gulf Coast, Inc., otherwise known as The Episcopal Church in the Diocese of the Central Gulf Coast (which name is hereby recognized as also designating the name of the Diocese).
- 3. "**The Convention**" shall refer to the Diocesan Convention of The Protestant Episcopal Church in the Diocese of the Central Gulf Coast, Inc.
- 4. "**The Bishop**" shall refer to the regularly elected and consecrated Bishop who is in charge of the Diocese.
- 5. "General Constitution" and "General Canons" shall refer to the Constitution and Canons of the Church. "Constitution" and "Canons" shall refer to the Diocesan Constitution and Canons.
- 6. "**Congregation**" shall refer to a parish, an organized mission, a mission station, or a college chapel, in union with the Convention.
- 7. Whenever the words "he", "his", "vestry person", "vestry person", "clergyman", "clergymen" or words of similar import shall appear in these Canons, such words shall be construed as generic words, including males and females, except where the context clearly requires such words to mean male persons.
- 8. "General Officers of the Diocese" shall consist of the Chancellors, the Secretary, the Treasurer and the Registrar-Historiographer.
- 9. "**Rector**" shall refer to a priest canonically settled in accordance with the General Canons in a parish in union with the Convention.

"Curate" shall refer to a priest serving as an assistant, by whatever title designated, in a parish, who is canonically resident in the Diocese, and who is called by the Vestry on the recommendation of the Rector after communication with the Bishop as provided in the General Canons.

"Vicar" shall refer to a priest or deacon for a mission Congregation who is canonically resident in the Diocese and is appointed by the ecclesiastical authority.

"Priest-in-Charge" shall refer to a priest appointed by the Bishop, after consultation with the Vestry, to serve in any congregation in which there is no Rector, and who shall exercise the duties of Rector as provided in the General Canons.

"Transitional Deacon" shall refer to a deacon canonically resident in the Diocese who is determined by the ecclesiastical authority to be actively involved in training and preparation for ordination to the priesthood in the Diocese.

"Vocational Deacon" shall refer to any deacon who is not a Transitional Deacon.

"College Chaplain" shall refer to a priest or deacon for a college chapel appointed by the ecclesiastical authority.

"Agency" shall refer to any of the following organizations of the Diocese: Wilmer Hall Children's Home, Beckwith Camp and Conference Center, and Murray House.

#### **CANON 1: NAME**

The name of this corporation shall be THE PROTESTANT EPISCOPAL CHURCH IN THE DIOCESE OF THE CENTRAL GULF COAST, INC.

#### **CANON 2: ACKNOWLEDGMENT OF AUTHORITY**

The Church in the Diocese of the Central Gulf Coast, Inc. declares itself to be a constituent governing part of the "Protestant Episcopal Church in the United States of America" and, subject only to any limitations in the laws of Alabama and Florida, the corporation recognizes, accedes to, and adopts the Constitution of The Protestant Episcopal Church in the United States of America, and acknowledges its authority accordingly.

#### CANON 3: DIOCESAN CONVENTION

**Section 1.** The Diocesan Convention of The Protestant Episcopal Church in the Diocese of the Central Gulf Coast, Inc. shall be the Legislative Authority.

**Section 2.** The time and place of each Annual Diocesan Convention shall be determined by the preceding Convention. For sufficient cause, the Ecclesiastical Authority, with the consent of the Standing Committee, may change the time or place, or both; provided that written notice of such change be given to all clergy and congregations at least thirty (30) days prior to such meeting.

**Section 3.** The Ecclesiastical Authority shall have power to call a Special Diocesan Convention with the advice and consent of the Standing Committee. Thirty (30) days' notice thereof shall be given to the clergy and congregations of the Diocese, stating the business to be transacted, and the time and place of meeting. Business other than that stated in said notice can be considered only by a three-fourths (3/4) vote of the Special Diocesan Convention.

**Section 4.** The voting membership of the convention shall consist of:

- **a.** Clerical Delegates, each of whom shall be either a priest canonically resident in the Diocese, and who is Rector or Curate or Priest-in-Charge in a parish, or Vicar of a mission, or who is on the staff of the Diocese or an Agency of the Diocese; or a priest canonically resident in the Diocese who has retired in accordance with the General Canons and who serves in one of the aforesaid positions with the express approval of the Bishop according to the General Canons; or a Transitional Deacon assigned by the Bishop to a parish or mission or an Agency of the Diocese; and
  - b. Lay Delegates from the several Congregations in the Diocese, as follows: They shall be Communicants in good standing, entitled to vote in congregational meetings.
  - **c.** Each Parish shall be entitled to the following representation, based on the last Annual Report of the Parish:

Fewer than 300 communicants in good standing -- Three Delegates 300-599 communicants in good standing -- Four Delegates 600-999 communicants in good standing -- Five Delegates 1,000 or more communicants in good standing -- Six Delegates

- **d.** Each Parish failing to maintain its status as a Parish in union with the Diocese shall be entitled to two (2) Delegates.
- **e.** Each Mission Station or Organized Missions shall be entitled to the following representation:

Mission Stations and Organized Mission of fewer than 100 communicants in good standing -- One Delegate Organized Missions of 100 or more communicants in good standing -- Two Delegates

**f.** Each Congregation entitled to the above representation shall also be entitled to elect one (1) Alternate Delegate for each Delegate.

**Section 5.** Elections of Delegates, which may be by the congregation or be delegated by it to the Vestry, shall be held not later than sixty (60) days prior to the date of the Convention, and all Delegates so elected shall serve for one (1) year, or until their successors are elected, and shall also be the Delegates for all Special or Called Meetings of the Convention during their term of service. Elections shall be certified according to the following form, which shall be completed and filed with the Ecclesiastical Authority not later than sixty (60) days prior to the opening of the Convention.

**Section 6.** The expenses of the Clerical and Lay Delegates to the Convention shall be paid by the Congregations they represent and serve.

**Section 7.** All Clerical Delegates shall be required to attend the Diocesan Convention, unless excused by the Bishop.

**Section 8.** All Officers of the Diocese, all clergy canonically resident in the Diocese but not entitled to vote in Convention, Vocational Deacons, and Youth Representatives of the Diocesan Youth Committee as may be appointed by the Bishop shall be entitled to Seat and Voice in the Convention but no vote, unless otherwise qualified. The Convention may grant the Privileges of the Floor, including Seat and Voice, to visiting clergy and others, including clergy serving in the Diocese but not canonically resident. No Diocesan employee shall be eligible for election as a General Officer of the Diocese.

**Section 9.** The Convention shall sit as one (1) House, unless otherwise specified in the Canons, and each member, Clerical and Lay, shall be entitled to one (1) vote on any issue; provided that, upon call of five (5) Members, a Vote by Orders upon any issue may be required; in which case the Clerical and Lay Members shall vote separately, and concurrence in both Orders shall be required.

**Section 10.** One half  $(\frac{1}{2})$  plus one (1) of the clergy entitled to vote in Convention , and one half  $(\frac{1}{2})$  plus one (1) of the Lay Delegates entitled to vote in the Convention shall constitute a quorum, which shall be required for the transaction of business.

**Section 11.** The Bishop shall be the presiding Officer of the Convention. In the Bishop's absence, the Bishop Coadjutor, or the Suffragan Bishop, if there be one, shall preside. If no Bishop be present, the President of the Standing Committee shall call the Convention to order, and a President of the Convention, *pro tempore*, shall be elected by the Convention. **Section 12.** All elections are to be by a majority, but the Convention may, from time to time, in elections involving several persons to the same office, e.g., Deputies to General Convention, amend this rule.

**Section 13.** In the event of the occurrence of a vacancy on any committee elected by the Convention, said committee shall have the power to fill such vacancy in conformity with the provisions of the Charter and Canons. If any individual elected or appointed to perform a duty is unable, for any reason, to perform the duty for which elected or appointed, the Ecclesiastical Authority shall appoint a successor for as long as may be necessary, unless otherwise provided in the Canons.

#### **CANON 4: SUPPORT OF THE DIOCESE**

It shall be the privilege and responsibility of each Congregation to support financially and otherwise the Diocese and its programs.

#### **CANON 5: CHANCELLOR**

**Section 1.** Two Chancellors, one for the Alabama portion of the Diocese and one for the Florida portion of the Diocese, shall be nominated by the Bishop, be elected by the Diocesan Convention annually unless the nomination be rejected in which event further nominations shall be made by the Bishop until two be elected; and shall be a confirmed communicant in good standing, learned in the law. The Chancellors shall act as legal advisors of the Bishop and of the Standing Committee, and of all other committees of the Convention, whenever they may require legal advice in questions affecting the interest of the Church, in whose jurisdiction the matters rests, and shall perform such other duties as may be prescribed by Canon or by resolution of the Convention.

**Section 2.** Should the Bishop desire a Vice-Chancellor, the same procedure as in nomination and election of the Chancellors shall be followed.

#### **CANON 6: SECRETARY**

**Section 1.** The Secretary shall be nominated by the Bishop, be elected by the Diocesan Convention annually unless the nomination be rejected in which event further nominations shall be made by the Bishop until one be elected; and shall have the power to appoint assistants, with the concurrence of the Convention. The Secretary shall not be eligible for re-election for one (1) year after having served five (5) consecutive terms.

**Section 2.** The Secretary shall receive the Annual Parochial Reports of each Congregation, as required by the Canons of the Church.

**Section 3.** At the opening of each Convention, the Secretary shall furnish a list of elected Delegates and Alternates to the Committee on Credentials. During the Convention, the Secretary shall keep a careful and exact record of the proceedings

thereof. When such record has been certified by the Bishop and Secretary, it shall serve as the official minutes of the Convention.

**Section 4.** The Secretary shall be responsible for publishing the Annual Journal of the Diocese, and shall notify all persons who have been elected to any office in the Diocese of the fact that they have been chosen.

**Section 5.** The Secretary shall fulfill all the requirements of the General Canons of the Church relating to that office, and shall fulfill all other duties that normally pertain to the Office of Secretary.

#### **CANON 7: TREASURER**

**Section 1.** The Treasurer shall be nominated by the Bishop, be elected by the Diocesan Convention annually unless the nomination be rejected in which event further nomination shall be made by the Bishop until one can be elected. The Treasurer shall not be eligible for re-election for one (1) year after having served five (5) consecutive terms.

**Section 2.** The Treasurer shall be responsible for all monies collected under the authority of the Diocesan Convention, and not otherwise regulated. The Treasurer shall forward, in due time, to the Treasurer of the General Convention, the amount assessed upon the Diocese for the contingent expenses of the General Convention. The Treasurer's accounts shall be rendered to the Diocesan Convention annually, and bond shall be given in a sum, and with security, satisfactory to the Standing Committee. The Treasurer shall perform such other duties as pertain to the office, or which shall be enjoyed by the Convention. The Treasurer shall, from time to time, make such recommendations regarding finances as may seem to be for the best interests of the Diocese.

**Section 3.** The Treasurer shall furnish to the Secretary, prior to the convention, a list of all Congregations and their contributions to the Diocese.

**Section 4.** An Assistant Treasurer may be elected by the Convention, upon the nomination of the Bishop.

# **CANON 8: REGISTRAR-HISTORIOGRAPHER**

**Section 1.** The Registrar-Historiographer shall be elected annually by the Diocesan Convention.

**Section 2.** The Registrar-Historiographer shall gather, receive and safeguard all materials of historical significance in the Diocese and the several Parishes and Missions, and shall present to each Convention a report of all such events as may deemed to be of permanent interest and importance.

# **CANON 9: STANDING COMMITTEE**

**Section 1.** The Standing Committee shall consist of six (6) presbyters qualified to vote in Convention and nine (9) lay Confirmed Communicants in good standing. Of those to be initially elected by the Primary Convention, three (3) presbyters and three (3) lay communicants shall be nominated to the Convention by the Bishop, and three (3) presbyters and six (6) lay communicants shall be nominated by the Convention itself. At the first meeting after their election the members of the Standing Committee shall decide by drawing for terms their tenure of office as follows:

Of those nominated by the Bishop one (1) presbyter and one (1) lay communicant

each to hold office for one (1) year, and one (1) of each to hold office for two (2) years, and one (1) of each to hold office for three (3) years; and of those nominated by the Convention one (1) presbyter and two (2) lay communicants to hold office for one (1) year, one (1) presbyter and two (2) lay communicants to hold office for three (3) years, and one (1) presbyter and two (2) lay communicants to hold office for three (3) years; so that thereafter the Convention shall elect annually persons to succeed those whose terms shall have expired at the said date and who, when so elected, shall serve the full term of three (3) years and until their successors are elected. Persons elected to succeed in office predecessors elected on nomination by the Bishop also shall be elected upon nomination by the Bishop; and in like manner those elected to succeed in office predecessors elected on nomination by the Convention, shall also be elected upon nomination by the Convention. A person who has served a full three (3) year term on the Standing Committee shall be ineligible to re-election for one (1) year after the term of office shall have expired. Vacancies occurring between Annual Conventions may be filled for the unexpired term thereof by a majority vote of the remaining members.

Section 2. The Standing Committee shall:

- **a.** Be a council of advice to the Bishop and shall fulfill, and in no manner be contrary to, the General Constitution and General Canons.
- **b.** Act as a planning committee for the Diocese, and shall advise the Bishop and/or the Diocesan Convention of procedures or actions which it deems wise to be taken under consideration.
- **c.** Establish a Finance Committee or Department of Finance, which shall give effect to the standard business methods in Church affairs, and which shall fulfill such other duties as may be given to it from time to time by the Convention.
- **d.** Have no legislative authority of its own except such as may be provided by the General Canons, and such as may be given to it from time to time by the Convention.
- **Section 3.** The Standing Committee shall annually elect its President and such other Officers as it may determine, and shall define their duties. It shall keep a record of its proceedings and make an annual report of them to the Convention, except such as pertain to the exercise of its function as a council of advice to the Bishop.
- **Section 4.** The Standing Committee shall hold regular meetings, not less than four (4) times each year, at such time and place as it may select, and at such other times as it may be called into session by the President thereof, by the Bishop, or by any four (4) of its members. A majority of the members shall constitute a quorum.

# **CANON 10: FINANCE**

**Section 1.** The fiscal year begins January 1.

**Section 2.** All accounts of the Diocese shall be audited annually by a Certified Public Accountant. All accounts of Parishes, Missions or other institutions shall be audited annually by a Certified Public Accountant, or Licensed Public Accountant, or such audit committee as shall be authorized by the Finance Committee, or other appropriate Diocesan authority.

**Section 3.** There shall be a Diocesan blanket bond approved by the Bishop, if such bond be available, covering all persons authorized to receive or disburse monies of the Diocese or any organization thereof. If such blanket bond be not available, it shall be the duty of such persons to furnish bond in such amount and with such surety or sureties as the Bishop may deem proper, and payment for such bond shall be from the

funds in the custody of each such person.

**Section 4. a.** The members of the Finance Committee of the Diocese shall be ex officion the Trustees of all such Trust Funds as may be committed to their charge by the convention or by the Standing Committee.

**b.** The Trustees of the General Trust Funds of the Diocese shall be governed in the performance of their duties by the Canons of the Diocese and by resolutions of the Convention or of the Standing Committee not inconsistent with the Canons and the Articles of Incorporation.

#### **CANON 11: PENSION FUND**

**Section 1.** It shall be the duty of the Standing Committee to do all things that may be required or that it may deem proper to conform to and carry out the Church Pension Fund system as established by the Church, and provided for by the General Canons. **Section 2.** Any Congregation which has not paid the full amount of its annual premium due the Church Pension Fund for the preceding year shall be deprived of its right to representation in the Convention, which right shall not be restored until the said premiums have been paid in full.

# **CANON 12: TITLE TO PROPERTIES**

**Section 1.** Title to all real property pertaining to the Diocese, a Parish or other congregation shall be in the Diocese; and shall be held and conveyed in accordance with the provisions of these Canons.

**Section 2.** All legal instruments and papers relating to title shall be submitted to the Chancellor for examination and approval prior to conveyance of title to any such properties.

**Section 3.** No real property of any Parish, Organized Mission, or Mission Station on which is located its Church, Chapel, Parish House or Rectory, shall ever be encumbered or alienated without the written consent of the Rector, if there be one, the written consent of the Vestry, the written consent of the Ecclesiastical Authority, and the consent of Diocesan Convention or the Standing Committee, expressed by a resolution adopted by a two-thirds (2/3) vote of such Convention or Committee.

# **CANON 13: CONVOCATIONS**

The Diocese may be divided into Convocations if the Convention so authorizes upon request by the Bishop. The Bishop may determine from time to time the number of such Convocations, their geographical boundaries, and whether or not they shall be headed by Archdeacons or Deans.

# **CANON 14: BOARDS AND COMMISSIONS**

The Bishop, if so desired, may establish such Boards and Commissions as may expedite the work of the Church in the Diocese, by designating such Boards and Commissions, and the number of members of the same, as the Bishop shall deem necessary to fulfill their functions. The members of such Boards and Commissions shall be nominated by the Bishop and be elected annually by the Convention, except that if any nomination be rejected further nomination to such position shall be made by the Bishop until one be elected.

#### **CANON 15: MISSIONS STATIONS**

Section 1. It shall be competent for any number of persons, ten (10) of whom are Confirmed Communicants of the Church in good standing over the age of twenty-one (21) years, who are desirous of maintaining services in any community according to the doctrine, discipline and worship of The Protestant Episcopal Church in the United States of America, to be formed into a Mission Station. Such persons shall make and sign a petition to the Bishop in charge of Missions, who in their discretion, may approve the same upon such terms and conditions as may be deemed expedient; and if approved, shall make and issue a certificate to that effect, stating therein the terms and conditions of the approval, and forward the same to the petitioners. The petition shall include a proposed name for the Mission Station, which shall be subject to the advice and consent of the Bishop in charge of Missions. The Bishop in charge of Missions may present to the Standing Committee a petition requesting admission of a Mission Station into union with the Convention. Upon approval by the Standing Committee, the Next Convention by majority vote may admit said Mission Station into union. The Bishop in charge of Missions may, upon the Bishop's own initiative, create a Mission Station at any place where it may deemed desirable or appropriate.

**Section 2.** The Bishop in charge of Missions shall annually appoint for each Mission Station not less than three (3) nor more than five (5) vestry members.

**Section 3.** No purchase of a church site shall be made for a Mission Station without the consent of the Bishop in charge of Missions and the Standing Committee.

#### **CANON 16: ORGANIZED MISSIONS**

- **Section 1. a.** Not less than twenty-five (25) Confirmed Communicants of the Church, in good standing, of eighteen (18) years of age and upwards, of whom not less than ten (10) shall be of the age of twenty-one (21) years and upwards, may apply to become an Organized Mission in the following manner:
- **b.** They shall lay before the Bishop in charge of Missions and the Standing Committee a petition signed by not less than the minimum number of Confirmed Communicants as specified in **Section 1.a.** of this Canon, acknowledging and acceding to the doctrine, discipline and worship of The Protestant Episcopal Church in the United States of America, and undertaking and promising that such Organized Mission, if consent to its organization be given, shall
  - (1) Agree to pay a stated amount for the support of the salary of its Vicar.
  - **(2)** Agree to submit annually a proposed budget to the proper Diocesan Committee.
- **c.** If the Bishop in charge of Missions and the Standing Committee consent to the organization of the Congregation as an Organized Mission, the Bishop shall appoint a Minister to perfect the same.
- **d.** The Vicar appointed by the Bishop in charge of Missions shall preside over the organizational meeting, and not less than three (3), nor more than nine (9), vestry members shall be elected, whose qualifications and duties insofar as applicable, shall be the same as those which devolve upon or pertain to the Vestry of a Parish, subject to interpretation by the Bishop in charge of Missions. From among their number, the Vestry shall elect two (2) Wardens, designated as Junior and Senior, although all duties belong equally to both, and from among their number or from among signers of the

petition a Clerk and a Treasurer.


- **e.** At the meeting of the Diocesan Convention which follows the organizational meeting described in this Canon the Bishop in charge of Missions shall present the petition of the newly Organized Mission, along with the Bishop's recommendations and the recommendations of the Standing Committee. The Mission may then be admitted into union with the Convention as an Organized Mission by a majority vote of the Convention.
- **Section 2.** No purchase of a church site shall be made for an Organized Mission without the consent of the Bishop in charge of Missions and the Standing Committee.
- **Section 3.** The Vicar shall preside over and conduct the Vestry meetings which shall be held a minimum of once a quarter. In the absence of the Vicar, the Senior Warden, or if the Senior Warden be not present then the Junior Warden, shall conduct the Vestry meetings.
- **Section 4.** The provisions of Canons 17, 18 and 19, which refer to Parishes, shall apply to Missions and Mission Stations where applicable.

#### **CANON 17: PARISHES**

- **Section 1. a.** Notice of the desire to organize a Parish shall be given to the Ecclesiastical Authority. Said notice shall be in writing, and contain such information as may enable the Bishop and Standing Committee to judge the propriety of the proposed act, which notice shall be signed by the persons who desire to organize. Approval by the Bishop and Standing Committee shall be essential for organization, and for the admission of the Parish into union with the Convention.
- **b.** Every application to organize a new Parish in the general area served by an existing Parish or Parishes, shall be accompanied by a certificate showing the approval or disapproval of the Rector and Vestry of each of such existing Parishes. In all cases the consent of the Bishop and Standing Committee must be obtained.
- **Section 2.** For the organization of a Parish, not less than one hundred (100) Confirmed Communicants eighteen (18) years of age or over, shall assemble at the specified time and place, due notice having been given at Divine Service on the two (2) preceding Sundays, and adopt and sign the Articles of Association prescribed by the Diocese in Section 3 of this Canon. Provided, however, that no such organization shall be had until a specified annual sum towards the support of the Rector and the expenses of the Parish together with the pension premium and a reasonable provision for the support of the Diocese and Diocesan expenses shall be assured to the satisfaction of the Bishop and the Standing Committee.

# Section 3.

We whose names are hereto subscribed, desirous of enjoying the privileges o
religious worship and instruction for ourselves and families, according to the
forms and doctrines of The Protestant Episcopal Church in the Diocese of the
Central Gulf Coast, Inc., and desirous of being assembled in conformity with
the Canon prescribed by the Diocesan Convention, of said Church, for the
government of Parishes composing same, under and by virtue of said acts, or
thisday of, Anno Domini, do form
ourselves into a Parish, and adopt the following Articles of Association, to
wit:



**Article II.** This Parish acknowledges, accedes to, and adopts, and shall at all times adhere to the doctrine, discipline, worship, and usages of The Protestant Episcopal Church in the United States of America, and likewise the Constitutions and Canons of said Church, as set forth by the General Convention and the Charter and Canons of the Church in the Diocese of the Central Gulf Coast, Inc., as prescribed by the Diocesan Convention.

**Article III.** When any person uniting with this Association shall disclaim, or refuse, conformity to the Authorities mentioned in the preceding Article, that person shall cease to be a member of this Parish.

Article	IV.	The	Wardens	and	Vestry	of

**Article V.** Delegates shall be elected to represent the Parish at the annual meeting of the Diocesan Convention as provided by the Canons and it shall be their duty to attend all meetings of the Diocesan Convention.

**Article VI.** In case of the dissolution or extinction of this Parish, for any cause whatsoever, the lands, tenements, and other estates, real or personal, if such there be, shall vest in The Protestant Episcopal Church in the Diocese of the Central Gulf Coast, Inc.

**Section 4.** Any Congregation complying with the provisions of Canon 17 may, upon application in writing, accompanied by the Articles of Association, or a certified copy thereof, be admitted into union with the Diocesan Convention.

**Section 5.** With the adoption of these Canons by the Convention, each and every Parish now located in the Diocese of the Central Gulf Coast automatically comes under the items listed in **Section 3.** 

**Section 6.** The Parish Vestry shall pay its clergy at least the minimum salary and allowances which have been or may be established by the Standing Committee for clergy serving in this Diocese.

**Section 7.** The Parish Vestry shall procure such property and liability insurance coverage as the Standing Committee may establish from time to time.

# **CANON 18: PARISH MEETINGS**

**Section 1.** The Congregation of each Parish shall meet at least annually, on a date to be appointed by the Vestry. Notice of such meeting shall be given by the Rector, or, if there be none, by one of the Wardens, to the members of the Congregation, at least two (2) weeks before the appointed date, either in writing or at the regular services. The meeting shall be designated as the Annual Parish Meeting. At such meeting, after election of a Secretary for the meeting, there shall be conducted the election of vestry members, unless they have been elected previously; the Rector and Parish Treasurer shall make their reports and the reports of Parish organizations shall likewise then be made; and such other business as may be properly brought before the meeting by any Communicant entitled to vote as provided by **Section 4** of this Canon shall be

transacted. A vestry member may be elected at any other Parish meeting if the Vestry so determines and notice is given as in the case of the Annual Parish Meeting.

- **Section 2.** Other Parish meetings may be held as occasion may require, at such times as may be appointed by the Rector or Vestry. Due notice shall be given as provided for the Annual Meeting.
- **Section 3.** At Parish Meetings, the Rector shall preside, or, in the Rector's absence, one of the Wardens.
- **Section 4.** Except when otherwise specified by existing charter, those entitled to vote shall be confirmed Communicants in good standing of not less than sixteen (16) years of age who are canonically resident as of the first day of the month in which the meeting is held. The qualified voters present shall constitute a quorum.
- **Section 5.** All elections and other matters voted upon shall be decided by a majority of qualified voters present.
- **Section 6.** Wardens must be chosen from those who are vestry members. The Rector may appoint one (1) person of the Vestry as Senior Warden or as Junior Warden, or the choice of both Wardens may be left to election by the Parish Meeting, which may in turn leave the selection of Wardens to the Vestry.

# **CANON 19: PARISH VESTRY**

- **Section 1.** The Vestry shall consist of such number of Communicants entitled to vote in Parish Meetings, not less than three (3) nor more than thirty (30), as shall be determined by the Congregation. The election of Vestry members shall be held at a Parish Meeting and this election shall insure adequate representation for the Parish and adequate qualifications for those elected.
- **Section 2.** It shall be the duty of the Vestry to take charge of the temporal concerns of the parish. It shall elect a rector. Upon selection by the rector, and with the concurrence of the Vestry, curates may be called. Curates and all other staff and employees shall serve under the authority and direction and at the pleasure of the rector. It shall keep order in the church during Divine Service and work with the clergy for the furtherance of the Church's program. The Vestry shall be responsible for seeing that reports and registers required by the Canons are kept in order. All reports to be sent in to the Diocese shall be the responsibility of the Vestry and Rector working together.
- **Section 3.** The officers of the Vestry shall include a Senior Warden, Junior Warden, Clerk, Treasurer, and any other offices as they may become necessary. The Clerk and Treasurer may be members of the Vestry but are not required to be.
- **Section 4.** The Rector shall preside over and conduct the Vestry meetings which shall be held a minimum of once a quarter. In the absence of the Rector, the Senior Warden or if the Senior Warden be not present then the Junior Warden, shall conduct the Vestry meetings.
- **Section 5.** The Rector may cast a vote when the Rector's vote will affect the outcome.
- **Section 6.** The Vestry shall report to the Annual Parish Meeting each year on its activities from the previous year.

#### **CANON 20: CHANGES IN STATUS OF PARISHES AND MISSIONS**

Section 1. a. When a Parish has not, for the space of two (2) years, complied with

the conditions required for its organization as a Parish, as provided by Canon 17, this fact may be reported to the Convention by the Standing Committee, through its Secretary, whereupon the Convention may, by a majority vote of each Order, annul the organization of said Parish and thereupon said Parish shall become a Mission.

**b.** It shall be the duty of the Ecclesiastical Authority to take the necessary steps to preserve the property and records of such Parish for the benefit of the Diocese.

Section 2. If the Vestry of any Parish is of the opinion that the Parish is unable to comply with canonical conditions and requirements applicable to Parishes, it may so declare by resolution; which resolution shall be submitted to a meeting of the Congregation after notice of the time, place and purpose of the meeting has been given in writing to the members of the Congregation or from the chancel on a Sunday preceding such meeting. If the resolution is approved by a majority of the Confirmed Communicants over the age of eighteen (18) years, certified copy thereof signed by each such Confirmed Communicant approving the same shall be forwarded to the Bishop together with a certificate by the Wardens that the resolution has been considered and adopted at a meeting of the Congregation duly called as above provided. If the Bishop approves such action in writing, such Parish shall thereupon become an Organized Mission in union with the Convention. The above papers shall be filed with the Secretary of the Convention who shall notify the next convention of such action.

**Section 3.** The Bishop in charge of Missions may, when an Organized Mission has not, for the space of two (2) years, complied with the conditions required for its organization as an Organized Mission as provided by Canon 16, annul the organization of said Organized Mission, with the approval of the Standing Committee, reporting this fact to the next Annual Convention, and it shall thereupon become a Mission Station.

**Section 4.** When, in the judgment of the Bishop in charge of Missions, a Mission has not for the space of two (2) years fulfilled the purpose for which it was created, the Bishop shall, with the approval of the Standing committee, declare such mission extinct and report such action to the next Annual Convention. It shall be the duty of said Bishop, with the approval of the Standing Committee, to make such disposition of the properties of an extinct Mission as shall be deemed best for the interests of the Diocese, and said Bishop may execute conveyance of any real property with the consent of the Standing Committee.

# **CANON 21: CLERGY AND THEIR DUTIES**

**Section 1.** Every Minister of this Church in charge of a Congregation shall keep a register of baptisms, confirmations, communicants, marriages, and burials within the Minister's cure, reporting the same to the Bishop ten (10) days before each Annual Diocesan Convention, stating the number of services held and official acts performed by him from January 1 through December 31.

**Section 2.** Each Rector of a Parish and Minister in charge of a Congregation shall send to the Bishop each year a list of communicants or members, as requested by the Bishop, of the Parish or Mission, with addresses.

**Section 3.** Before any clergy may be allowed to perform the Sacraments in any Church or Congregation, in this Diocese, they must first produce satisfactory evidence that they are an authorized Minister of this Church in good standing. Whenever there

is a settled Rector or Minister, that person shall be the sole judge in the premises subject only to the Ecclesiastical Authority, but if the Parish is vacant, the Wardens and Vestry shall require the fulfillment of the above conditions, together with approval of the Ecclesiastical Authority.

**Section 4.** The staff and employees of a congregation shall serve under the direction and control and pleasure of the rector or minister in charge. Nothing in this section, however, shall prevent the rector or minister in charge from delegating to the Vestry or committee thereof, all or part of the authority to employ, direct, control, evaluate, discharge, or otherwise control the staff or employees.

#### **CANON 22: COMMISSION ON MINISTRY**

**Section 1.** There shall be a Commission on Ministry of four (4) learned Presbyters (of whom two (2) must be Parochial Priests) canonically resident within the Diocese; and such number of Lay Persons, not exceeding four (4), as shall be determined by the Bishop, who shall be Confirmed Communicants in good standing. Such members shall be nominated by the Bishop and subject to confirmation by the vote of the Convention to serve for a term of four (4) years.

**Section 2.** The Commission on Ministry:

- **a.** May adopt rules for its work, subject to the approval of the Bishop, provided the same are not inconsistent with the General Canons and the Diocesan Canons.
  - **b.** May appoint committees of the Commission to act on its own behalf.
- **c.** Shall assist the Bishop in matters pertaining to the enlistment and selection of persons for Ministry and in the guidance and pastoral care of all Postulants and Candidates for Holy Orders.
- **d.** Assist the Bishop in the guidance and pastoral care of Deacons, Deaconesses and Professional Church Workers.
- **e.** Assist the Bishop in matters pertaining to the continuing education of the Ministry.
- **f.** In the presence of the Bishop and under the Bishop's guidance and oversight, shall interview each Candidate before their ordination, alike to the Deaconate and Priesthood, to ascertain their personal readiness for such ordination, and shall report in writing and without delay the findings of this interview to the Standing Committee.
- **g.** May administer examination which are prepared by the National Board of Examining Chaplains.

#### **CANON 23: DEPUTIES TO GENERAL CONVENTION**

**Section 1.** At the Diocesan Convention held not less than twelve (12) months next before the regular meeting of the General Convention, four (4) clergy qualified to vote in Convention (three (3) of whom must be Parochial Priests), and four (4) laypersons who shall be Confirmed Communicants in good standing, shall be elected to represent this Diocese as Deputies, in said Convention. Such Deputies shall be furnished with a certificate of election, signed by the President and Secretary of the Diocesan Convention. The Diocesan Convention shall in the same manner elect four (4) clergy qualified to vote in Convention three (3) of whom must be Parochial Priests), and four (4) laypersons, with like qualifications, as alternates.

**Section 2.** It shall be the duty of the Deputies-Elect, not less than four (4) months before the meeting of the General Convention, to signify to the Bishop their acceptance

of the appointment, and intention to perform its functions, in default of which, the Bishop shall designate so many of the alternates having the greatest number of votes, as shall insure, as far as practicable, a full representation of the Diocese. The persons so designated by the Bishop, being furnished with the Bishop's certificate thereof, shall have all the power of authority of the Deputies elected by the Diocesan Convention. In case of a vacancy in the Episcopate, or the inability of the Bishop to act, this power of designation shall be exercised by the Standing Committee.

**Section 3.** If at a meeting of the General Convention, any Deputy elected by the Convention, or designated by the Bishop or Standing Committee, shall fail to attend, or after taking their seat, shall obtain leave of absence for the remainder of the session, such vacancy shall be supplied by the vote of the remaining Clerical and Lay Deputies who may be in attendance at said General Convention. In each case a Lay Deputy can only be replaced by a Lay Person, and a Clerical Deputy can only be replaced by a Clergy. If a deputy must be absent only for a portion of the session, the vacancy may be temporarily filled through use of the procedure provided in this Section.

**Section 4.** Reasonable travel and other expenses of Deputies to General Convention shall be paid by the Diocese.

# **CANON 24: UNIVERSITY OF THE SOUTH**

**Section 1.** The University of the South is declared to be the institution of higher learning of the Diocese of the Central Gulf Coast.

**Section 2.** The diocesan Convention shall elect one priest and two lay communicants to serve for a term of three (3) years as Trustees of the University of the South, which terms shall be staggered. Trustees so elected shall meet the following criteria:

- Trustees shall be personally committed to the aims and purposes of the University.
- 2) Each Trustee shall demonstrate his or her personal commitment to the University by, among other things, attending the Board of Trustee's annual May meeting, such other special meetings as may be called, and one orientation session for new Trustees, which sessions are held immediately prior to each annual meeting. Trustees shall also familiarize themselves with the Trustee Handbook and the University's governing documents, including its Charter, as amended, Constitution and Ordinances.
- 3) Trustees shall serve as direct communicators between the University and the Diocese from which the trustee was elected, and shall timely inform that Diocese of the actions of the Boards of Trustees and Regents and the University administration.
- 4) Trustees shall provide a meaningful level of annual financial support to the University as a symbol of their commitment to its mission and financial wellbeing.

In the event a Trustee becomes unwilling or unable to serve, the Bishop of this Diocese shall nominate a qualified communicant to complete the remainder of the term.

**Section 3.** The Trustees shall annually report to the Diocesan Convention.

**Section 4.** Reasonable travel and other expenses of the Trustees shall be paid by the Diocese.

#### **CANON 25: ECCLESIASTICAL DISCIPLINE**

**Section 1** Title IV of General Canons. Those provisions of the Title IV of the General Canons which are applicable to the Diocese are hereby incorporated as part of this Title. To the extent, if any, that any of the provisions of this Title are in conflict or inconsistent with the provisions of the Title IV, the provisions of the Title IV shall govern.

# **Section 2** Discipline Structure.

- a. Disciplinary Board. The Board shall consist of not less than seven persons, **four** of whom are members of the Clergy and three of whom are Laity.
- Clergy Members. The Clergy members of the Board must be canonically and geographically resident with the Diocese.
- c. Lay Members. The lay members of the Board shall be Adult Communicants in Good Standing, and geographically resident in the Diocese.
- d. Election. The members of the Board shall be elected by the convention. Each member shall be elected for a three (3)-year term; except, if a member is elected to fill a vacancy, the term of such member shall be the unexpired term of the member being replaced. The term of the member shall commence on the first (1st) day of the year following election. The terms of office of the Board shall be staggered and arranged into three classes.
  - e. Vacancies. Vacancies on the Board shall be filled as follows:
    - (i) Upon the determination that a vacancy exists, the President of the Board shall notify the Bishop of the vacancy and request appointment of a replacement member of the same order as the member to be replaced.
    - (ii) The Bishop shall appoint a replacement Board member in consultation with the Standing Committee.
    - (iii) Persons appointed to fill vacancies on the Board shall meet the same eligibility requirements as apply to elected Board members.
    - (iv) With respect to a vacancy created for any reason other than pursuant to a challenge as provided below, the term of any person selected as a replacement Board member shall be until the next annual Convention. With respect to a vacancy resulting from a challenge, the replacement Board member shall serve only for the proceedings for which the elected Board member is not serving as a result of the challenge.
- f. Preserving Impartiality. In any proceeding under this Title, if any member of a Conference Panel or Hearing Panel of the Board shall become aware of a personal conflict of interest or undue bias, that member shall immediately notify the president of the Board and request a replacement member of the Panel. Respondent's Counsel and the Church Attorney shall have the right to challenge any member of a Panel for conflict of interest or undue bias by motion to the Panel for disqualification of the challenged member. The member of the Panel not the subjects of the challenge shall promptly consider the motion and determine whether the challenged Panel member shall be disqualified from participating in the proceeding.
- g. President. Within sixty (60) days following the annual Convention, the Board shall convene to elect a President to serve for the following calendar year.

- h. Intake Officer. The Intake Officer shall be appointed from time to time by the Bishop after consultation with the Board. The Bishop may appoint one or more Intake Officers according to the needs of the Diocese. The Bishop shall publish the name(s) and contact information of the Intake Officer(s) throughout the Diocese.
- i. Investigator. The Bishop shall appoint an Investigator in consultation with the President of the Board. The Investigator may, but need not, be a Member of the Church.
- j. Church Attorney. Within sixty (60) days following each annual Convention, the Standing Committee shall appoint an attorney to serve as Church Attorney to serve for the following calendar year. The person so selected must be a Member of the Church and a duly licensed attorney, but need not reside within the Diocese.
- k. Pastoral Response Coordinator. The Bishop may appoint a Pastoral Response Coordinator, to serve at the will of the Bishop in coordinating the delivery of appropriate pastoral responses provided for in Title IV.8 of the General Canons and this Title. The Pastoral Response Coordinator may be the Intake Officer, but shall not be a person serving in any other appointed or elected capacity under this Title.
- 1. Advisors. In each proceeding under this Title, the Bishop shall appoint an Advisor for the Complainant and an Advisor for the Respondent. Persons serving as Advisors shall hold no other appointed or elected position provided for under this Title, and shall not include chancellors or vice chancellors of this Diocese or any person likely to be called as a witness in the proceeding.
- m. Clerk. The Board shall appoint a Board Clerk to assist the Board with records management and administrative support. The Clerk may be a member of the Board.

#### Section 3 Procedure.

- a. Charges for which a member of the Clergy may be made to stand trial are contained in Title IV in the Canons of The Episcopal Church.
- b. The mode and manner of making charges securing presentments and of conducting trials shall be as established in the Canons of The Episcopal Church.

# Section 4 Costs and Expenses.

a. The reasonable costs and expenses of the Board, the Intake Officer, the Investigator, the Church Attorney, the Board Clerk and the Pastoral Response Coordinator shall be the obligation of the Diocese, subject to budgetary constraints as may be established by the Standing Committee.

#### Section 5 Records.

- a. Records of Proceedings. Records of active proceedings before the Board, including the period of any pending appeal, shall be preserved and maintained in the custody of the Clerk, if there be one, otherwise by the Diocesan offices.
- b. Permanent Records. The Bishop shall make provision of the permanent storage of records of all proceedings under this Title at the Diocese and the Archives of The Episcopal Church, as prescribed in Title IV of the General Canons.

#### **CANON 26: ELECTION OF A BISHOP**

**Section 1.** Pursuant to the provisions of Article VII, Section 4, of the Articles of Incorporation of The Protestant Episcopal Church in the Diocese of the Central Gulf Coast, Inc., the procedure for the election of a bishop shall be stated below.

**Section 2.** Nominees for the election of a bishop shall be chosen either by the Search Committee or by nominating petitions. The Search Committee will nominate

from four to seven candidates. A nominating petition must be signed by four clergy who are eligible to vote in a diocesan convention and four lay persons eligible to serve as delegates to a diocesan convention. Nominating petitions must be submitted to the Search Committee by a deadline set by it in order for background checks on such nominees to be conducted. No nominations from the floor will be order.

**Section 3.** A Search Committee appointed by the Standing Committee will be charged with the responsibility of preparing and publicizing educational material on the historic episcopate; preparing a profile of the Diocese; interviewing potential nominees; choosing from four to seven nominees to be presented at the Convention at which the election will be held; verifying the validity of nominating petitions and carrying out any additional duties that may be assigned to it by the Standing Committee.

**Section 4.** The Standing Committee shall choose the date for the Convention at which the election will be conducted. The Standing Committee shall choose such additional committees as may be needed for securing a site for the electing convention and making all necessary arrangements for it; securing a site and making all necessary arrangements for the ordination of the new bishop; providing support to a retiring bishop and that bishop's staff and family and to the bishop elect and the family of the bishop elect and any such additional matters as the Standing Committee may deem appropriate.

# **CANON 27: ESTABLISHMENT OF A CATHEDRAL**

**Section 1.** A Cathedral may be established by the Bishop in the manner provided by this Canon and when so established shall be known and used as the Cathedral Church of the Diocese.

**Section 2.** The Cathedral shall be established by written agreement ("Agreement") between the Diocese and the Parish to be designated as the Cathedral Parish, the terms and provisions of which must be approved by the Bishop, the Standing Committee of the Diocese, and the Vestry of the Cathedral Parish, and, which to become effective and binding upon the Diocese and the Cathedral Parish, must be approved by the Convention in a vote by orders.

**Section 3.** The Cathedral shall be governed and operated as set forth in the Agreement and in accordance with the Canons of the Diocese of the Central Gulf Coast and the Constitution and Canons of the Episcopal Church in the United States of America.

# **CANON 28: AMENDMENT OF CANONS**

All proposals altering or amending these canons shall be presented in writing by the Bishop, the Chancellors, or a delegate to the convention to the Secretary of the Diocese and the Chancellors not less than ninety (90) days prior to the opening of the Convention and shall be distributed to each congregation in the Diocese not less than sixty (60) days prior to the opening of the Convention. Any such proposal shall be referred to the Convention Committee on Canons and Rules of Order and shall be reported to the Convention as part of the report of the Committee or of the Chancellors, with or without endorsement. If it be approved by a majority of the two (2) orders voting separately thereon, it shall become effective upon adjournment of the Convention.
